

TRANSPORT

Although the Transport 17 Minibus has been running for less than two years, it is in such demand that it is difficult to imagine how the community managed without it. The reality is that several extra luncheon clubs and aftermoon clubs have been able to open, using the bus to get their elderly members to the various halls.

To, cope with the increased running lime, additional manpower is being requested under the Community Programme to drive and accompany the bus. The organisers are even considering the possibility of buying a second bus to

cope with the demand. If a second bus could be bought without the assistance of "Help the Aged" it would be available to a wider range of community groups. Meanwhile the most orgent need on the transport front in To they is to help the Cheshire Home to raise money to buy a reolacement för their bus, but there is also a need to keep money flowing into the Transport 17 funds. GOLDEN WEDDING

On April 11th relatives and friends will be celebrating the Colden Wedding of a real Totley couple.

Ernest and Edith Pearson were married in 1936 at Totley All Saints' Church, Ernest was born at Shrewsbury Terrace in 1909, and Edith was born in one of the Summer Lane cottages in 1907.

Linest initially worked on his father's farm, Holt House Farm, on Long Line, Oure and after-wards at the Hallfields Farm on Strawberry Lea Lane (now the riding school).

After a number of years working as a driver at Totley Brick Works, he moved to Bookless Bros Garage at the bottom of Twentywell Lane. He was a popular figure on the forecourt for more than twenty years. His name hit the headlines in 1971, when he failed raiders at the garage.

Although beaten badly and threatened at knife point, he refused to part with the safe keys,

In his earlier years Ernest was a prominent sports participant and played both cricket and football for Totley. The football team of the late twenties and early thirties was a formidable out-fit and "Pullet" Pearson was a direct left winger of repute. Edith has devoted her time to the house they moved into on Lemont Road when they first married and where they still reside.

Their daughter Pamela and husband live at Dronfield and Edith now enjoys knitting for her two grand-daughters Tracey and Clare. So on April 11th, if the weather is right, you may spot Ernest and Edith taking their favourite walk through Gillfield woods.

ABBEYDALE HALL

The upper floor of Abbeydale Hall Adult Education Centre had to be closed off for safety reasons last month after an old age pensioner suffered an accident on the main stairway. Carotaker Eric Smith said the woman, who was leaving an evening class, stumbled on the stairs and hit her head. Soon after the incident, building inspectors checked the stairway and declared it unsafe. Classes due to use rooms on the upper floor had to be cancelled and others moved to other buildings. Workmen are now making repairs and the historic hall is expected to be back in business again after Easter. The elderly lady tripped as she came down the stairs and it was thought she might have fractured her skull. I believe she is alright now though," said Eric. "The safety insp-ector came in and said the stairs were in a bad way and so we closed the upper floors until they are made safe again.

as the neat lawns and gardens he is leaving, but with his outlook, Eric Smith will discover interests and excitements anew in his own backyard again. He's the kind of man to have a long and happy retirement, which is exactly what all his friends will wish frim.

FRITZ SPIEGL

Austrian-born flautist, broadcaster and writer, Fritz Spiegl, provided a unique and entertaining evening of words and music, but mostly words, at King Ecgbert's Lower School on March 4th. In a relaxed and amusing style, he related his experiences as a child wrestling with the eccentricities and ambiguities of the English language, then led us loosely through his career in music and broadcasting with a number of tenuous diversions. (Did you know for example that 'cart horse' is an anagram of 'orchestra'?) The best audience reaction came from a slide show of original newspaper howlers many with musical connections. Spiegl must have been on the lookout for humorous cuttings for many years. His collection of tape recordings, marred at times by poor sound quality, included the outbursts of flamboyant conductors at rehearsals, as well as broadcasting bloomers by radio performers (some suspiciously phoney, but funny nonetheless). Mr Spiegl rounded off the evening with a short recital accompanied by Roger Bullivant at the piano.
