Xour council cares-for you

COUNCIL house tenants in Totley were experiencing heating problems last weekend. A series of trip switches on boilers cut in and turned off the heat. Other tenants experienced difficulties inside their own homes. A spokesman for the City Council made the understatement of the year when he said "We do appear to be plagued with electrical problems at the moment" for, the following day, office workers at the super-duper new £9 million Town Hall extensions walked out complaining of the cold. Let's face it, if they can't solve their own problems, what chance have they got of solving yours?

Totley County School experienced difficulties with heating last winter and despite demands by the School Managers, pupils may again be subject to cold classrooms.

An Education Department spokesman, discussing heating faults in a number of schools, told the 'Star', "It's unfortunate but it's a problem that's always going to be with us". (We gather he was referring to the heating and not the Department).

LOCAL BONNIES

BOTH local junior schools held bonfires for parents and children to celebrate the 372nd anniversary of Guy Fawkes night.

Although All Saints School bonfire was burnt down on November 3. appeals in the local press and radio brought overwhelming support from people with rubbish to burn. FURNISS AVENUE - STOP

NO final decision has yet been made on the future of the 10 acre plot of land off Furniss Avenue.

Sheffield City Council want to auction the land off for a housing development, but pressure from the STOP Action Group has delayed the decision into December.

STOP have now submitted their own plans for the land. They wish to see some kind of recreational, educational or agricultural use. Chairwoman, Mrs. Pat Lyne, said: "We are not doing this just to stall for time. We just want a proper discussion on all the alternatives before a final decision is made".

SHOP STAYS SHUT

THE LIKELIHOOD of a second supermarket in upper Totley is in doubt again following news that the owner of Centra Food Market went out of business.

The 'Independent' pointed out the problems facing shop-keepers in Totley after a survey in which house wives called for another supermarket to compete with the co-op.

But the owner of Centra, Mr. Eric Jackson, told Sheffield bankruptcy court that bargain-hunting housewives were partly to blame for driving him out of business.

Mr. Jackson moved from a smaller grocery store, F.W. Robinson's, on Totley Rise to Centra, to expand his business, ploughing most of the money from the sale back into Centra. It was only open a short time before Mr. Jackson was forced to close.

AERIAL UNLIKELY NOW AT OWLER BAR


ANOTHER aerial is believed to be planned in the Totley area - this time at Owler Bar, where Wimpeys are understood to have requested planning permission.







DURING the winter months, and there can be no doubts about the season now, one of our most familiar and best-loved birds is the Robin. This attractive bird becomes very tolerant of human company during winter and will approach much more closely than during summer. It seems strange that Robins on the continent of Europe are shy and retiring, and yet here, they become very familiar and have adapted so well to the human world.

The Robin belongs to the same family as the Thrush and Blackbird, and is mainly insectivorous if given a choice of diet. Because of this, the bread and cake scraps of many birdtables hold little interest for our redbreasted friend. Foods which contain fat are more to his liking, but to spoil the Robin completely, maggots and worms left over from a fishing trip, or meal-worms (beetle larvae) if they are available, will really cause him to lose all inhibitions. The male and female are indistinguishable to all except other Robins, but the youngsters have no familiar red-breast, being brown with darker brown speckles. The nesting sites are notoriously quaint, old discarded kitchen utensils being used frequently. The essential factor of the nest site being either inaccessibility or superb camouflage. One Robin I watched this summer nested in the bank of Totley Brook and a more secluded and well-camouflaged nest would be hard to imagine.

Robins are very aggressive in protecting their territory from others of the same species, and will even attack toy replicas. Enemies are few in adulthood, but the domestic cat probably figures high amongst them, with the egg and nestling stealers such as Magpies, Jays and Jackdaws taking an early toll. Amongst more historical predators, the Sparrowhawk

would have figured prominently. Long may our Robin decorate both our gardens and our Christmas cards, and long may he enjoy with us the rather special relationship he has now.

A long long time ago

The Post Office employs thousands of people, many of whom are now pensioners. Yet there are only two retired employees who have reached the age of 100, and both of these men live in Totley. Mr Sharp, of Chatsworth Road, will celebrate his 103rd birthday in two months time, whilst his friend on Vernon Road is just a little older. Having spent a good deal of his life in Brightling-on-Sea, a North Essex boat-building town, Mr. Sharp came to visit his daughter when his wife died. Here, he has stopped and still likes a little shopping trip into Sheffield. Reminiscing, he paints a picture of gas-lit streets when he visited a sister in London. He was there, too, in 1901 for Queen Victoria's Funeral although; despite queuing since seven in the morning, he was not tall enough to see much of the procession. However, he clearly remembers London awakening and the smoke from house chimneys drifting straight up into the cloudless sky.

"It was an utterly different world in those days, he says, but it all seemed to change after Queen Victoria's death."

DISASTER OF '71

AS the warm May sun dipped over the Moss, the 6.09 express roared into the cool blackness of Totley Tunnel at 60 m.p.h.

The 34 passengers on the London/ Manchester train were looking forward to a lazy journey through the beautiful Derbyshire Peaks after emerging from Britain's second longest railway tunnel.

Then disaster struck. Less than a third of the way through the tunnel, the train hit a cracked joint in the line and the engine parted from the coaches.

The derailed coaches careered on for 300 yards, bouncing like a tennis ball off the sheer damp walls of the tunnel.

The train driver unknowingly went on to Grindleford before realising the train was missing. Miraculously, almost no-one was hurt and ironically the 84 year old tunnel may have proved to be a life-saver back in 1971. If the accident had have happened on open rails outside the tunnel, the train could easily have suffered much more damage and the passengers could have risked more serious injuries and even death. But luckily, apart from two minor casualties, the most the passengers suffered was a three hour wait in the tunnel and then they were taken to Chesterfield.

The tunnel was closed for three days. At a public enquiry in Crewe a year later, the cause of the accident was attributed to an 11" crack in the line. The crack was a result of corrosion, of a basic manufacturing fault. The railway staff, who had inspected the line only hours before the accident,

This was the nearest that Totley has ever come to a train disaster. Only three hours before, the local newspaper had extolled that nothing dangerous had ever happened in the tunnel.

The safety of the tunnel has always children were seen playing around and in the entrance.

But paradoxically, back in 1971 it may just have saved lives.

ROBINSON'S grocers shop on Totley Rise has changed hands. Mr. and Mrs. John Turner, who have run the shop for the last two years have sold the business to Mr. Christian Hepplewhite who lives in Dore. The shop will continue as a grocers. The shop used to be a "spike" - an official call for vagrants travelling from one workhouse to another. The workhouse at Firvale would give the tramps a voucher to exchange for a small piece of bread, butter and cheese. They would trade in these vouchers en route for Bakewell, and the shop would reclaim the money from Firvale.

But the village policeman, Sid Andrew, would occasionally be called in when the vagrants made trouble by asking for tuppence for cigarettes, as bread could quite easily be scrounged along the way. In those days there would be as many as two tramps a day through Totley travelling from "spike" to "spike".





TOTLEY resident David Robins, (it's a nom-de-plume), has just published the last in a series of booklets entitled 'A Century of Sheffield'. This sixth folio deals with the period of 1835 to 1935 and features Histories of both T.W.Ward and the Sheffield and Ecclesall Co-op. There are a number of interesting paragraphs including one of Lizzie the elephant who was borrowed from a local circus during the first World War, to pull heavily laden drays for Tommy Wards. Other chapters of the booklet deal with some of the older, now demolished buildings in Sheffield, social conditions, leisure and education. Totley does not, unfortunately, earn a place but readers may be interested to know that two characters mentioned did in fact have connections with the area. George Bassett, the well-known confectioner, was a trustee of Totley Methodist Chapel in the early days and Tommy Youdan, the night club and theatre owner, lived at Totley Grove (then called Totley Dale). Tommy originally purchased the area known as Hare Croft from the last Lord of the Manor of Totley, Lord Middleton, and then later sold it to the trustees for the building of the first chapel here.

The printer copes well with producing a 50 page publication fraught with the usual problems of reproducing old and often faded photographs; the only regret is that there is no index. At 85p 'A Century of Sheffield' is a fine bargain.
