

ARE THEY THE HAPPIEST days of your life ? A school along with a church or a pub is one of the main focal points of any community. Mike Roberts of Totley Brook Road shows us here how All Saints School looked in 1933. How many memories does this bring back to former pupils ? Why not let us have your account of school in Totley, not only of this one but any school you may have attended locally ? We have already printed entries from the school log book and shall continue to do so, to help you relive these early classroom days. When the school held its centenary celebrations in January 1977 (just before the Independent first appeared), an excellent Victorian exhibition was held in the school. Amongst it many old photos connected with school life and former pupils were displayed, many having been loaned from local sources. We would very much like to trace some of these for future

use. Here is a short summary of this schools history in Totley. 1720 The Revd. Robert Turie gave $\pounds 40$ for the education of 6 of the poorest children of Dore & Totley. 1754 Lord Francis Middleton, Edmund Offley, Richard Bagshawe, Strelley Pegge, Alexander Barker, Robert Fisher & William Green gave land for the building of a Church School in Totley. 1827 The first Church School built by D'Ewes - Coke in Totley Hall Lane. 1877 First school building on present site. 1889 New classroom built. 1898 Infant classroom added. 1919 School used for Sunday worship. 1924 All Saints Church built. 1939 Another new classroom built.

1949 Two temp. classrooms built. 1965 New school built incorporating

old buildings.

1977 Centenary celebrated.

1980 Total 150 pupils.

215th SHEFFIELD (1st TOTLEY) SCOUT GROUP. News of the Headquarters situation is that an outline Planning Application has been made at Sheffield Town Hall for the erection of a single storey building on a site offered by the Local Authority in Totley. 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

BASLOW ROAD is busy and can be dangerous, particularly if you have to stand in the middle of it with a Lollipop Board ! Mr. & Mrs. Cook of Green Oak Road manned the crossing patrol for $8\frac{1}{2}$ yrs. between them, Mr. Cook, who died 8 yrs. ago, completed nearly 5 yrs, having taken over the duties from his wife. When the crossing supervisor visited to collect the uniform, he was most anxious that Mrs. Cook should once again take on the job, however she was obliged to turn down the request, although he gave her a six month period in which to re-think. One of the few occasions she recalls having not been on duty, was when she ended up with her leg in pot following an accident on the crossing. It was not until their spell of duty had finished that the patrol lights and signs were eventually erected on the were eventually erected on the Totley Grange side of Baslow Road. "I had been on at them for $8\frac{1}{2}$ yrs. I was paid 30 shillings for a 15 hour week", she recalls -"there's more pay to it these days-for shorter hours" she commented. "Totley has changed since those days. One thing that does annow me days. One thing that does annoy me is the parade of dogs, cyclists and horse riders who misuse the public footpath from the College down to Main Avenue. I really do think it's time that a sign or notice was erected along it to save the abuse and bad language you get when you point out that elderly people and children use it". She also pointed out how sorry she was to have missed the Senior Citizens Christmas Party at the College.

TUITION IN FRENCH

THE MILD SPELL in February really signalled the many animals and plants that Spring is on the way. The garden bulbs are well up and there are signs that the hibernating animals are seriously considering waking up. On the 17th of February, I found a Small Tortoiseshell butterfly in my garden. These beautiful insects hibernate in dry places, such as garages, garden sheds and occas-ionally bedrooms. The slow-worms I brought back from Dorset last year, have hibernated well and seem to be surviving the winter well. I placed them in an old aquarium with about ten inches of dead leaves. They fed well in Autumn on earth worms and slugs and when the first few sharp frosts occurred, they disapp-eared into the leaves. The aquarium was placed in the greenhouse, which became very cold on occasions but remained quite dry. The first emerged last week and basked in the watery sunshine. I put some worms in to top up the food supply and had a brief look at the other slow-worms. They seemed quite well, but were very torpid, with their eyes tight shut. I shall watch them very closely to note any other awakenings. The illustration above shows an adult female. The female retains the dark sides of the young slowworm, whilst the male becomes much more uniform in colour. When the full company of eleven awakes, after a brief period of feasting, then the courtship and subsequent mating should take place. The males often fight at this time and can cause damage to each others scales but rarely do any more serious injury. I

hope to return my little group back to their home in Dorset this Whitsuntide, when I go back on holiday. There they will be free again to run the gamut of their natural enemies, the Hedgehogs, Grass Snakes and Adders, but hopefully survive a little longer. They have survived the northern winter quite well and have provided an introduction to reptiles to a great many schoolchildren who would otherwise never have seen or touched any at all.

LETTERS GREEN OAK. DISTRICT HEATING SCHEME

Dear Alan (Jockel), Following our conversation the other day, I spoke to our heating engineer regarding your queries about the heating at Totley and he informs me that:-

1. The heating is on from 6.30am. to 11.30pm. approximately (17 hours per day although if it is a particularlarly cold night the heating is on all night).

2. The only method of controlling heating within the flats is an on/ off valve in each room, so it is a case of all or nothing. 3. The heating should not be inconsistent within the blocks and if there is a fault, if we

could be notified we will look into it. 4. The temperatures are 70° in old persons flats and 68° in houses.

The following two letters have been sent: Mr. Griffiths, South Yorkshire Transport, Exchange Street, Sheffield 2. 5th February 1980.

Dear Sir,

Service No. 746 - King Ecgbert School to Totley.

As you know, we have one bus in the morning and one in the evening on this route and we have had three criticisms of the service from parents of pupils at the school and shall be grateful if you will look at these and let us have your comments. Before continuing we must say how much this service is appreciated and we feel it provides an essential link between the two areas.

1. On occasions the bus does not arrive to operate the service. We appreciate the problems of meeting all demands for vehicles in the rush hours but, in the afternoon, could your despatching officer ring the school if a bus is not available at, say 3. 30pm. to reach the school for 4.05pm ? If this information could be given before, say 3.45pm. notices will be put up in the Lower and Upper Schools to warn that the Totley bus will not be running. (The school has agreed to do this). This would avoid unnecessary trailing about in bad weather. In fact at any time as they always seem to be carrying loads of books ! 2. Sometimes a single decker bus arrives and this does not accom modate all the potential passengers. This throws us back to children catching the No. 17 to the main Abbeydale Road South and crossing to get the No.24 to Totley, or walking. This is a very dangerous road, with a warden on duty in the morning but not in the evening. The alternative walking routes via Totley Grove and Oldhay Lane and via Grove Walk on Ackley Bank to Heatherfield are not to be recommended, especially for the younger children and certainly not for any age in bad weather and on dark evenings.

3. The bus seems to leave the terminus shortly after 4.05pm. and this does not leave sufficient time after the 4.05 finishing bells for the pupils to collect books, coats etc. and cover the distance from the Upper and Lowers Schools. In fact children may get the impression the bus has not run because it has left before they can get to the terminus. What is the official time for leaving the terminus ? Say 4.15pm. may be a realistic time. After leaving the terminus could the bus stop at the Upper School exit in Furniss Avenue to cut the time taken getting to the terminus ?

These observations have already been raised with the office usually by telephone - both by the Parent Governors and by individual parents - and we understand the problems are to be raised officially at the next Governors meeting to be held on the 26th February. I have also discussed the situation with Counc. D. George and at his suggestion, I am writing to you on behalf of the members of the Association. We look forward to hearing your comments, which will be passed

YOUTH FACILITIES IN THE TOTLEY AREA - AN URGENT PLEA

1. For some time there has been concern in the Totley area and areas adjacent) at the inadequate provision of youth and community facilities in the neighbourhood. Under the leadership of the Revd. Duncan Wilson, a group of concerned people did some research on this matter, the results of which were presented to the Youth and Community Sub-Committee of the Education Department late in 1978. 2. At the meeting at which these findings were reported, it was admitted by the officers concerned that the area was under-provided and supported. With the full co-operation and support of the local advisor, a short-term research project was initiated by the Education Sub-Comm ittee concerned and Mr. Sid Stones was seconded for that purpose. 3. Mr. Stones' report is now in front of the Committee. Contacts we have had with him leave us in no doubt that he accepts that there is the under-provision we have claimed and which had already been acknowledged Vicar of Totley in principle. This confirmation will, we hope, lead to recommendations that will at least begin to improve the present situation. 4. BUT - and this is what makes the present situation itself at risk

there is a proposal to reduce the present facilities by the sale of land which houses one of the main facilities for the young people in Totley !! It is this which gives the whole of our local community great concern, and which is the subject of a strong expression of concern on the part of All Saints' Church Council. 5. The Scout Hut in Totley Hall Lane has been in existence for many years. The Group has a long and honourable history. The Hut stands on land in the owbership of the Estates Department.

6. In the interests of government policy and local authority finance, it is now actively being proposed and pursued that this small area of land should be sold and the Scout Group occupancy terminated. To do this will be to remove a facility that has always been well

used and is at the moment a most flourishing headquarters of a Group with meetings taking place at least on four nights a week (and frequently more) and catering for over 100 boys. This represents a very considerable proportion of the boys in the area and a very considerable proportion of the voluntary effort by the community to provide facilities not otherwise available.

8. When it is accepted on the one hand that the facilities in this area are inadequate, it seems to most of us in this local community that to be invited to acquiesce in giving up one of the most important facilities we provide and possess is intolerable. 9. I therefore ask, as a matter of urgent local concern, that all steps be taken to rescind any decision to dispose of the land in Totley Hall Lane on which the present Scout Headquarters stands; that every step be taken to prevent a reduction in the facilities offered to youth in this area until it has been possible to give proper consider-ation to Mr. Stones' report and that those to whom this memo is sent use their good offices to support the Scouts and the local community in maintaining this important work and opposing any decisions that are harmful to it.

Ed. Note. The following points have also been received in connection with local bus services. Mr. Campey of Bank View Farm suggests that the Bakewell bus should set down passengers at Lane Head Road, to help people living in Totley Bents. Mrs. Cook of Green Oak Road suggests that buses seem to wait at the Totley terminus until the last minute, then proceed down Baslow Road so quickly that they occasionally 'forget ' to pick up people at Main Avenue. She also wonders why, when there appears to be a general shortage of buses, it is always the No. 24 that suffers far more than the No. 17.

Amongst several suggestions offered by Harry Woffinden of Green Oak Drive is one that the limited stop should be reintroduced, particularly on the outward journey setting passengers down at Beauchief (Sherwood Glen).

PETS CORNER


THERE HAS BEEN a lot of publicity on radio and television lately about a "killer virus" sweeping through Britain's canine population. There seems to have been some hysteria in these stories. This particular virus only affects puppies in the vast majority of cases, making them severely ill with vomiting and diarrhoea. There is a vaccine available for use on small puppies. It is the vaccine used to protect cats from feline enteritis and costs something in the region of £10-£12. In view of its high cost and the still comparative rarity of this disease, although there have been a few local Totley cases, it is probably only worth giving to valuable or pedigree dogs. There seems a likel hood that in the near future this vaccine will be incorporated into the 'triple' in general use. This is the vaccine against distemper, hardpad and leptospirosis. So, in short, don't worry. It is quite rare, But please do not let small puppies who have not completed a course of vaccine sniff round lamp posts and mix with other dogs.

SPORT

TOTLEY CUBS FOOTBALL Playing record to date:-Played 13. Won 4. Drawn 1. Lost 8. Goals For - 27 Goals Against - 40

A season of mixed fortunes for the Cubs' football team. A promising start with three wins and a draw in the first five matches, was followed by a run of eight consecutive defeats, including a first round exit from the Cup Competition on the wrong end of a 5:1 scoreline against Jordanthorpe, two late goals flattering the home side and a poor reward to Totley for some skilful play against a side who were physically far superior. The New Year has been something of a revival in our fortunes, however, with a 2:0 league win against St. Paul's, with goals from Mark Pilgrim and Bradley Fairhead. A friendly match against Dore Cubs gave us our second win of 1980. The score was 3:2 with goals from Ashley Turner, Jonathan Waite and Mark Pilgrim, the last two were both marvellous individual efforts (and the T.V. cameras chose Hillsborough instead). Totley produced fine constructive football on a slippery treacherous surface and the scoreline did not reflect their supremacy. The quality of football even impressed the ex World Cup referee, George McCabe, who was on the buchline.

TOTLEY UNDER 16 continued their winning streak on 17th February when' they played away against Lowedges, a team who had beaten us on every single occasion for about six years. Earlier this season they had beaten Totley 7-1 to establish themselves at the top of Division 2. Nick Broomhead won the toss and elected to kick against the wind and the slope so that for much of the first half, Totley were under considerable pressure. Just before half time, a lapse in concentrat ion by the defence resulted in an easy goal for Lowedges. Soon after the interval, Mike Campbell made another of his fine runs to equalise and then, after Lowedges had failed to penetrate the Totley defence on several occasions, a well struck high shot beat Gary Scott. He wasn't to be beaten again, making several difficult saves. The home team's right winger had been our bogey man for seasons past but this time, a rapidly improving, yet injured Paul Hoban

refused to yield. All attempts to force a way through the middle were met by a solid wall of orange shirts with new signing John Wardle from Dore dominating the play in his own half, Steve Edwards, straight from his early morning milk round, ran himself into the ground trying to keep out one of the best ball players in the league and an injured Martin Scriven refused to allow his form to drop.

Paul Kirkup found his skill in the second half giving Totley a strong mid-field trio and finally sending Mike Campbell away on another audacious dribble right through the middle of the Lowedges defence, skillfully avoiding dangerous tackles and leaving the floor littered with opponents to slot in the equaliser. A similar solo effort, shortly after. produced his hat trick but only after being brought down with a wicked tackle which injured his knee. By now, Totley had four cripples and a flu-bound substitute but gave a magnificent performance to stem the onslaught that followed. The referee, who had allowed the first half to run well over time, now let the second half continue despite signals from both linesmen. Every Lowedges attack was beaten down before an awkward bounce, nothing more, resulted in a very curious penalty decision. The kick was not struck well and the in-form Scott saved it easily - the penalty had been taken just eight minutes over time. A charitable opinion would no doubt be that the referees watch was faulty but the penalty miss was fair justice. Lowedges had played well and would have deserved an equaliser had Totley given them half a chance. Both managers agreed that the difference between the two was that Totley wanted the ball all the time and spared no effort to get there first.
