

MILITARY JUNTA TO SEIZE POWER!

THE 'TOTLEY INDEPENDENT' has infiltrated an underground movement which threatens to seize control of Totley by military force and declare independence as a republic within the next year.

Apparently plans to build a frontier wall around the area are well advanced and fortifications will be manned by platoons of brownies and cub scouts.

We can reveal exclusively that the self style Junta had 15 years ago submitted the scheme illustrated above to Sheffield Town Hall for planning permission. The local authority seems to

have responded speedily on this occasion and last week planning approval was granted. When the 'Independent' contacted the Chief Planning Officer for comment he was heard to reply "Oh no! We seem to have slipped up again, the same thing happened with the Town Hall extensions, we thought that was going to be an extension to the Peace Gardens"!

It is believed that the leader of the coup is a well-known local vicar who only recently was invested as Supreme Commander Allied Powers Totley (S.H.A.P.T.) 
Several Sheffield shops have already agreed to sponsor the pair and they hope that some large city firms and organisations will back them.

They hope to raise money for a swimming pool for handicapped children at the Woolley Wood Special School near Suzanne's home in Nesfield Way, Firth Park.

They have to reach Newquay in three days or the money they hope to raise will be halved. This means the duo will have to cover 110 miles per day.

"The only thing that will stop us is either bike failure or the weather", said David. He added that their one and only practice run to Southport, 80 miles away, ended tragically in rainsoaked Manchester, where they got lost for two hours.

"We were going to Newquay anyway for our summer holiday, and we joked about going on a tandem. Then we thought, if we are going to slog our guts out getting there we may as well do it for a good cause. But if we



had as many pounds as the people who have said "Can Ya Ride Tandem", there would be no need to do it for charity".

After a couple of weeks in Cornwall, the two former King Ecgbert School pupils and their tandem will return the easy way - by train!

70 ft giant escapes the axe

A SPECIMEN tree has been saved from the axe after a determined fight by Totley residents.

The owner of the building plot on The Quadrant on which a 70-foot-tall lime tree stands wanted to chop down the tree to make way for a detached house. the local authorities are investigating the possibility of traffic control at the busy junction of Totley Brook Road with Abbeydale Road South at Totley Rise. But 46 residents of Quarry Road and Terry Road petitioned Sheffield City Council with the help of two local Councillors, and Planning Permission for the house was refused last week.

The residents claimed in

the petition that if the house had been built it would have affected the root system of the tree, which only recently was put under a preservation order.

It was also stated that the building of the house would have increased the density of dwellings in the immediate area to an undesirable level.

Mr. Barry Fairhead and his wife Christine of Terry Road who organised the petition said that if the house had been built it would have blocked off sunlight to their home and garden. He said "We realise that people have got to build houses somewhere, but we have to maintain the standards and surroundings that we have got. The place just would not be the same without that tree".

Mrs. Margaret Parr of Quarry Road said: "It would have been absolute sacrilege to chop the tree down. We were very anxious about it because it's such a beautiful tree. This is why we live here - because we like the trees and everything".


TOTLEY RISE



arburtous World TON-UP FOR A

THE OPEN areas of Totley are bounded by two streams; Old Hay Brook, which forms the boundary with Dore, and Totley Brook which is the South Yorkshire-Derbyshire border, south of Mickley Lane. Within that area there are many different types of landscape, ranging from the moors of Totley Moss, through the growing wood of Gillfield to the damp, unspoilt meadows beside Totley Brook.

These meadows are at present coming to a peak. They abound in wild plants, butterflies and insects of many kinds. The pretty Orange Tip butterfly has had its brief season - from mid-May to mid-June - and will rextbe seen in May 1978. On sunny days, almost the full range of our local butterflies may be seen here. Small Tortoiseshell, Wall Brown, Large Skipper, large and small Whites well-known to the gardeners - and their less harmful relative, the Green-Veined White, which leads a blame less existence, having no taste for domestic cabbages. Owners of Buddleia bushes may be visited by our showy species, the Peacock and the two North African immigrants - the Red Admiral and Painted Lady. The single exception to this list is the Green Hairstreak. This tiny, beautiful, iridescent creature is found only on Blackamoor in May and June. It is difficult to find, and is superbly camouflaged.

These, then, are our 'locals'. From time to time we may get more exotic immigrants, but I simply hope that we can retain what we have already. Many of these species have caterpillars which feed on Stinging Nettles so that any comprehensive 'tidy-up' of the district which would mean clearing nettle patches would be destroying the breeding sites of some of these lovely insects. Flower gardens can be planted so as to encourage butterflies; the easiest way is to plant bushes of Buddleia davidii which acts almost as a magnet to many of the prettier species. The shrub grows easily in the neighbourhood, and my garden for one, is never without one. Bob Warburton, of 22, Rowan Tree Dell, is a naturalist and teacher.

A NOTE in the Dore and Totley Churchwardens and Constables Accounts for 1777 states "Henry Crookes is to serve as Dog Whiper (their spelling) for 2 years for the new coat he received which cost £1".

WIMBLEDON's centenary went with a great flourish of excitement last week, but the one hundredth birthday of one of Totley's oldest fixtures has so far passed without any racket.

The mystery stone on the grass at the junction of Mick ley Lane and Baslow Road was put up in 1877. It bears the inscription "St. JC". Most people, when asked if they could shed light on the origins of the rectangular stone, just shrugged their shoulders and said they had never noticed it before.

Local historian, Brian Edwards, of Chapel House, Hillfoot Road, suggested that it could have marked the site of St. Joan's cottage, but admits that he can't find any evidence of a visit to Totley by the French Saint!

Pensioner Mrs. Smith, of Green Oak Road, said she had not got a clue, but she always found it useful for a sit-down when she went shopping.

While 80-year-old neighbour, Frank Taylor, who after more than 65 years in the village reckons he knows more about Totley than anyone else, would not commit himself.

"It might be the boundary stone of the Parish of St. John's Church, but I only say might", he said. He added that it disappeared in 1970 when Baslow Road was being modernised, but turned up again a few yards to the north several months later.

Local Sportsman dies

Mick Taylor, a footballer with Totley Sports for 17 years, died suddenly last month, aged 38. Recently out of hospital after an illness, he was walking on the Recreation Ground when he collapsed and went into a coma from which he never recovered.

"Mick, often called 'Scratch', was a most popular and active member of Totley Sports and Social Club, continuing this association after he married and moved to nearby Dronfield Woodhouse" said Club Chairman, Norman Cann.

After his playing career ended, Mick, who worked at Totley Brickworks, stayed on to coach the 2nd XI. More than 160 people attended the funeral of Mick who left a widow, Denise, and 4 children.

"Totley has outpaced its facilities"



REVEREND ALAN JOCKEL is the elected chairman of the newly formed Totley Residents Association. We thought it would be helpful to record his views on the community.

"Totley is a very mixed community with a big distinction between the older residents comprising home owners and council tenants who have settled in their homes over the years, and the newer residents particularly those of the Aldam estate area.

I think that the main function of the Totley Residents Association is to help these different groups to meet, work and play together."

Alan Jockel arrived in Totley last year with his wife Barbara and his three children Catherine, who is at university in Oxford, 17 year old Deborah, and Daniel aged 15, who are both at school. He came to Sheffield in 1953, a year after he was married, and before coming to the district

he served at St. Marys, Bramall Lane, Crosspool and Wadsley Bridge.

Seeing Totley through the eyes of a relative newcomer, he feels that "though it is a very mixed area, it is very pleasant to live in. But some people have become isolated and lonely, and in terms of population growth it has outpaced its facilities. To combat this, the Residents Association seek a community meeting place somewhere in Totley, and I hope that when such a centre is available it will have the facilities to cater for all the residents, especially the elderly and the young".

"We don't want people to think that because we haven't yet got a permanent meeting place, that we can't start some activities now; everyone is welcome to make suggestions and we want help in working out our priorities.

We hope that we can work in co-operation with existing organisations in the area, and that they might share facilities with us".

Kent-born Mr. Jockel describes himself as a parish vicar, and says his community work compliments the spiritual side of his job. He has chaired the Sheffield Churches Council for Community Care for six years, has recently helped to set up a district liaison committee, and served on the Sheffield Amenities Council.

He feels that Totley is ready for and needs such an association despite the record of past societies, which have fizzled out because of public

apathy.

"Judging by the number of people who turned up at our two meetings so far, and the subsequent response, we have a tremendous amount of support. It is going to be hard work in the early days, especially without our own place, and it depends on how everybody in Totley works to make it a success".

Pinfold

TOTLEY and District Environment Society have now received planning permission to clean up the old pinfold in Hillfoot Road and to transform it into a small garden. The pinfold, which was in use in the last century, was an enclosure for impounding stray animals. The owner of the beast would then pay a fine to the pinder who usually lived nearby and who was in charge; this was the origination of the family name Pinder.

In 1813 another earlier pinfold was marked, on survey drawings, in a position close to the present Fleur de Lys. At that time, there was a well in its present position and the village stocks close by.
