TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING ACT 1971

NOTICE OF LOCAL INQUIRY

This notice is to inform you that Bass North Limited have applied to the Sheffield City Council for listed building consent in respect of the demolition of a barn on land situate at the Fleur De Lys Public House, Totley Hall Lane and Baslow Road, Sheffield.

The Council have refused the application for the following reasons:-

"The Council consider that the demolition of the building would have a seriously adverse effect on the character and appearance of the Totley Conservation Area".

Bass North Limited has appealed to the Secretary of State for the Environment against this refusal and the Secretary of State has directed that the appeal be dealt with by a local inquiry. As an occupier of nearby property or other interested party affected by the proposed development you may attend the inquiry which will be presided over by an Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State and at the Inspector's

discretion, give your views or may, if you cannot attend or have someone attend on your behalf, give your views in writing by writing to the Department of the Environment, Tollgate House, Houlton St., Bristol, BS2 9DJ, quoting reference APP/5098/E/82/071. Please note that views given in writing will be disclosed to the parties to the appeal and are liable to be read out at the inquiry. If written views are to be given these should if possible, be forwarded at least two weeks before the inquiry date. The Inquiry will be held on Tuesday 10th August, 1982, at 10.00a.m. in the Town Hall, Sheffield.

Re: P11 into demolition
of barn, Totley Hall Lane.

The attention of my Association has been drawn to the application from Bass North Limited in respect of the barn they wish to demolish situated at the floor De Lys Public House, Totley Hall Lane, which application the Sheffield City Council have refused.

My Association discussed this matter at a Committee Meeting held on 20th July, and it was resolved that a letter be sent to you supporting the refusal of the City Council to accede to this application.

The barn in question has been allowed to deteriorate over a period of time, and in spite of local anxiety as to its likely fate. Its position within the Totley Conservation Area is undisputed, and to permit its demolition would result in a further erosion of our local history.

Your reference on this matter is APP/5098/E/82/071. My Association does not wish to attend the P11, but trust that our resolution in support of our local Council's refusal of consent to demolish will be taken into consideration.

GREEN FIELDS

Field adjoining The
Elms, Old Hay Lane.

The attention of my Association has been drawn to an application by Messrs Maynard and Son, (state Agents, for the exclusion of a field adjoining The Elms on Old Hay Lane from the Green Belt.

To accede to this request would materially alter the situation in this area. Once this field is removed from the Green Belt, the adjoining fields would be obvious targets for similar development, and this would necessitate the widening and development of Old Hay Lane from its present rural aspect into a suburban highway.

My Association strongly opposes such a projected development, and supports the City Council in maintaining the proposed Green Belt boundary at this point, running round the northern boundaries of the present fields, and immediately behind the existing developments, and thus maintaining the present fields as fields, and Old Hay Lane in its present setting.

These matters were discussed at a Committee Meeting of my Association on 20th July, and I was instructed to write in these terms objecting most strongly to the proposal Messrs Maynards are making.

It was not possible to include the local population figures from the 1981 census as these are not now available until the end of August 1982. The figures submitted are approx five years old but a movement through the information still indicates that there would be little change. The figures shown below represent Totley/Totley Rise as a percentage proportionately distributed in the areas of the Dore Ward and as a matter of general interest, are worthy of inclusion.

ROAD SAFETY ACTION COMMITTEE

THE FOLLOWING is a copy of a letter sent to the Chief Officer, Planning Dept., Town Hall, Sheffield. The content is self explanatory. Together with this letter a petition was enclosed (arranged at very short notice) requesting that it should be presented to the committee concerned when the application is under consideration. At the time of going to print the shop in question is still up for sale.

Dear Sir,

I wish to register my objection to the planning application (82/2874P) for change of use whereby the shop known as "loadstools", 160 Baslow Road, Totley, could become a "take-away" food shop. As Chairman of the Totley Road Safety Committee I consider that it would constitute a serious hazard to road safety. Such an establishment already exists approx. 300 yds. away in the service road on Totley Rise where parking is adequately catered for and customers leaving the vicinity of the premises cannot move straight into a stream of traffic; at the proposed location they would have no option but to do just that. These establishments seem to attract most custom after the closure of public houses. In addition to traffic generated after 10.30pm. from our local pubs we also have people passing this location returning to the city from convivial evenings in Derbyshire, many of whom, I regret to say, grossly exceed the 30mph speed limit in operation on this stretch of road. There has been already, over the past few years, a number of accidents at this location at this time in the evening. I consider that such an establishment could be the cause of many more.

Residents in Totley, with the valued assistance of County and City councillors and officials are striving to make this stretch of Baslow Road safer. These strenuous efforts could be negated and a positive hazard created as customers pull out into the traffic stream. An adjoining "T" junction adds to the problem.

It would be appreciated if you would convey my objection to the relevant committee when the application is due to be considered.

CAMELOT



a musical by

Alan Jay Lerner & Frederick Loewe

WHAT AN encouraging scene! A stage full of youngsters enjoying themselves, suitably dressed in period costume, in a full-blooded musical. Camelot cannot be an easy task to perform. Firstly it is not regularly presented in amateur circles and secondly the storyline is not readily straightforward.

However, this occasion did not disappoint, the sheer size of a King Egbert production is always impressive, to say nothing of the "cast of thousands", talent portrayed on the stage. Warren James proved a good "Kingspin" as Arthur, Alan Lee treated us to the amusing character of King Pellinore, Virginia Page was an enchanting Guenevere (although somewhat quiet). Mention must also be made of Diane Athertons delightful off stage singing voice. It is the total production that makes this type of night; with items such as full set scenery scoring heavily and again the orchestra and the expertise of conductor David Meakin worthy of high praise.
