The photograph on which this drawing is based was taken a short time before the one reproduced last month.

The telephone wires themselves were invisible, embedded as they were in a rough coating of grey ice formed as horizontally-driven sleet frozen on the wire and subsequently on the coating of ice, layer upon layer. The result was approximately streamlined coating eventually of several square inches cross-sectional area. The accumulation of weight so caused, cut off thousands of subscribers by either breaking the wires or dragging down the telegraph poles themselves.

dog owners beware!

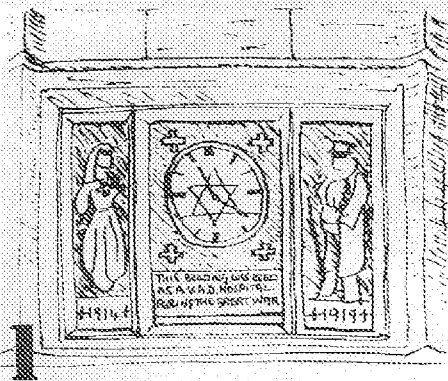

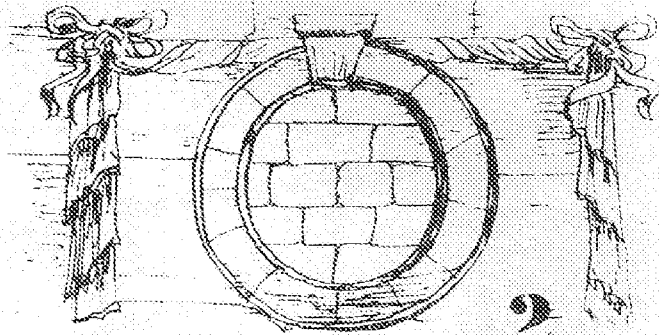
A BIT OF NOSTALGIA

HEALTH

FOR ALL

at a recent meeting of the Totley Liaison Lunch Group, Mrs Joy King, Health Visitor, who works from Greenhill Health Centre, 484 Lupton Road, Tel. 372445 (available between 9 and 10 a.m.) spoke about her work in Totley and part of Bradway. (The Health Visitor for Dore is Jean Hespe who works from the same office). A Health Visitor is a State Registered Nurse with training in Midwifery and a Health Visitor's Certificate. Her work is with people who are not ill, to advise all age groups with the aim of promoting health and preventing ill-health. In this district it is basically with families who have children under 5 years old, to teach parents healthy living, so that by educating the young they will hopefully be more healthy in later life. The work also includes parent-craft classes in school and ante-natal clinics and talks to women's groups. In Totley the work is about 70% with young families. There are about 350 children under 5 in Totley and about 500 if Bradway is included as well.

The Health Visitor liaises as a professional worker in her own right with doctors, hospitals, midwives, community nurses, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, social workers, school nurses and voluntary organisations. She attends the Open Door Centre on the second Thursday in each month to offer "elderly screening" with advice on diet, blood pressure checks, etc. She visits a few teenagers and middle-aged ladies and about twenty elderly people in their own homes. She holds a Well Baby Clinic attended by a paediatrician, on Thursday afternoons at Totley Rise Methodist Church Hall and a Mother and Baby Group (which has about 30 members) on Monday afternoons at the Scout HQ, Aldam Road, for which she arranges talks by dentists, doctors, etc., as requested. This district is recognised as one in which problems of isolation occur, particularly among new mothers, often because the mobility of young families has moved them away from the support of close family relationships and long-term friendships. This has led to a high incidence of post-natal depression. Two workers from the National Childbirth Trust, as well as the Community psychiatric nurse, give support where needed. There are several organised Mother & Toddler Groups in the area.

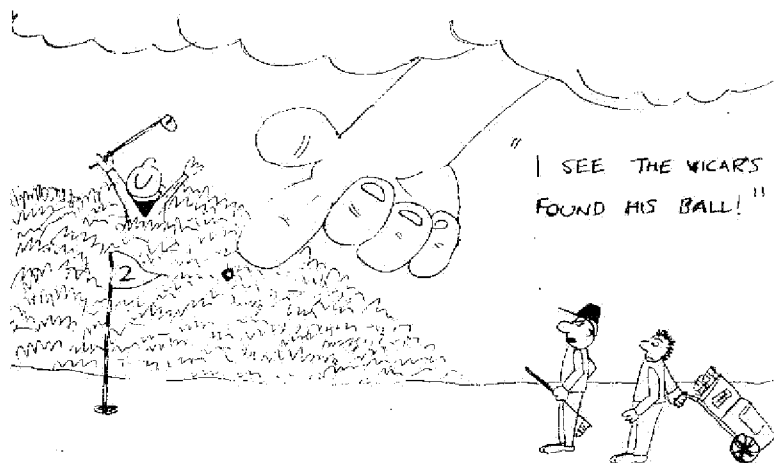

ARAUCARIA

Like most people trying to buy a house we draw up our specification as to size, position, garden, rateable value, condition, age and so on. We had not at that stage thought about the monkey puzzle tree (Araucaria is the posh name!) which was in the garden of the house we chose.

We soon discovered that it made quite a difference which we could never have imagined. Other people know our house as "the one with the monkey puzzle tree";

I found the branches extraordinarily heavy and sharp banging my head as I cut the lawn, the "seeds" on the branches make a dreadful mess when they fall and burst.....

Then to cap it all, one of our favourite cross-word setters uses the pen name "Araucaria". He is truly a puzzle!

But we really are quite fond of our monkey puzzle tree and consider that on balance it is an asset both to us and our neighbourhood.



GARDENING TIPS

The weather in February can be quite unpredictable with wintry conditions giving way to warm sunshine. Be sure to take advantage of any warmer spells to get on with pruning and preparing ground for the early sowing and planting.

SHRUBS AND ROSES

Don't be tempted by mild weather to start pruning your hybrid tea roses. There is still hard weather to come which could damage new growth. You should, however, check over the bushes and firm any which have been loosened by windrock or frost. Winter flowering Jasmine should be pruned (as soon as the flowers have finished) to encourage new growth for next seasons flowers. Cut back last years shoots of fuschia and late Summer flowering Clematis. Plant out Deciduous shrubs and Heathers later in the month. Prepare ground for spring planting of evergreens including azaleas and rhododendrons.

FLOWERS

There is little to do in this area of the garden but you should check over your wall-flower bed and fill any gaps before plants start into really active growth. At the same time firm any plants which may have been loosened by frost. Keep a close watch on herbaceous perennials, as new shoots start to appear. Protect them from attacks by slugs with slug pellets at the first sign of damage. Winter flowering heathers should be trimmed back with shears as blooms fade to prevent them getting straggly.

This is a good time of year to build a small rock garden, an interesting place for alpine plants. It can be made with no more than 6 or 8 stones of moderate size; the space between them filled with good soil mixed with plenty of coarse grit and some peat. Make it in a sunny position where it will have the benefit of good drainage.

Don't forget to examine Dahlia tubers in store. If there is any sign of mould on stems or tubers they should be dusted with flowers of sulphur. Make sure they are well protected against frost.

FRUIT

Firm in newly planted fruits. Most fruits will benefit from a spring feed. At this time they will respond well to a balanced general fertiliser such as "growmore", but a potash feed such as "Rose Plus" will give gooseberries and raspberries an extra lift. A dressing of mulch around the plants will also be beneficial.

VEGETABLES

Cut the last of the winter cabbage and pick the last of the brussel sprouts. You can use the tips of the plants as 'greens'. Lift parsnips and Jerusalem artichokes as required. Parsnips can be sown later in the month if the weather is favourable.

INDOOR PLANTS

Gradually increase watering, keep African violets, cyclamen and indoor primulas humid by standing them on moist pebble filled saucers. Plant gladiolus corms.

GREENHOUSE

Antirrhinums, salvias, ageratum, lobelia should be sown by the end of the month. Early onion seedlings raised from seed should be pricked off into boxes 2" apart or individually potted. Young shoots on vines should be reduced to one per spur. On bright days the temperature may rise rapidly now and so attention must be given to ventilation. On sunny days most plants that are in growth will benefit from an overhead spray of clear water during the early part of the day.

LAWNS

A good rake and spike on one of the good days also a dressing of sand will prepare it for another season.

ALAN JOCKEL

The name of Alan Jockel, the former Vicar of Totley, is living on in the East End of Sheffield.

A new headquarters building for the Seven Hills Trust charity, of which he was the first chairman, has been named after him as a memorial to his work.

Rev. Jockel died tragically of cancer in 1985. One of the lesser known of his many activities to his parishioners in Totley was his work in other more socially deprived areas of the city.

He was instrumental in setting up the Seven Hills Trust, a body aimed at helping socially disadvantaged people to find employment, in 1980. In 1986, following his death, the Trust gained full charitable status - recognition in itself of its valuable work.

The stated aims of the Trust are

- 1) To help educate and train those people disadvantaged by physical, mental, economic or social circumstances. Particularly those suffering from mental illness, in work methods and skills.
- 2) To increase the ability of the above mentioned individuals to cope with the changing demands of society and to promote their rehabilitation into normal community life.

The Trusts' record of placing people in employment is already impressive and the MSC is now finding a 100 place scheme within its Community Programme. Skills such as upholstery, furniture re-cycling, wood-working, gardening, painting and decorating are all available.

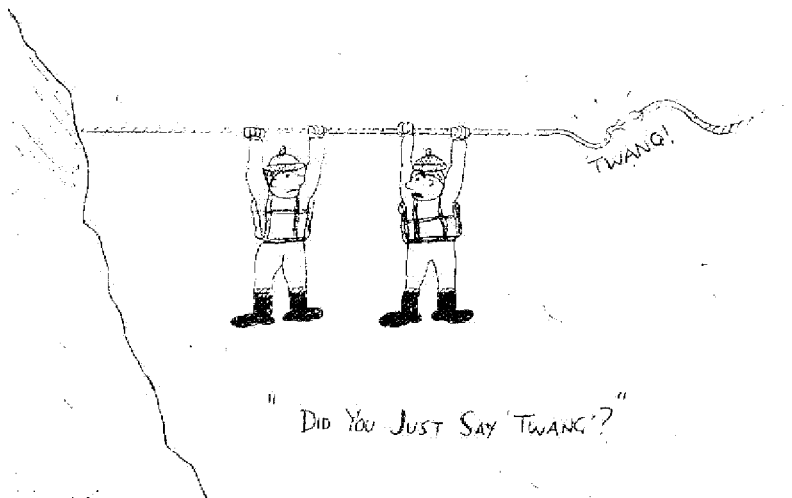

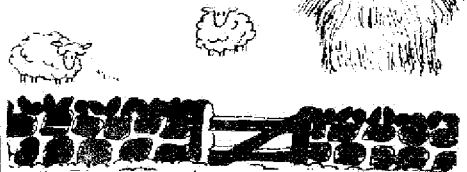

A discussion with the Chairman revealed that the social side of the committees' work could be strengthened if help were available. Perhaps this brief publicity paragraph should therefore underline the fact that any member of the committee may be approached with suggestions and in particular with offers of help.



FARMING SCENE



The recent snow fall has brought reality back to our weather, and confounded the optimists that imagined that winter was over and spring was around the corner. This cold weather will kill off many of the fungal diseases that were merrily building up on cereal and other crops, ready to cause substantial damage and yield loss this coming summer. It will also force the slugs to use deep mining techniques to find their food, rather than the surface grazing of plants they have been able to do up till now.

We are now 6 weeks from lambing, and the ewes have begun to receive a high energy and protein feed supplement. During the last 8 weeks before lambing, the lamb foetuses grow rapidly, so to ensure this growth is not stunted, and the ewe does not become under-nourished and thin, an increasing amount of supplement is fed. This starts at 1lb per ewe per day 8 weeks before lambing and rises to 2lb over the next 6 weeks and remains at this level until there is sufficient spring grass to adequately feed the ewe. We have, in fact, sorted through our ewes and brought the 25 thinnest back to the farm, where they will be sheltered from the weather and given additional feed to try and get them in good condition for lambing.

We did have one scare with our sheep this week. A dog decided to "play" with the ewe lambs at the bottom of the lane. Because they were not in lamb no permanent damage was done, but it took my wife 2 hours to round up those that had been driven over fences and 2 days for the sheep to settle down again. Fortunately for the dog, I was away at the time, otherwise it would have received a fatal dose of lead. Had they been in lamb, the owner could have received a compensation bill running into hundreds of pounds.

Does anyone know where Fred came from? Fred is a cock Pheasant that appeared around the farm about this time last year. Fred is very friendly in that he potters about the farm buildings as if he owns the place, helping himself to any grain or poultry food that is available, and allows us to get within 3 or 4 feet of him before quietly walking off. He spends his mornings guarding our chicken sheds, and we get the impression that he has adopted them as his harem. (all 150 of them!!) as he gets quite stroppy if we upset any of them when we are feeding etc. Just before dusk during the summer we used to see him stride off down our drive, across the lane, down the Poly Lawns and into the churchyard where he roosted in the trees. He is obviously now using his winter accommodation, the Old Hall on the Highfield Poly Site, where he can find a sheltered roost which ever way the wind is. "There's no use getting old if you don't get antsy", as the saying goes! Just at the moment he looks really magnificent as the reds, greens and browns of his new plumage glisten in the sunlight, ready to "pull the birds" during the coming mating season.

SCHOOL DATES

Last month, on Jan 2nd, Totley All Saints School was 111 years old.

Gas fittings were not completed in the school until 8th Nov 1915 but at that date the asphaltting was incomplete due to shortage of materials caused by the war.

During the Second World War the air raid shelters on the school premises could accommodate 221 people. (There were 245 pupils on the school roll with room for 264!)

September 1988 also sees a birthday celebration for another part of the school. The two classroom Horsa unit, standing behind the main building, will be 40 years old. Most probably having been erected as a temporary measure.

FORUM OF PEOPLE WITH
DISABILITIES. (SHEFFIELD)

The FORUM is a campaigning body for the Sheffield area, democratically controlled by its members, with the aim of ensuring we are not prevented from taking a full and active part in life, simply because we have a disability. Many able-bodied people think disability disqualifies us from taking any further part in life, but only because they have designed public services and facilities so badly that very few of us can use them. Our intention is not only to play our full and active part in community life, but make our voice heard. (PUBLIC FACILITIES AND SERVICES ARE FOR THE PUBLIC AT LARGE AND THAT INCLUDES US) Anybody with a disability can join the FORUM, and age is no bar. People who cannot speak for themselves can appoint an advocate to speak and vote for them. The membership decide the policies of the FORUM at the quarterly meeting.

We have ACTION TEAMS for ACCESS, EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, HOUSING INFORMATION, PUBLICITY, TRAINING, TRANSPORT, WILLIAMS, FUNDING, PEOPLE WITH MENTAL HANDICAP, ETHNIC MINORITIES and WOMENS GROUPS.

The ACTION TEAMS negotiate and plan with those in charge of services and facilities that impede or exclude us on the grounds of disability.

Consultations have been arranged with many public and private bodies to ensure that private buildings and transport are fully accessible to people with disabilities. Both in existence now and in the future, the introduction of the SYT wheelchair bus highlights this.

Since our move into new premises at SHEAF HOUSE, we have negotiated for more word processors, and so we have set up training in the use of modern office facilities for our members, free of charge.

Our magazine "ABILITY PLUS" is written by people with disabilities for people with disabilities. It is sent free to our members, the articles concern individual articles of how FORUM members have coped with adversity and won.

"ABILITY PLUS" has already achieved a circulation of 3,000 and our membership into the FORUM, is growing all the time, and we are actively looking for new members.

We plan to expand and provide opportunities for TRAINING and EMPLOYMENT. Each new member, each new voice gives extra clout, keeps the spirits and determination high and more to the point gets them done. If you can help in any way at all please contact:-

RAILWAYS

THE SHEFFIELD SOCIETY OF
MODEL AND EXPERIMENTAL
ENGINEERS

Many residents of Totley and district will be familiar with the miniature railway at Limb Brook, off Abbeydale Road South on the edge of Ecclesall Woods. Every Sunday throughout the summer months miniature steam trains puff their way round the track pulling carriages full of children and young-at-heart adults. During winter months running is suspended whilst members maintain and extend trackwork and buildings.

The new clubhouse was officially opened last summer by the Lord Mayor and an exhibition of members' work was open to the public who enjoyed free rides on the day. Exhibits ranged from completed miniature steam locomotives, to traction and showmans engines, tools, equipment and a steam engine for a launch. Everything has to be made from basic materials such as steel, brass, copper and iron castings. Model engineers have to be skilled in the use of hand tools and machinery such as lathes and milling machines. A comprehensive workshop is being built up in the clubrooms for the use of members. Many years may have to be spent on one model, the average being around five years to complete a model locomotive in a member's spare time.

As the vast majority of models run on steam, safety is paramount and any boiler in use on the club premises has to be tested at regular intervals and a special certificate issued before insurance cover can be valid. Anyone who is interested in joining the society would be welcome to drop in on Friday nights or Sundays and visitors are always welcome.
