Not a lot happening in the garden at the moment. It all looks quite bare now that the bedding plants are gone and the flower beds are turned over. We can look forward to spring as we thumb through our seed and plant catalogues, though it seems a long way off at the moment.

Things to do in December

- * Plant new trees if conditions are suitable.
- * If you have planted shrubs in Autumn check them over and make sure they are still firm.
- * Give the blades on your secateurs a good soak in disinfectant to prevent diseases being transferred from plant to plant.
- * Bare rooted shrubs arriving by post should be heeled in until the weather is favourable.
- * Keep flowering plants such as cyclamen, azeleas and poinsettias in a cold room to prolong their life..
- * Increase humidity around the plants by grouping them together Standing pots on peat or gravel will help.
- * If indoor plants start to look "leggy" or loose some of their colour move them to a lighter spot.
- * Don't overwater indoor plants and keep them out of draughts and away from direct heat.
- * Lift leeks as needed and earth up the stems of those left. Don't let soil fall between the leaves.
- * Continue winter digging in the vegetable plot. Leave the soil in large clods for the frost to break down.
- * Harvest cabbage, savoys and brussel sprouts.
- * Cut down stems of Jerusalem artichokes.
- * Protect cauliflowers from frost by bending leaves over the heads.
- * Turnips and swedes should be lifted and stored.

- * Keep off the soil if it is very wet or frozen.
- * Finish off winter pruning of blackcurrants and gooseberries.
- * Continue pruning apples and pears
- * Apply winter tar oil wash to kill eggs of aphids, apple suckers and winter moths.
- * Look over apples and pears in store. Remove any fruit showing signs of rot.
- * Check over plants in greenhouses; water sparingly.
- * Watch out for signs of rot amongst alpines and silver foliage plants, small cloches or glass covers may help keep rain off susceptible species.
- * In good weather manure or compost spreading can begin but try not to walk on your soil too much.
- * Lag outdoor pipes to prevent them freezing.
- * Clean away rubbish from the garden and greenhouse to prevent pest over-wintering in it.
- * Before bringing the Christmas Tree indoors, spray with "spray'n Save" to prevent the needles falling out.

TOTLEY RISE DEVELOPMENTS

We understand that the Fish & Chip shop (formerly Hagenbach's) will open early in December but there is as yet no sign that the former Whiteheads shop is coming to life again. There is apparently planning permission for a restaurant but no one seems anxious to pursue the development. Meanwhile, of course, the former "Orange Grove" is now a self service style greengrocers run by the Scriven family. At the end of Glover Road opposite the top of the Rise new flats are being built.

After the washout of an October, November - at least the first part of it - has been particularly dry which has enabled us to catch up on some of the work. The potatoes are harvested although we did loose a few due to frosting when we had that particularly early sharp frost. It has been a good crop, approx. 16 tonnes per acre, of mediums sized good looking tubers.

The wheat has been planted although we have had to resort to emergency measures, because of the wetness of the ground. Instead of using a proper corn drill to sow the seed, we have broadcast it onto the ground with the fertiliser spreader and covered it in with a cultivator set 1"-2" deep. This technique helps to avoid soil compaction and the consequent waterlogging and plant death.

The new raspberries should get a very good start in the spring as they are planted in a part of the field that has a free draining sandy loam soil.

The fields planted with Oilseed Rape are now "greening" over as the crop grows. They have been sprayed with a residual weedkiller to kill the meadow grass, chickweed etc. We had a sad event last week when we had to say goodbye to Montgomery after six years of loyal service. He had been suffering from an infection for 2-3 weeks and failed to respond to treatment, so we waved him off last week as he went to his last "resting place" - a pate factory in France via a slaughterhouse in Essex. A large proportion of cull sows and boars are exported and no doubt many return in the form of processed meat products.

We have a new boar on order, but he will be too young to serve our sows for 2-3 months so we will be Artificially Inseminating them using semen from a breeding centre at Selby. So if you see a postman

As the Rev. Duncan Wilson leaves the Dore & Totley United Reformed Church to take up his new appointment to the Sheffield Inner City Ecumenical Mission (SICEM), it is right to recall and thank him for, his Ministry in this area.

He came to Totley in March 1974 from Wigton Moor, Leeds. During his time here, he has supported and developed the ecumenical affairs and has been chairman twice of the Christian Council for Dore, Totley and Bradway. Much of the planning of the Week of Prayer Services and the Agape Meal, and the arrangements for Holy Week and One World Week were at his instigation. With his excellent memory of faces, names and even conversations from years ago, he has been a first class resource - and not just for his own Church.

In the fourteen -and-a-half years he has been at Totley Brook Road, Duncan has been the inspiration in the Remodelling of the front of the Sanctuary, has given (from his architect past) good advice on the buildings, introduced fresh approaches to Worship and led "Family Weekends" at many centres.

At national level he was very involved with the denomination's Youth Work - some readers will rmember that he was often away at Eastertime leading the URC's youth activity "Anchors Aweigh" on the Norfolk Broads.

It is good that he stayed for the Church's Centenary (incidentally having his 100th Baptism at Dore and Totley during this Centenary Year), and he goes to SICEM with the thanks and Good Wishes of the Totley Churches and people.



MORE ABOUT DOGS

It may appear to you that grown dogs will come already trained and so will be easier to manage. No whining for its litter mates, no chewing, no pulling on the lead etc, etc.

But ask yourself another question: Why is this dog up for sale? Some grown dogs are available because of a change in home circumstances. Both owners may need to work due to a changed situation. Owners do divorce, die or leave the country; and you may get a happy, healthy, well behaved dog.

But many of the dogs requiring new homes do so due to lack of training and general care. They may have developed really ingrained habits of chewing, barking, wandering or aggression which the original owners, in their eagerness to get rid of the dog, may not have been totally honest about. These dogs may be hard to rehabititate, especially if they have been passed from home to home.

Always ask why the dog is for sale and arrange for a trial period. For the first 2 weeks or so, a dog will be like a child in a new place, he will be a little wary and seemingly on his best behaviour,

but as his confidence grows, so his behaviour problems surface.

Breeding or showing kennels sometimes have dogs which are surplus to their requirements or have not developed how the breeder would like, physically (ears not quite correct for example). This may not matter to you or I, but these dogs may have been kept in a kennel with other dogs and never been in a house. They are usually difficult to house train and may be very difficult to

socialise if they have had little human contact.

You need to be prepared to put much time and effort into re-training an adult dog. This can be a rewarding challenge, but you must be prepared for it.

Generally, therefore, it is better to buy a puppy rather than an older dog. He will then fit more readily into your home life. and you will really get to know and understand your dog from early in his life.



ABBEYDALE !


