AT ABOUT 9.30 am. on Monday 29th September 1980, there were several local panics as the bulldozer started clearing operations for the new approach road to the Tarmac Estate, for it seemed to onlookers that the Totley Hall Lane well, was being demolished and would be lost under a pile of rubble, for ever. A telephone call to Tarmacs Headquarters in Rotherham was answered by Mr. Hawkins of their Legal Department, who assured us that the situation was in hand and had been accounted for. The only worry seemed to be, whether or not the drivers had been informed. Mr. Hawkins went on to tell us that they had and that the well would be re-sited on phase two, after piece by piece dismantling. Further more, that the plans were in front of him showing the relocation. A word of thanks should also be given to the Site Drivers for their understanding and co-operation. Stan Bingham Chairman of T.A.D.E.S. (Totley and District Envoronment Society) informs us that the components of the well are now located (and are to be protected) at the rear of the Fleur De Lys but will shortly be transported to the 'Pinfold', across the way in Hillfoot Road, where they can be stored safely until rebuilding takes place. THE VIEW of (Totley) HALL LANE featured on the cover is probably from around the turn of the century. Toft House pictured on the left is easily recognised and still remains. The centre building was Marshalls Cottage with the Cobblers Shop next door down the lane. The building on the right was the Coffin Shop. In 1899 George Green was the Landlord of the nearby original Fleur De Lys and James Green (featured in issue number 28) is listed as a joiner/shopkeeper. Harry Green, who was Landlord of the present Fleur De Lys during the 1950s, had spent his younger days in Totley as a coffin maker and by all accounts had a rather splendid set of photos depicting this occupation. It would be interesting to hear of details of owners and uses of this building. Further down the lane can be seen the group of three cottages that are currently in need of both restoration and an owner. Given a little thought, it is surprising how much this small area has been the subject of many changes during living memory. It is more usually the case to read how little village lanes change over a long period of time. This particular locality is now due for perhaps its most significant change, since the building of the College Complex around Totley Hall, now that building work has started for the new estate being created by Tarmac Homes, at the rear of the Fleur De Lys. The drawing, by Eric Hardcastle of Stonecroft Road, was taken from a small oil painting, kindly loaned by Roy Green of Dore and is near to the site of the Old Well. Eric, who has been drawing for his own pleasure for a number of years, has usually concentrated on the more typical Derbyshire scenes and his holiday memories. This is his first drawing for the Independent and of Totley.

MAKING THE EFFORT

THOSE RESPONSIBLE FOR starting the ball rolling on the topic of local unemployment are to be congratulated for at least opening up the subject for examination. At the meeting held at Green Oak View Day Centre on Friday October 24th noone from amongst the small group, knew quite what to expect of or from such a meeting and perhaps this explained the reluctance of others to attend. The subject of unemployment, redundancies and possible solutions is complicated and this first meeting, in accepting this point, only touched lightly on possibilities of forming a co-operative, starting a local company or opportunities arising from Manpower Services. In fact, what would have allowed the evening to progress further, would have been the participation of more local UNEMPLOYED people. It does seem that there are things that can be done by united action but the emphasis must be put on more people coming together to sound things out. The ideas and suggestions that were put forward will be researched and surveyed in time for the next meeting on Friday November 21st. at 7. 30 pm. (see diary). In the meantime, please inform anyone (talk to your neighbours and friends!) who is currently or about to be out of work, to make the effort to attend - it could be in their interest and lead to employment. Only 26 people made the effort to attend the Pea and Pie Supper held on Wednesday 22nd October. All enjoyed themselves, the food was excellent and the slide show provided by Brian Edwards was good entertainment. People like to associate themselves with a base and this the T.R.A. doesn't have, is this the reason for lack of support to events organised recently? Other local associations continue to enjoy good support where they have a home ground on which to play. Is there any need to look further for the answer?

OUTSIDE INFLUENCE

THE MUSIC, singing and dancing licence was refused renewal, when it expired at the end of October, at the Fleur De Lys Disco, by city licensing magistrates on Tuesday 21st October. Local residents appeared in person to object and also presented a 127 signature petition. This concluded several months

of complaints of a varied nature. The major disturbances would appear to have been caused by non-locals, one group in particular, a classic case of a minority spoiling things for the majority, for no doubt this amenity was enjoyed in a proper manner by others using it. Compromise, although sometimes an obvious solution, can be difficult to administer particularly where householders in a residential area should be able to enjoy a reasonable level of peace and quiet and their opinions taken into account when their lifestyle is affected. The other point to arise is that this is a loss of a facility in an area that does not boast many others.

An attack with a crossbow, during an incident outside the Cross Saythes in Baslow Road, was surely the most serious and disturbing event to happen in Totley. Once again, it was a visitor to the area who introduced this element of the utmost concern. A local youth received a shoulder injury as a result of a bolt being fired.

The loss of another facility is also causing problems at the moment. For the past few weeks the Friday night training sessions at the College Gym have been unavailable to local youngsters due to college staff using it for badminton sessions. This two hour session forms such a small part of the weekly availability and yet plays such a large part to the sixty or so lads. This situation needs to be resolved as quickly as possible as there is no alternative accomodation available and why should something which has run smoothly under strict adult supervision suddenly come to a halt, when it has become a much needed necessity.





THIS YEAR HAS once again seen a marvellous crop of fungi in our fields and local woods. Each year, I go out and search for a few of the more tasty species to eat – an operation which usually

horrifies some of my friends. I have been eating fungi other than the mushroom for many years and as I am still in good health, my identification must have been reasonable. The secret is to keep to the easily identified and totally ignore those which may be confused with poisonous fungi. The toadstool above is reportedly good to eat and I have eaten it on a few occasions with no ill-effects whatsoever, but it very closely resembles another quite poisonous species, the Panther Cap. This family of toadstools is, in my opinion, best left completely alone, since it contains some of the most poisonous fungi known, a few of which cause an almost certain lingering death. The family is easily recognised by the presence of a bag around the base of the stalk (some times reduced to a couple of rings - as in the illustration), white gills (the flat plates beneath the cap) and usually a distinct ring around the stalk. It is safest to stick to the collecting of easily distinquished fungi, but even then, it is wisest to pick the brains of an expert until you are absolutely sure of the identification features. The simplest way to get at the experts is to join a natural history society where contacting these people is very easy. As a final comment, please don't believe old wives' tales about methods of determining a toadstool's edibility - none of them works satisfactorily with the deadliest of our funai, the Death Cap, so be warned!

WAR MEMORIAL

It was with interest that I read of the efforts of the T.R.A. to complete the names of those who gave their lives in the two World Wars. I did not come to Sheffield from Peterborough until 1920 so do not know much about Totley at the time of the first war. I notice one name is missing from the list of the Second War -William (Billy) Foulstone of Main Avenue who was serving in the Far East with the West Yorkshire Regiment and died of wounds. He was buried in Assam. His grave was visited and photographed by my son, Flying Officer Guy Sneath R.A.F.V.R. who was serving in Burma at the time and was able to fly to see Billy but unfortunately he had already died. Photographs were sent by Guy to Billys grandfather, Mr. A. Foulstone and his aunt Mrs. Lake of Main Avenue - so another name can be added to the list.

BUS PROBLEMS RIP OFF

ROUTE 746 to King Ecgbert School. There should now be TWO buses serving this route for local school children on both the morning service to school and the afternoon service from school. There have been several problems experienced on this route including children being left at bus stops because of full buses, occasionally buses not running at all and also only single deckers being available. These problems have been taken up by individual parents, the School Governors and T.R.A. South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive say the extra buses should solve the problem but they had not been informed of the extra children who were now using this service. As the nights, once again, get darker the seasonal concern arises over children having to walk fair distances home alone.

ROUTE 24

There are numerous complaints about the main service, mostly in connection with the peak periods throughout the day, particularly as the college students are again in residence and have need to travel to both Pond Street and Collegiate Crescent, as a result of a change in use of courses being held at the Totley Site. The method that common sense suggests in tackling this problem is a joint effort by both the T.R.A. and the Site Council of the Poly (Totley College) and this is in fact being done; as the College can obviously best supply details of student movement during the peak periods (morning, afternoon and evening) to the S.Y.P.T.E.

EXPLOSIVE

SITUATION

THE RECENT SERIES of articles in "The Star" on "The Bomb and You" probably shocked many people into fuller awareness of the horrendous nature of nuclear war and what it would mean for them. A 3-megaton bomb on Sheffield for example, would kill 130,000 outright, with another 80,000 or more trapped and injured. Thousands more would die within a few weeks from radiation. Any survivors (if poisoned atmosphere, crops and water supply allowed survival) would experience such long-term effects as cancer, stunted growth and either sterility or genetic deviations. The average family in Britain pays almost £15 a week for arms in taxes. The world spends about thirty million pounds an hour on military forces and weapons. The biggest obstacle to world development - the fight against poverty, hunger, disease and ignorance is the ever increasing expenditure on armaments. Can ordinary people in Totley do anything about it? Perhaps not much as individuals but joined with others, they could. President Eisenhower predicted one day the demand by the ordinary people of the world for disarmament would become so universal and so insistent that no nation, no government, would be able to withstand it. That is also the hope of the supporters of the World Disarmament Campaign, which aims to put massive pressure on governments prior to the U.N. Special Disarmament Assembly in 1982. In Britain, the movement has the support of all the Churches and Members of all political parties. An increasing number of local action groups are being formed.

A meeting is to be held in Totley on Tuesday November 18th at 8 pm. at Totley Rise Methodist, sponsored by the local Christian Council and U.N.A. for information, discussion and perhaps further action. A short film "ATTENTION" will be shown and the speaker, (coming specially from London), will be Mgr. Bruce Kent, who appeared in a recent nuclear arms debate on 'Panorama'. Totley may be a pleasant, peaceful place to live but it is part of a world that is closer than it has ever been to total self-destruction. Whether or not you believe that the alternatives are World Disarmament or World Death, come to the meeting, for the matter demands your ATTENTION !
