HEALTHY EATING

MANGO

A fruit much favoured by the West Indians, this delicious stoned fruit had its origins in India. Once the value of this underrated fruit was realised the seeds and plants were transported in sailing ships to many parts of the world. The tough hard skin should be peeled like a potato revealing the orange/yellow flesh which has a delicate fragrance and spicy taste full of juice. Best served as a dessert it is ideal in fruit salads. Its health giving properties are known internationally. It is available from January to September.

These are Salad Days so why not try something quite different?

Danish Herring and Apple Salad

serves 4 approx. 320 calories per portion.

Cock 11b small potatoes in their skins until just tender. (Peel off skins at this stage, if preferred). Slice potatoes into 3" slices and arrange in a shallow serving dish with 1 small onion, peeled and thinly sliced. Mix 3 tablespoons olive oil with 3 tablespoons white wine vinegar, 1 teaspoon French mustard, 1 clove peeled and crushed garlic. teaspoon dill seed and salt and pepper to taste. Spoon half the dressing over the potatoes and onion. Halve, core and thinly slice 2 Granny Smiths apples and toss in the remaining dressing . Cut 4 roll mop herrings through into rings and arrange on top of the potato and onion; spoon the apple slices and dressing over the top. Cover and chill for 3 to 4 hours. Sprinkle with chopped fresh dill (when available) or parsley, and a little fromage frais, before serving.



Walk Number 5.

Distance 11 miles. Allow 6hrs Now that we have got our walking legs, let us venture a little further afield over woodland and moorland slopes on our own doorstep.

From Totley Post Office proceed down Totley Hall Lane covering a similar route as described in Walk No! (February) to Smeekley Woods via field paths to Fanshawe Gate Hall, Lidgate, Horslay Gate and Cordwell Valley. On entering Carr Lane (bridleway), after passing the water treatment plant, open a gate 150 yds above and to the left we step into an area of Ransley Moor. The general public have the right of access providing they observe the bye-laws and follow the Country Gode. The path skirts under shapely Hewetts Bank. Here are the head waters of the Millthorpe and Barlow brooks and we pass through a landscape of silver birch and rowan trees. After ½ mile from the gate we break into open moorland towards Fox Lane crossroads. The weathered ancient stone cross high on the slope to our left is reputed to have been built by the monks of Beauchief Abbey The path levels and we are soon onto Fox Lane. There is another stone cross in the nearby Shillito Wood 100 yards to our left at the head of Fox Lane. Drink in the glorious views across to the Chatsworth Estate and Birchens Edge. Proceed back to our right along the road for approx 450yds to Ramsley Reservoir. A gate to our right takes us above the reservoir and further moorland scenes. Take the top path above the dam. Yellow markers point the way forward over the crest of the hill to the ruined homestead of Ramsley Lodge. We have now completed a good half of the walk and a small lean-to building affords shelter for a lunch break. This spot commands a height of about 1000ft. with views in all directions. Proceed 200yds straight forward across the moor to the A621 Baslow to Sheffield road. Enter Big Moor via another stile and a green track takes us parallel with another stream, the Barbrook (a feeder of the River Derwent). Big Moor is aptly named and there are stone circles, field systems and ancient guide stones. After amile we pass Little Barbrook Reservoir and 12miles from the road skirt the side of the larger Barbrook Dam (supplies water to the Chesterfield area). This is a rare breeding ground for birds. The path leaves the reservoir to the right on a surfaced



road towards Owler Bar. After 200yds a signpost to the left leads along a grassy track to the Fox House and Owler Bar road. Walk left towards Fox House and a gate after 350yds on the opposite side of the highway takes us onto Totley Moss.. A faint path struggles straight forward under the slopes of Flask Edge. After mile from the road leave the path at the line of a continuing and broken down wall and head for 300yds in the direction of the rail tunnel air shaft that dominates the forward scene and pick up the main track that crosses Totley Moor. It pays to make this slight diversion as there are several boggy patches that are well worth avoiding and never seem to dry up. again take in the lovely views all around. Turn right along the main bridle track and either descend the steep field path above the rifle range or proceed down the lane to Moss Road and the Sports Field adjacent to the Cricket Inn. After this grand little expedition maybe we could weaken to a spot of amber liquid before we head for home.



OUTSIDE EDGE.





SARDENING TIPS *

Last month I said I was looking forward to warmer weather. I got my wish! I hope you have taken advantage of the warm spell and been out in the garden preparing beds, conditioning the lawns and tending plants. Watch out for aphids as Edwin Pocock forecast in his column last month, they're here! with a vengeance. Keep spraying because they can devastate plants and spread disease.

June is a splendid month in the garden. We can look forward to the roses beginning their summer show, herbaceous perennials adding their colours to the scene, and the verdant green of lawns providing a restful foreground to all this colour.

Things to do in June

- * Plants that have come through the winter should be in leaf by the end of the month, any without leaf by this time should be considered dead.
- * Take cuttings from hydrangeas about the middle of the month, they will make a bit of hardwood before winter.
- * If you have a pest or disease problem on roses, spray with combination rose treatment such as Rose Clear or Multirose.
- * Remove rose suckers as close to parent plant as possible before they get too big and sap the plants energy.
- * Propagate clematis from cuttings taken from young vigorous shoots each cut just above and about 2" below a leaf joint and prepared by removing one leaf.
- * Summer prune red and white currants and gooseberries towards the end of the month.
- * Tie in new shoots of blackberry, loganberry, raspberry.
- * Water fruit well in dry weather especially fruit growing near a wall.
- * Continue to spray apples and pears and include a control for codling moth if you had this problem last year.
- * Mow and water lawns regularly. Set the blades higher during dry spells. Spiking will help water penetration.
- * Sow carrots this month to escape an attack of carrot root fly. Try to sow as thinly as possible.
- * Pinch out the tips of broad beans when the first beans start to form.
- * Plant out brussels sprouts and winter cabbage. Make sure they are planted firmly.

- * Plant out courgettes, marrows and sweet corn at the end of the month.
- Plant leeks in deep holes and water in well.
- * Sow lettuce in situ. They don't like being transplanted during wern weather.
- * Continue to sow seeds of peas, runner and french beans. Keep all vegetables well watered.
- * Start picking herbs for drying and freezing.
- * Earth up potatoes.
- * Watch out for aphids and caterpillar on vegetable plants and spray with insecticide.
- * In the Greenhouse remove side shoots on tomatoes.
- * Water plants in growing bags carefully avoid waterlogging or dryness.
- Ventilate your greenhouse carefully avoiding rapid temperature changes.
- * Stand pots on damp pebbles to maintain humidity.
- * Sow calceolaria, cineraria, busy lizzy, french marigold and indoor primulas, to use as pot plants.
- * Apply shading in the form of fabric or coolglass paint. Shade young seedlings from direct sunlight.
- * Feed flowering plants indoors especially sweet peas. Container and hanging baskets need a weekly dose.
- * Plant out bedding plants and keep them well watered.
- * Stake and tie tall plants such as lilies, gladioli etc.
- * Lift and clean spring bulbs store in light airy shed.
- * Sow biennials, canterbury bells, foxgloves, pansies, violas and sweet william under frames or cloches.
- * Weed your borders regularly. The battle with weeds will be won or lost in June.
- * Hopefully June will be warm and dry but watch out for slugs and snails. If it turns to rain take precautions.

Remember:-

- * Water and feed for growth
- Keep on top of weeds
- * Cut off faded flowers to encourage new ones.



1989 looks like being a year when our sheep are determined to cause us trouble. After a no more than average lambing result we turned them out into the fields so that they could go on quietly mowing the grass while we attended to other crops etc. However, this was not to be, as after only 3 weeks at grass the lambs started to scour badly and quickly die. To counter this we immediately reached for our worming kit and gave them all a mouthful of worm killer believing this would solve the problem, knowing that the mild winter had not reduced the worm population left in the grass last year. This remedy did not work for continued to die, so we took a dead one to the M.A.F.F. veterinary investigation unit at Sutton Bonnington for post mortem. Their tests revealed a medium level of worm infestation and a high level of coccidia infection, but the cause of death was kidney failure for which their is no Apparently obvious reason. attributable kidney failure is becoming a major problem in youngish lambs and no remedy is to hand.

All sheep need to have a certain level of coccidia in the stomach to help food digestion etc. but when that beneficial level is exceeded in lambs they soon

succumb, so to reduce the level in our lambs we had to dose them with a liquid antibiotic which looked like a mixture of washing-up liquid and lager, for three It seems to have stopped days running. them dying, but those that have damaged intestines will be a long time growing. This is good news as ex farm pig prices are now 25% above last years and are likely to rise even further by Christmas as supplies become short.
