Playweek 7,8,9 August

THE DATES of the Totley Residents Association first playweek have been set for 7th, 8th and 9th of August at Totley County School from 10.00 to 3.30 each day. Because of restrictions on numbers attending, although children from Totley County and All Saints Schools will be eligible, only certain age groups will be able to join in. Shortly, details will be given out to children attending these schools, but in the event of too great a demand, priority will be given to members of Totley Residents Association. Activities will include paper play, arts and crafts, needlework, stage makeup, nature work and outdoor sports etc. The cost will be 25p per day and packed lunches are to be brought. Responsibility for children travelling to and from the school will be with the parents.

Do look out for the notice when it is given out at school and send in your slips as soon as possible.

Youth Action

THE STUDY Action Group for Youth Facilities in this area includes representatives of the Totley Residents Association. The Group, which was convened by Duncan Wilson the Minister at the Dore and Totley United Reformed Church, has, on a number of occasions, met and discussed the lack of facilities. Last week they met with Councillor Sandra Davies Chairman of the Community Education Sub-Committee and officers responsible for this work.

A strong case was made for improved facilities, particularly in opening up existing buildings for youth activities and a plea was made for the appointment of an official youth worker for the area.

The general feeling was that the Sub-Committee were now fully aware of increased vandalism and problems with local youth, together with poor facilities. A number of measures are to be taken to improve youth activities in the district and we hope to keep our readers aware of progress and reemphasised the need for youth facilities in Totley, highlighting the need to look at the use of existing educational buildings in the area and how much they are used outside school hours. However, it is apparent that the needs of older children can only be really met by a purpose-built Club. Dore Village Youth Club are to be

applauded for a fine attempt to establish the real needs.

Youth has its say

Dore Village Youth Club have organised an excellent survey of views of Youth Facilities in the Dore and Totley areas by pupils of King Ecgbert School aged between 13 and 16 years. An analysis of the survey showed that most children felt that facilities were inadequate, that further Youth Club activities should not be associated with the school as it now stands. An equal number preferred locations in either Dore or Totley. Disco equipment was top of the list of required facilities, closely followed by sports equipment generally. There was strong criticism of the lack of facilities for both outdoor team games (5 a side football, netball, skateboarding) and indoor games requiring large spaces (i.e. badminton), emphasising the lack of sports provision for the winter months. A general feeling too was that Youth Club provision in the area is inadequate (in fact, it is non-existent in Totley).

It says much for the organisation of this survey (which was supported by the school) that out of 475 questionnaires issued, some 418 were returned. Of these, 48.5% of children showed that they regularly attended a Youth Club (either Dore Village, St. John's or Dobcroft etc.). Approximately 75% indicated that they would go to a Youth Club if better facilities existed, whilst only 10% said they would never go to one. The survey was submitted to the Sheffield Community Education Sub-Committee.

Jazz at college

THE TOTLEY Residents Association's initiative in arranging for facilities at Totley College for the local community is now working well. The latest group to use Buchanan Hall at the College are the Totley County Parent Friends Association. On Friday night, 30th June, they are holding a concert by the Sheffield Youth Jazz Orchestra.

The Adder will bite but occasionally will offer no resistance at all. It almost invariably will not eat in captivity and should not be kept under any circumstances. The Smooth Snake bites readily if picked up but is not poisonous. Under no account should these very rare reptiles be disturbed.

Many people have a great fear of snakes but after handling many Grass Snakes, I can personally dispel most of the 'reasons' for this loathing. Snakes are dry, warm to the touch and enjoy the warmth of your hand so they usually wind themselves around your fingers. They all shun humans and want only to be left alone.

If you see a snake, watch it, identify it if possible, but please leave it alone.

I have yet to see a snake in the wild in Sheffield although I am sure that there are quite a few about. In the space of one fortnight on holiday in Dorset recently, I saw all three species of our native snakes and about 10 specimens altogether. The drawing is of the Grass or Ringed Snake, which is our largest species, growing up to 5 ft. in length. It is found in areas where there is water and it often seeks refuge by swimming. It is non-poisonous and eats small animals such as tadpoles and frogs. Really large Grass Snakes will eat small mammals, such as mice and voles.

The poisonous Adder or Viper is our commonest snake and is found in almost every part of the British Isles except Ireland. There have been reports of them in Blackamoor. It is very shy and only bites in self-defence or when it is cornered and threatened. It rarely reaches 2 ft. in length and again eats small animals which are bitten and killed by the two poison fangs. The Adder is not so slim as the Grass Snake and usually has a black zig-zag line along the length of its back. This is not always clear, or even present, so familiarity with the snake's outline

is essential for quick identification. The rarest of the snakes is the Smooth Snake-this is now restricted to a few moors in the south of England. Its markings are rather unclear and it may be confused with both the Adder and Grass Snake by people unfamiliar with it. It grows to about $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long and occurs only in areas where the Sand Lizard (itself rare) lives. The reaction of these snakes is quite different if they are picked up. The Grass Snake does not bite but emits a really foul smell and will very realistically 'play dead' with its mouth open and guite limp.

CROP SHARING


IN 1954 pupils at Totley's Church of England School formed the 'Totley School Garden Company' with a working capital of £7.10s. One hundred and fifty ls. (5p) shares were issued to children and the School Fund. Each share then entitled the holder to receive 1/150th part of the profits made during the 1954 season. In spite of a bad season, the company showed a balance of £6.14s.4d. (approx. £6.72). Expenses were reported to be heavy £3.8s.8d. (£3.64) for seeds, £2.19s.2d. (£2.96) for garden frames and an allotment rent of £1.00. Produce from the garden was sold to the school.

Teacher, Mr. Shirt, commented that the exercise "taught the children book-keeping, a bit about companies and encourages their efforts at gardening".

At that time the area now occupied by the school fields off Hillfoot Road were taken up with allotments.


CHILDREN!

ARTICLES BY YOUR LOCAL FRUIT & VEG. CASE, JOHN SCRIVEN The season is almost upon us. Strawberries will be in full swing early in July. Due to a poor Spring, the crop will be a couple of weeks late this year, although quality is reported to be very good. A large percentage of our raspberries come from Scotland (is this the origin of Ally's Red Army?) and are expected to arrive towards the end of July. Bad news once again for blackcurrant users - the crop suffered from the sharp frost in April and was cut by 50%. As usual, processors take the bulk of the crop (blackcurrant juice etc.) so we are unlikely to see many in the shops. The first of the home-grown peas are now arriving; the crop is fairly good, quality is excellent and prices should be reasonable. Look around for top-quality courgettes, a baby marrow and a really marvellous vegetable, best served with a cheese sauce, with a short season. Starting early July, courgettes are ideal for freezing and are certainly worth buying

Recipe for beans

Broad beans are plentiful-and reasonanly priced at the moment. Look for pods which are plump to the touch as they will contain more beans than those which are slender and limp. When buying broad beans you will probably need more than you think. One pound unshelled weight will only serve two people. The simplest method of cooking them is as follows: Put the shelled beans into a pan and add sufficient boiling water to just cover them, a generous knob of butter, a pinch of sugar and seasoning to taste. Cover and simmer until just tender (about 5-6 minutes). Alternatively, try them raw in a salad. Shell the beans and put into a bowl with one small onion finely chopped, three tablespoons of chopped parsley and sufficient well-flavoured salad dressing to moisten. Just before serving, add 4 rashers of crispy bacon finely chopped. Cucumbers are another current good buy. As a variation to this salad add half a cucumber, diced, to the beans, and use chopped fresh mint instead of parsley.





In recent years, Germany and Japan have emerged as the world's 'top' industrial nations with productivity rates far exceeding those of their nearest rivals. They are also hit by less strikes and disputes. The fashionable phrase in these countries has become 'the firm that plays together, stays together' as the firms organise constant picnics and trips to swimming baths etc. Most Germans and Japanese attribute their success to the fact that the people who work at the firm stay together outside working hours.

The people who live in Totley display a wide variety of mixed abilities and it has been suggested to the Totley Independent that these abilities could be attractive to any potential employer. Are the people of Totley to be committed to subsidising a cheap fares policy which necessitates several hours boring travelling each week? Current Government thinking on business is that 'small is beautiful' and therefore is there not some sense in considering a reversal to the old need for people to be situated near their place of work. Local historical societies have recently highlighted many old crofts and industries which were indigenous to the area. Could there not be some return to this principle.

Following the German and Japanese examples, the people of Totley already play together and if foreign experience is anything to go by, such a scheme in Totley could be a success. Certain local people have suggested that the 'Made in Totley' scheme could only increase the community spirit and partly provide Totley with its own livelihood. We intend to write an article in the next issue setting out the case for this. Meanwhile, we'd like to know what you think. There are two sides to every story and in this case, some people like separation from their working colleagues when they get home. Before the next issue, we'd be pleased to receive letters expressing your views on the subject.

SHEFFIELD 'Champion of Champions' Dave Ruthven, has so far scored 180 out of a possible 189 points in the 1st Division of the Saturday Telegraph Cup. Dave, of Meadow Grove, is the bearded giant often to be seen pushing a pram round Greenoak Park and is a member of Greenoak 1st Team. 
