The National Camine Defence League Rescue Centre in Totlay has closed with the loss of five jobs and an uncertain future for hundreds of stray do as .

The centre at Monny Brook Farm, Lane Head Road, was opened less than three years ago to help ease the huge homeless dog population in the Sheffield area. More than 800 dogs have been placed with new owners since them. But local residents, angered by the noise of barking dogs, called in the environmental heal th department. Although the League took action to reduce the noise, their efforts failed to satisfy the department and they were told carlier this year to find another site. "It is very sad because we thought we were doing a good job," said manageress Sue Davies, who will lose her job along with her assistant manager and three kennel hands. "It has been very distressing during the close down period because we have had to turn dogs away. The alternatives are South Yorkshire Animal

Rescue, which is much smaller, and the RSPCA.

"What attracted pëople to us is our non-destruction policy. Now we have closed, inevitably more dogs will now have to be put do wn 🗀


Mrs Davies said the Sheffield centre was the biggest the league had in the North of England, although there were still smaller rescue kennels in Leeds and Whitby. The search for an alternative site had not been successful.

"We have proved that there is a huge need for us here in this area, as we have always been full since we opened. If we had not had complaints, then we would still be open now." The future of the Tobley

site, which has more than 50 kennels, is still not clear. The NCDL spent more than $\mathfrak{S}130.000$ buying and setting up the centre in 1983.



The rumour that radioactive lambs are being mineed up and used as isotopes in X-Ray machines, is, as far as I know, untrue, although their eventual use is somewhat unclear at the moment. An EEC directive is expected shortly, which will state that after a quick trip through the Sellafield Nuclear Reprocessing Plant to collect the plutonium so kindly donated to us by the Russians, (which eventually the Ministry of Defence will kindly return to them in two form of an A Bomb) they are to be dumped in the new "Yow evel^a tip at Killingholme On a more serious note, their future is uncertain, as no -one knows how long, if at all, it will take for the activity to decline; so they may event-ually be slaughtered and dumped. This is causing constcrnation to many farmers, 45 their only source of income is suspended by the ban on sales. With the Ministry of Agricof ture promising compensation. but not committing itself to "how much and when" (roughly translated, this means none, ever:) their future is bleak. This, plus a reduction of supplies of New Zealand lamb, has kept the price of lamb above its normal level for the time of year. The usual summer weather is still with us! As a result most arable farmers are up な a month behind schedule with the harvest, which seems likely to continue well into September, delaying the sowing of next year's crops. First indications are that yields will be down in this country and given the droughts in the South of France, Italy and Spain where autput is likely to be 8-10 million tonnes down, the famous (10 grain mountains could become molehills or even craters before mext harvest.

The polor growing conditions, coupled with reduced plantings, has already resulted in much higher prices for potatoes and if the current cold weather continues, a 551 b bag could cost £6-7 by April /May. Our P.Y.O. strawberries were very popular, although the raspberries were spoiled by the weather. One of the jobs already in progress is the clearing up and fertilising of the strawberry beds ready for next year, when we hope to be able to provide you with even bigger and better fruit in wood-free conditions. Also under consideration is the growing of gooseberries, loganberries and Tayberries. We would value some advice on which, if any, you would like to pick. It seems strange to be thinking of Christmas when harvest Is In progress, but our turkey chicks will be coming this month, so another winter must be coming up. Somehow I seem to have missed that long, blazing hot summer we were forecast?

MADE IN TOTLEY

This month, in the third of our craft series "Made in Tolley", we take a look at the work of Mrs Jill Fairman of the Crove. As a child, Mrs. Fairman recalls the enjoyment she derived from the jigsaw puzzles made by a friend of her grandmother's. But these were no ordinary figsaws! And many years later, in 1980 to be precise, Mrs. Fairman found the time to fulfil a lifelong ambition - to make them herself. She has since made about 120 of the puzzles on hor "Hobbies" treadle fretwork machine. What makes these puzzles so different, is the shape of the pieces. Apart from the edges, the pieces are not normally interlocking, Instead, Mrs. fairman cuts through the picture as the mood takes her, following the lines of pleats in clothing or the outlines of figures and shapes in the illustration. In this way the pieces are unique and the finished picture presents a most bleasing appearance. One shape never changes though: in every one of her puzzles there appears her trademark a piece in the shape of a 000 SC 1 As in all high quality work, the search is in the preparation. Mrs. Fairman uses: mainly calendar pictures which she pastes onto plywood, taking great care that no bubbles of air remain. There must be a perfect all-over bond to ensure no tearing under the blade and no loose edges. She uses a very fine blade to minimise the loss of picture between the pieces. Her work is now giving en jo vment all byer the world. Her jigsaws have been sent as far afield as France, Germany,

Dear Sir, I derive immense pleasure from reading the "Totley Independent" after an absence from Totley of 46 years, and am delighted that almost by accident, I discovered

In Issue No. 96, I was fascinated by the contribution from "Thunderer". It seems that things nover change. That junction of Totley Brook Road, Busheywood Road and Abbeydale Road South (as it is known

today) was a nightmare back in 1913. That was the year we had noved to King Ecbert Road, off Totley Brook and 1 well recall my father trying to negotiate the righthand turn from Totley Brook Road towards Totley Rise against - even in those days the oncoming traffic. Older residents will recall Dr. Parsons, whose home and surgery were in the first (semidetached) house in Totley Brook Road. He drove a 1910 or 1911 Swift car and I remember his telling my father of his difficulty, especially in winter with a cold engine, of taking that right-hander, accelerating very slowly when he saw an opening. Cars on route to Sheffield at that time would gain speed down the Rise, carry the slope up to the railway bridge and then come on apage down towards the junction with Totley Brook Road, quite incapable of stopping in an emergency. A further problem, in dry weather, was the appalling dust. the road was water-bound macadam, not tarmac, and it was like heading into a fog! Seventy years on it seems that matters are no better. The frontispiece of Totley Rise shops brings back memories. from 1910-1912 when we lived at Crove Villa (now Bridge House) at the foot of the Rise, I walked daily to kindergarten at the Misses Croslands, at the last house in Glover Road on the left (behind the garage, which was not there at the time). The first shop on the Left was Theakers, newsagent and to baccomist. After a few cottages came Wint's, a greengrocer: then up a few steps in the pavement to the

upper terrace with, first,

the post-office, then

Marrisons, grocers, and finally the butchers whose name was I believe Thompson. There appear to be more shops to day.

The Wint family incidentally, were related to the Wints who operated the taxi service from Dore and Totley railway station. In 1908 when we first came, this was a horse-cab service and they had a curious vehicle which I ⁿbus-andapparently termed a a-cab" (so my parents informed me!) By 1914 they had a fleet of "Star" cars made in Wolverhampton: very reliable vehicles, as old car buffs will remember! I cannot remember when they ceased to run a taxi service from the station.

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


Degree Success
