FOR TOTLEY

A "Little Nipper" service (M17) is starting in Totley from Monday 7th November. The route is complicated but basically runs from Totley Brook Road, via Totley to Bradway, Jordanthorpe, Netheredge Hospital, Hallamshire Hospital and the City Centre. In Totley itself it will run down Main Avenue, Lemont Road, Mickley Lane and Queen Victoria Road. In this area it will operate on a "hail & ride" basis. Detailed timetables and routes are

available in the Library and other places but it is an hourly service from 9 am to 6 pm Monday to Friday.

These links to the hospitals will be very welcome although it will seem odd to go to the Hallamshire via Jordanthorpe!

As we go to press we also understand that a one day a week disability bus (no. 870) will be serving Totley from Wednesday 9th November. This will leave Totley Brook at 09.30 and come up to Main Avenue, Green Oak, Mickley Lane and Bradway before going into the City. The return bus will leave the city at 12.25.

GARDENING TIPS

Well, October rounded the flowering season off true to this years form with gales, rain and storms etc. I hope it didn't do too much damage to your garden. Mine still has some colour in it thanks to a good show of ageratum and perstemons. The dahlias are looking a bit groggy but there are still one or two blooms to brighten the outlook, though not for long now, the frosts will soon put paid to them.

The greenhouse is very colourful at the moment (mid Oct); begonias and bizzy lizzies are just on the way out, but what lovely colours we have had. Cape primroses have showed well and the hibiscus is still sending up a flower or two. A special treat for me was the canna flowering for the first time; its name cannon fire is a really good name to describe the red and yellow flowers.

Things to do in November:-

- * Rake up and burn fallen leaves from flower beds particularly where black spot is rife.
- * Press on with the planting of shrubs and trees.
- * Protect fuschias, ceanothus and other less hardy shrubs by piling a few inches of peat or bark chippings around their bases.
- * Cut back the longer shoots on roses to about a third to prevent rocking in the winter gales.
- * Move tubs of Bay, Hydrangea, fuschia and other less hardy shrubs into a light frost free room.
- * Plant trees and soft fruit also rhubarb and grape vines.
- * Take hardwood cuttings of top and soft fruit.
- * Protect fruit such as Gooseberries currants, plums from pecking by birds.
- * Sow seeds of alpines that need frost before germinating.
- * Check stored dahlia tubers, cut off rotton or diseased parts and dust with fungicides or flowers of sulphur.
- * Only feed houseplants that are in flower, avoid fluctuating temperature.
- * Foliage houseplants should be kept just moist, let the top of the compost dry out slightly in between waterings.
- * Finish off drying out begonias, achimenes, gloxinias, cannas and hippeastrums. Store under greenhouse bench in their pots.
- * Check greenhouse regularly for pests and diseases and use fungicides if necessary.
- * Continue potting up annuals and rooted cuttings.
- * Keep greenhouse well ventilated on good days to prevent disease spreading.
- * Remove dead leaves and flowers regularly and make sure there's no rubbish lying around in the green house.
- * Water sparingly in the greenhouse and avoid splashing foliage, don't let seedlings dry out.
- * Lawns should be kept tidy and leaf free.
- * Prepare soil for lawn next spring, dig and leave rough dug after taking out weeds.
- * Turf can still be laid if the weather is reasonable.
- * If you have made your last cut on your lawns make sure you clean your mower before you put it away. This is a good time to have it overhauled.

MORE ABOUT DOGS

Do We Want a Pedigree or Mongrel?

The Cost of keeping a pedigree or mongrel are actually the same, but you need to consider the following (it has nothing to do with being snobbish!):- A pedigree will cost more to buy, usually a great deal more, but it will grow into the likeness of it's breed. You will be able to be sure of it's eventual size and shape and you will have a rough idea of the sort of character it is likely to develop. A little tip :- as a general rule, dogs that are bred from working stock rather than showing stock will have their natural inherited instincts very much to the fore and may be difficult to keep as pets without some outlet for their instincts. Border collies from working parents can make particularly difficult pets unless you are prepared to exert a good degree of control over him and provide an outlet for his instincts through play and training.

A mongrel, on the other hand, is an unknown quantity. They may be totally different from their parents (if they are known at all) both in size and temperament. They are unlikely to have had as much care and knowledgeable attention during the important early months as "planned" pedigree pups have had, and this is important as I will show you later on. But, if you are willing to take a risk, they can make intelligent, loyal and friendly family dogs.

Crossbreeds, when the dog of a recognised breed is crossed with another, can also be a bit of a gamble, but they too can be an affectionate friend.

It has two cathedrals and a whisky distillery, imitation Roman ruins and two TV transmitters, no parking meters or potted meat, but a lot of sparkling sea and incredible scenery. There is no stereo reception but bagpipes come in loud and clear, particularly the electric ones. The natives are friendly and speak with a gentle musical accent - some who arrive on the ferries, ruddy complexioned, with big knees and red hair speak in a tongue all their own (as do their menfolk also) - a kind of lilting Egyptian backwards.

It is Oban, where I live, and it's a far cry from Totley. A year away from Scargill country and liberal licensing laws have dimmed the memory and adjustments have been made. The local sparrows are all white with webbed feet and a four foot wingspan, eating anything and occasionally each other. Rabbits bounce all over and deer leap over the fence now and again heading who knows where (although venison suddenly becomes today's special on many pub lunches). It is breath-stopping to meet an owl face to face on the back doorstep but it beats greeting double-glazing salesmen. It's not all wild and woolly - culture is beamed at us from distant England - and we don't miss a word from Bet Lynch, Charlene or Annie Sugden. Not many, except visiting Americans with Scottish ancestors, wear the kilt, and I don't for reasons which would be obvious if I did, nor do we live on porridge and oatcakes now that the ceilings are higher.

But as I sit wreathed in mist, playing with our haggis pup, I have to concede that it's people who make places live in the mind. It makes Totley quite special for the White Settlers of the Western Highlands. Pop in if you're passing.

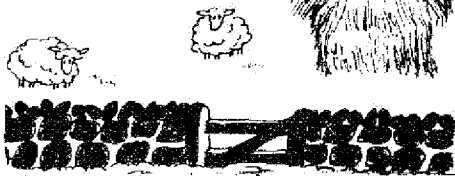

FARMING SCENE

Autumn '88 looks set to copy last year, as once again agricultural activity is curtailed by heavy and persistent rain. Although the cereal harvest is finished, the potato and sugar-beet harvests have some way to go, and a large proportion of Winter Wheat sowings have yet to be completed.

The wet spell has prevented us from putting our wheat in, but the barley has been sown and is growing well. By resorting to hand planting we have managed to get our last 5,000 strawberry runners planted. Given good weather we should produce 15-18 tonnes over a 6-8 week period next year for our "Pick your Own" customers.

One of our next jobs will be to cut out the old raspberry canes and prune and tie in this years growth which will fruit next year. Some of our existing canes are dying because the continual wet weather has waterlogged their roots, so because of this, and to meet demand we are planting a further acre in the field next to our existing plantation. These will be a new variety called Glen Moy, which will fruit a little earlier than the Malling Delight we have at present, and produce a slightly smaller berry with a better flavour.

The Tups are now with our ewes, and the rest of this years lambs have been brought into a barn, out of the weather so that they will all be "ready" and sold before Christmas.
