June is a very busy month for garden-I have just had details of a hotter and flowers are bursting forth the seed people. £100 First prize ready to give the keen gardeners a treat for their efforts. The main points this month are;-

- * Water, feed and shade indoor plants.
- colour from next winter to early summer.
- * Pot on begonias and fuschias to flower this year.
- * Remove side shoots, stake and tie tomatoes, cucumber and peppers.
- * Take cuttings of geraniums, Fuschias and foliage plants for next spring.
- * Complete planting this years summer bedding plants.
- * Weed flower beds regularly.
- * Make succesional sowings of vegetables, salad crops and herbs.
- * Earth up potatoes.
- * Start picking and drying herbs.
- * Protect ripening fruits from birds.
- * Train and tie in new canes of blackberries and loganberries.
- * Summer prune gooseberries and redcurrants.
- * Keep new lawns well watered and feed and treat lawns for weeds.
- * Watch out for those aphids and caterpillars. Spray as soon as they are seen (a stitch in time etc.)
- * Don't forget to pick up the fruit pods of the Laburnum tree especially if you have kiddles about - they are very poisonous.

Roses To get the best of your roses apply a second dressing of "rose plus" diocese as Diocesan Adult Education or similar fertilisers. This extra feed not only improves the quality of the first flush of blooms but also ensures a good repeat flowering.

Hanging baskets can be hung outdoors. If frost is forecast put them undercover for the night.



The scheme is in two parts:-


(a) to "link-up with your library", which simply involves telling the librarian about the subjects you are interested in. We can then use this information, when choosing materials for the library.

What price local shops?

Until recently one of the rarest sites in Totley was that of an empty shop. This is now becoming a familiar sight with "For Sale" signs regularly displayed on vacant properties.

Local shopping facilities, particularly away from the city centre, are to be valued. They are essential.

Shopping habits change without shoppers being over-aware of the new trends they are creating. A local shop cannot usually compete with larger establishments, on price alone, but this is not and should not be the prime consideration.

Doorstep shopping is accesible in all weathers; does not rely on public transport; can offer smaller, more sensible portions and usually has a friendly and courteous face behind the counter. Shopkeepers will more than likely know your name, give you a friendly greeting and can be relied on as a friend twelve months of the year. Understanding should be given however to the shopowners constant nightmare of keeping stocks where cash flow is paramount and space is limited.

Several types of shop are duplicated in Totley, thereby giving the further advantage of choice. Which type of new shop, if any, does Totley need and equally important, what type of shop in the area would you be prepared to spend your money in?

Suberbs need shops. Shops need customers. Use them today or lose them tomorrow.



<u>RIDING HIGH</u>

A Totley resident has sent us this little piece:-

The Hallamshire Riding Society of Sheffield

In 1949 a group of horse riders got together and decided to start a riding club to become known as the Hallamshire Riding Society of Sheffield. They rented a couple of fields adjoining the Dore Moor Inn and Sheffield Tigers Rugby Club on Hathersage Road, bought a few show jumps and started holding shows and training sessions for the members. As the society grew more jumps were bought and eventually a pavillion, which still stands on the showground today, although it is now in need of urgent repairs. In those days the society held shows and training sessions for members, but also held open shows which were affiliated to the British Show Jumping Association Many riders competing went on to become International Show Jumpers, including Andrew Fielder and his famous horse Vibart who used to kick his back legs out long before "Ryans Son" came on the scene. David and William Barker who represented Great Britain at the Tokyo Olympics used to compete at the Hallamshire shows, also Mike Saywell who has been seen jumping many times on T.V. and the most recent being Helana Dickinson who until her recent marriage to German showjumper Peter Weinberg lived at Lodge Moor and competed for Great Britain on many occasions.

Five years ago the membership had dropped to 55, but last year climbed to 330 and is still rising, making it the oldest and biggest riding club in South Yorkshire. You do not have to be a member to watch our shows and we make no admission charge. The pavillion serves refreshments all day and anyone attending our shows will be sure of a friendly welcome and some very enjoyable days out. You do not have to ride to become a member, non riding membership costs £5, riding £9 and family membership £15 per year.

TRANSPORT 17 -- CRISIS

From September 1988 Transport 17 will no longer be able to rely on drivers/ escorts from the Community Programme Agency. The sterling work achieved in the last four years (and now with a second minibus) has been deeply appreciated by the elderly and handicapped of this area,

Continuance of the service however is going to depend on volunteers (men or women between the ages of 25 and 65) who may be willing to spare some time. Drivers must have a clean driving licence but training will be given to both drivers and escorts in the specific duties and responsibilities of this task.
