




## BRINKBURN GRANGE

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

IN KEEPING WITH the delightful weather of the last month, our subjects this month are the real sign to me that summer approaches rapidly. The Swallow, Swift and House Martin are summer visitors, spending the remainder of their time in the African continent. The house martin is very common in the Totley area although its nearest relation the sandmartin is seen only passing through there are no suitable nesting sites locally. The house martin prefers to nest under the eaves of houses and builds a very solid nest of mud mixed with saliva. In flight it can be distinguished from the swallow by the less deeply forked tail, distinct white rump and underside and smaller size. The flight is also less fluent and dashing. The swallow is probably the most loved of the trio yet it is the one which must find the choosing of a nest site most difficult. It nests on roof supports and beams usually inside a building. The old stone bams were ideal but newer buildings and building materials are making these traditional sites more and more difficult to find. The flight is fast and easy on the eye, with graceful glides. It rarely settles on the ground or in trees, preferring telegraph wires and buildinas. The distinguishing features of the adult are the tail streamers, giving a deeply forked effect, the blue-black upperside plumage and the chestnut bib. My favourite is the swift. Its screaming giddy flight is a reminder that summer is very near. The birds seem to play games as they dash around the houses in their mad chases. The plumage is blackish brown with a whitish throat and the wings are proportionately larger and more curved than those of the house martin or swallow. The nest sites are

DRW as those of the house martin, although cliffs will sometimes be used. Surprisingly only the house martin and swallow are related. The swift belongs to an entirely different family. All three spend more time in flight than they do perched or resting, which may account for their habitat being described as 'aerial'. They are insectivorous, which accounts for their absence in winter, since there are practically no flying insects then. Their beaks are very short but have an aston-ishingly wide gape, so that flies, moths

They walk very badly, the swift can almost be said to be unable to walk. All three make the journey south in Autumn and the survivors mysteriously can navigate and remember so well that they will turn up at the same nesting site for year after year. Anyone finding a nestling may be able to rear it but will find it a very demanding job. (Please don't bring them to me !) I know of one very dedicated young man who reared a foundling swift and watched it successfully fly off but he was both single-minded and a little lucky. What did surprise me was the weight and solidity of a swift and the almost talon-like claws. One final thought - all three birds are inextricably linked with man's buildings at the moment. Where did they nest two thousand years ago?

#### LETTER

#### POYNTON WOOD

I enclose for your information, a copy of a a letter which I have sent to the Environmental Health Dept., and which is selfexplanatory. Whether any response will be forthcoming remains to be seen but at least I have made my protest. I don't know whether the T.R.A. extends its interests as far as Poynton Wood but I felt it might be of interest since I know a lot of Totley residents, like myself regularly walk their dogs through there.

I should like to draw to your attention the shameful state of Poynton Woods, Totley, for several hundred yards below the private building development of George Longden. This formerly beautiful area has been reduced to nothing better than a tip for everything from builder's materials to cardboard packing cases, polythene bags and at least one 25 gallon drum. Whilst I am aware that to some extent this is due to children, I do feel that Longdens are not entirely blameless, as during their building operations a large quantity of material has been left readily available on the boundary of the site abutting the woods and from my observations, no attempts at reclamation have been made. Although recognising that a certain amount of litter is unavoidable I feel that when it reaches these proportions in such surroundings, someone in authority should take steps to have it removed. I consider myself fortunate to be living in a rural environment and it not only grieves me but also makes me furious to see it slowly deteriorating through being abused, continually vandalised and neglected. If you will be good enough to inspect the area in question, I am sure you will agree that I am not exaggerating and sincerely hope that you will consider taking steps to rectify the situation. Since Sheffield is rightly proud of its 'Golden Frame' it should not be allowed, in my opinion, to become 'tamished' beyond redemption.

WITH TEN NAMED PRINCIPALS, a total chorus exceeding 30, an orchestra of 19, (generously sprinkled with very young, confident faces), fine scenery and costumes plus an army of back stage, front of house and production help, this all added up to the splendour of first class 'suburban theatre' and the audience went OVERBOARD for it. The ticket price of £1 (slightly higher than at other local shows), was fully justified by the end of the evening. The excellence of the principals was well complemented by the dynamics of the chorus and orchestra. Even the printed programme was comprehensive enough to keep many reading well into the overture! It is certain that the few empty seats would fill up if the hall were more easily accessible to the surrounding areas, for those who do not have their own transport or if more were willing to take advantage of seeing Gilbert and Sullivan superbly performed on their own doorstep, for you didn't have to be a fanatic to have enjoyed this performance. The whistling of familiar melodies as the audience made their way home up the drive would surely have pleased Mr. G. and Mr. S., even if some of the crowd were wearing jeans; a sight in complete contrast, no doubt, to when the work was first performed 100 years ago.

The Society tell us that ticket sales were satisfactory for all five shows and they will be celebrating their tenth anniversary in October with an autumn show on a historical theme. It is hoped to invite past members to a social evening. New members to the society are always welcome and in particular tenors and basses. The production next year is likely to be 'Utopia'.

YOU COULD HAVE GONE over 200 miles to Londons West End to see 'OLIVER', where it is once again, playing to packed houses. But you wouldn't have seen any finer a performance than the one staged by the staff and pupils of King Ecgbert School. The storyline and continuous string of hit songs are so familiar that it would have been easy to rely on these and weave the show around them. This was the last thing that happened. Instead a full scale production was launched, that would not have been out of place in any theatre. (Ideal for the Lyceum). For it was convincing and slick. ## rowan school

THIS SCHOOL CATERS for the needs of children who experience specific learning difficulties in those areas of basic literacy, numeracy and communication so necessary to take advantage of ordinary mainstream education. Children are referred to the school for periods between one term and two years to receive intensive, specialised remediation in order to reintegrate them in as short a time as possible. As well as covering the basic skills of language, literacy and numeracy, the staff try to give the children the same educational and social opportunities as they would be likely to get in any other primary school in Sheffield, Because they feel it will be a valuable and enjoyable experience, the staff are taking a group of juniors on an outdoor activities holiday in Northumbria during the Whit half-term break. In July the whole school will be involved in an environmental studies week based at the Whitely Woods Girl Guides Centre. Many of the staff and children will be staying there for the week and others will be bussed out day by day to work in and around the area. In order to raise money for these ventures and also to build up a fund to replace their mini bus, the staff, governors and parents are holding a Summer Fair at the school on Saturday, June 28th starting at 2.00 pm. It is hoped that a local celebrity will be opening the fair. There will be many attractions, side shows, stalls, displays etc. Sheffield Sword Club will give a demonstration of fencing with foil, epee and sabre, also the Handsworth Traditional Sword Team will give a display of sword and morris dancing. The school is hoping that the public will be equally generous in their support.
