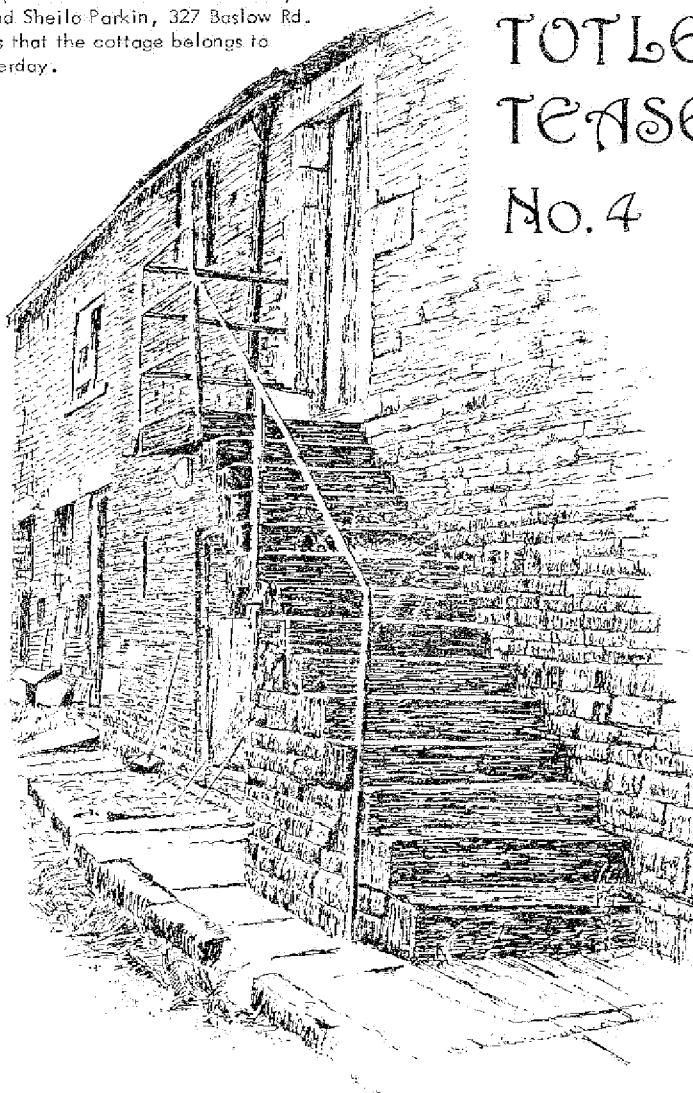

AT FIRST GLANCE and maybe to the outsider, Totley could be the sort of place where very little happens. As readers of this magazine will be aware, that is by no means the case. The Groups, Clubs and Associations based in the Totley district are highly active, generally well supported and give service, pleasure and entertainment to many grateful people. There are many ways to view the relevance of these 'pockets of activity' but the general census of opinion would appear to be that Community Premises, available to all, are desirable, if at the moment, not immediately possible. There are also many people who do not belong to any particular organisation but would still like to join less specific and maybe more social outlets but, to date, this opportunity does not exist. Is there any other area the size of Totley that lacks such a provision? Perhaps a Community Centre project could give the incentive and ambition required to bring more people out of isolation. Chapelton, across the City, has recently seen the opening of its new £50,000 Community Centre. A quarter of this total was raised by locals themselves, over a 3 year period. Perhaps herein lies the message. If anything is to be possible in Totley, then we ourselves must take the initiative.

BASLOW ROAD

Dear Sir,

As a regular user of the Baslow Road I have always adhered to a 40 m.p.h. limit. I was concerned to read in the Totley Independent (May issue) of my error and checked the speed restriction signs. Yes, there is one pair of 30 m.p.h. signs, (Dore Road/Station) which I have never consciously registered but not one single reminder all the way along Baslow Road. Compare this to the earlier stretch of Abbeydale Rd. South where I counted no less than 24 signs, on virtually every other lamp standard, reminding motorists of a 40 m.p.h. restriction. Surely 30 m.p.h. reminders along Baslow Road would cost little and be effective in making motorists aware of the restriction - or am I cynical in thinking this is no mere oversight but a way of being able to change to a 40 m.p.h. speed without too much public awareness.

ROWAN SCHOOL SUMMER FAIR
11th JULY 1981.

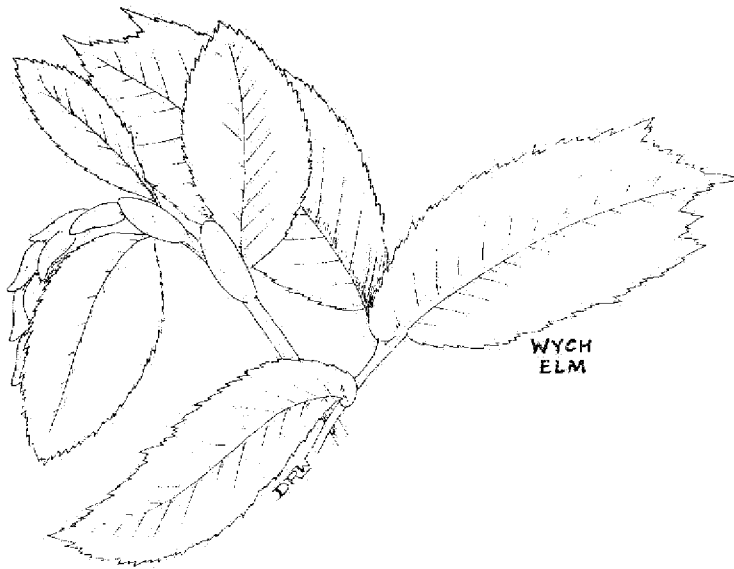
The Rowan is a special school catering for the needs of those children who experience specific learning difficulties in the areas of basic literacy; numeracy and communication skills so necessary in main-stream education. The children are referred to the school for periods between one term and two years to receive intensive, specialised remediation in order to reintegrate them in as short a time as possible.

Because we are essentially a small school with very small instruction groups, our capitation is proportionally limited. Consequently we rely heavily on our School Fund to subsidise those activities not directly related to our reintegration programme, but which are so important in the full educational development of these children. The School Fund is a private account raised by donation and fund raising activities organised by the Governors, staff and parents. It assists in financing the running and replacement of our mini-bus, provision of outside play facilities and the subsidising of extra-curricula activities such as holidays and camps.

The major event this year is our Annual Summer Fair which is to be held on the school grounds at Durvale Court, just off Furniss Avenue on Saturday 11th July at 2 pm. There will be many attractions including side-shows, stalls and displays. Local firms, shops and businesses have been very generous in donating prizes and goods for sale, but the school is hoping that the general public will be equally generous in their support by coming along and enjoying the many activities available.

THE SUBJECT of my last article was our stretch of local woodland - Gillfield, and I thought I would carry on with the same theme this month. A game I often play with my children and sometimes unwilling friends, is identifying the trees as we walk along. I suppose that a variation of this would be to 'hunt the tree' in an area as large as a wood. So, for those who have the time to stroll through Gillfield on a sunny afternoon (not many of those recently), here are one or two trees to look for, and a little about them.

The first is the Hornbeam. There are not very many of these trees in Gillfield, but they are quite interesting because they are not strictly native to this region. Their true home is thought to be the south of England and they are present only because in the past their wood was of value to the community. The tree is somewhat unusual in that it has the hardest wood of any of our native trees, and before the advent of fairly modern and easily malleable materials, Hornbeam was an essential wood to have to hand in a village community. None of our local Hornbeams is a particularly large tree, but they are all a moderate size and quite near the stream. The only tree that they can be confused with is the Beech, because the leaves bear a superficial resemblance, having straight veins and a fresh green colour in spring. The fruit is quite different being a small fruit set in a leafy bract, quite easily distinguished from the familiar beech-nut. The leaves themselves have serrated edges, which again is an easy clue to the tree's identity. ◆

◆ The second tree to find is the Wych Elm. This is a quite distinctive tree with very rough leaves which can grow to a good size. Apart from the very distinct roughness, a most peculiar feature is that the two halves of the leaf are unequal. Where the two parts of the leaf meet at the stalk, one is always noticeably longer than the other - so much so that it may hide the stalk altogether. The Wych Elms in Gillfield are to be found mainly along the northern edge of the wood, and have reached a quite reasonable size. It may be deduced from this that they are residents of the wood of many years standing, having escaped the felling of the last war.

The most unusual Elm in the vicinity is the Weeping Elm which is growing at the top of Main Avenue. This is a variety which is uncommon in the district, and is matched locally only by the splendid Weeping Ash in the grounds of Abbeydale Hall.

In conclusion, it is very pleasant to once again welcome back our Swifts, Swallows and Martins, and to see them threading their way so skillfully between the thunderstorms!

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TOTLEY COMMUNITY ENTERPRISES

COMMUNITY ENTERPRISE PROGRAMME

Progress report on the meeting held at 37 Sunnyvale Road on Wednesday 13th May.

Three points had been raised at the previous meeting and the present position of these were :-

1. Rebuilding of the Scout Hut. This still awaits the decision of the Scout Group with regard to the location of the new building. However, it has been agreed that the Community Enterprise Programme will be involved in the project. In this connection, it would be useful to know what trades, skills etc are available in the district amongst the unemployed.

2. It now appears that the Council will deal with the draining of the Church School Funds. However, there may be work available in the re-development of the school entrance, making a new entrance from Summer Lane.

3. The South Yorkshire County Council building suggested at Beauchief is being retained by the Municipal Authorities and no useful purpose will be served in following this enquiry.

Other items discussed included :-

A query as to what the Community needs are, as to Meeting Halls for the various groups which flourish in the district.

With more suitable accommodation available, additional interests might be catered for. Meetings are presently held in scattered premises in the area. (See Totley Forum article).

There still remains, unoccupied, the 3 listed cottages in Hall Lane and the Barn behind the Fleur de Lys, where the roof has been removed but work seems at a standstill. There is a possibility that either could be used for Community purposes. There was a suggestion that the Barn, on renovation, could be used as a Gift shop/Cafe. The latter should be an attractive proposition.

The district attracts visitors, ramblers, cyclists etc, and no cafe facilities exist, the popular day being Sunday. The existence of a Nature Trail would be useful to visitors. ▶

▶ The programme might interest itself in local projects such as the tidying of Baslow Road in the region of the War Memorial, where the wall and overhanging vegetation are in a deplorable condition.

Has anyone any other ideas or would like to come forward to join this group, if so, you are welcome to attend the next meeting at 37 Sunnyvale Road, on Wednesday 17th June at 8pm, when Mr. P. Moss will be invited to give the views of the Manpower Services Commission.

BUSINESS ENTERPRISE

Further meetings of all interested parties took place on Thursday evenings 7th and 14th May.

The group have now styled themselves - 'TOTLEY INDUSTRIES' and further progress towards forming a co-ownership manufacturing unit was made. The spade work carried out by Robin Carter is now being pursued in greater detail and the group hope to have something positive to report in due course.

LORD ARTHUR SANDLE'S CRIME.

THE PLOT of this play, based on a story by Oscar Wilde, certainly stood the test of time and it contained many witty and well constructed lines, well worthy of him. In a perfect piece of casting, Peter Long, as Baileys to Jeeves of a superb butler, led Lord Arthur (Trevor Wood) confidently and aristocratically through his blunderous attempts at committing a murder, aided by Anarchist, Herr Winkelkopf (Richard Nauen), who obviously enjoyed his 'German' part (even more so when his bomb bounced into the audience!)

A 'young' Michael Stills also did a good job with the 'old' Dean of Paddington. The parts taken by the ladies of the cast were very equally shared and of particular interest was the quality of their costumes and the frequent changes which helped establish the ongoing time scale. This play was one of their most enjoyable and professional, particularly so if you hadn't seen it before. Gerald Waite should feel pleased with his production.

BOOK COMPANIONS

WHILST THE Times Newspaper was on strike, journalist Rex Bellamy took the opportunity of turning one of his interests into a book. The 'Peak District Companion' is the result and who better to ask supply the photographs for it than his brother Don Bellamy of Green Oak Road, himself a Peak District enthusiast. Don's involvement started from a phone call in October 1978 and followed with a letter in February 1979. Between this last date and the summer of 1980, Don took about 100 photographs, 30 of which are included in the book, although Don said that some of these were not necessarily the ones he would have picked had the choice been his. To obtain them, he covered between 15 - 20 miles a day, which meant hard work, sore feet and an aching back! The book, published by David and Charles @ £7.95, went on sale from the 1st May, to a good reception, for although it is a walkers guide to the Fells and Dales of the Peak District, it is also full of local history and many short facts, (including some items appearing in print for the first time, the result of recent research), which allows even the armchair reader to equip himself with background information, before visiting the places described. You can also read small sections of the book without losing track, for you would need to read several other books to obtain some of this books information. This is the first time that Don has been involved with a book and the fourth that Rex has had published. Two of his previous books were on Squash, the other on Tennis, a subject in which he is widely known and appreciated world wide, as a writer. Don told us he enjoyed the whole experience and the evidence is to be seen between the pages. It is, perhaps, ironic that as Don's work starts to go into print, our local Photographic Society, of which he was a member, should unfortunately come to an end.

HAZLEBARROW SCHOOL DINING CLUBS,
FOR JORDANTHORPE SENIOR CITIZENS.

Have you heard about these new clubs which Peter Furniss (the Community Worker at the Green Oak Drop-In) has started ?

Jordanthorpe Senior Citizens are invited to the local school for school dinners (2 course meal 55p) and can then stay on for games and social activities.

Dinners are served 4 days a week (no-one wanted to come on Fridays - just like in Totley everyone goes to town shopping !!) and each member can come for dinner once or twice a week.

60 senior citizens have joined the clubs in the first 3 weeks of opening and more are expected after the holidays.

This pilot project is a joint venture between the Education Dept., and Social Services Dept. If it is a success, the Council are interested in the idea being undertaken at other schools - so who knows, you Totley Senior Citizens may be back at school yet !

Note : Hazlebarrow School has falling numbers - less than 300 pupils in premises for 500, so that they can easily absorb their older visitors.

This may not be the case in all schools.

YOU CERTAINLY COME away from King Egbert School knowing you've had value for money, after seeing a Dore Gilbert and Sullivan Society evening, as they give their performance on a grand scale, on this occasion, almost 3 hours long but that's how Gilbert & Sullivan wrote it. With the ever increasing financial problems in the Theatre, (D'Oyly Carte amongst them at the moment), it may be that eventually the only way to see their lesser known works, will be when local groups have the courage to present them. The production was well staged, with good use made of the space available, sometimes bursting at the seams, with the full voiced chorus. There were equally good contributions from the many solos, which were both varied and entertaining.

What was unusual (and well received by the audience) was where the words lent themselves for alteration and addition to include topical and local references, almost in pantomime tradition.

This was enhanced in the second act by Peter Maxwell, as the King, bearing a striking, costumed resemblance to Peter Sellers. All the costumes, in fact, were excellent. Whilst sat enjoying such a show, aided by a well written programme, it is quite easy to overlook the generous sized orchestra, which should not happen as their first rate performance is an added bonus.

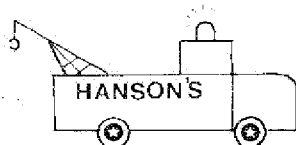
