POLYTECHNIC RUMOURS.


Rumours about the future of the Polytechnic Site in Totley have been bandied about a great deal recently. Where does rumour begin and how much truth is there in it? We were very glad to have the chance recently of talking to Peter Downey who is the Principal Assistant for Resource Planning of the Polytechnic as he was able to give a good perspective view of the overall situation.

First of all, there is not, and there will not be for some months yet, any definite and agreed plan or timetable as to the future of the Polytechnic Site. The Poly as a whole is at present short of space and planning to take an increased number of students next year so it cannot move out of any of its many sites in Sheffield until some new facilities have been built. It will be, at the very least, a few months before a start is made on any new building work and there is as yet no final decision as to where that building will be so speculation about the timing of any move out of Totley is premature.

On the other hand the necessary new building work is most unlikely to be at Totley and so the evacuation of the site by the Poly is almost certain to happen at some time in the future. Without any decision having been finally made it would seem that the land (excluding Totley Hall one assumes) would be used for building and that would mean some 20 acres of new housing. In view of the timing mentioned above however no start on any such development can be expected for at least two and probably more years. Having gained this authoritative view from the Poly we hope that we shall be able to report events as they happen in the future and prevent unnecessary speculation concern in the area.



Around

Totley

Malk No 13. A Traverse along the Eastern Edges. Distance 13 miles. Allow $6\frac{1}{2}$ to 7 hours. Hiking boots desirable.

13 may be unlucky for some but not for us. This is a classy trek through field pastures and moorland slopes with never a dull yard and glorious views en route. Now that the lambing season is in full swing ensure that all dogs are under proper control.

Start from Totley Post Office. Proceed down Totley Hall Lane using route No 5 (June 1989 issue) via Gillfield Wood, Fanshaw Gate Hall, Lidgate, Horsley Gate, Cordwell Valley, Smeekley Woods, Carr Lane, Ramsley Moor to Fox Lane (Shillito Wood). Walk for approx 1 mile to the right past Ramsley Reservoir. Cross the busy A621 road with care to where Clod Hall Lane meets Curbar Lane. Proceed for 200 yds along the latter and on our right stile and markers point the route forward on to Big Moor. The path is well defined gradual climb to the escarpment known as Swine Sty. This whole moorland area is teeming with historical interest (field systems and stone circles) and under the control of the Peak National Park Authority. Observe the Country Code and byelaws! Continue along the crest of the ridge towards the summit cairn of White Edge (Trig. Point) En route you will notice numerous badger setts and wildlife. Enjoy the breathtaking views and take a lunch break on these lofty heights. (approx 7 miles completed). The views extend to beyond Matlock, all the White Peak, Axe Edge, Shining Tor, Kinder Scout, Bleaklow and even Bolsover Castle is visible on a good day.

The path keeps to the edge of the moor at a steady height of around 1200 ft as we towards White Lodge proceed dominates the skyline. White Lodge is now used as an outdoor pursuits centre (once a gamekeepers lodge). After 1½ miles from White Edge summit we pass the large gritstone block known as the Hurkling Stone. Paths descend from here adjacent to a wall towards the Froggatt Road and the Grouse Inn, but we still keep forward where a finger post points the route towards the Longshaw Estate. After 1/2 mile from the wall we join another path from White Lodge and adjacent to a stile swing hard right towards White Edge Moor. Markers show the route to Lady's Cross (ancient guide stone). From here it is just a few hundred yards across the moor

to Barbrook Bridge (Ladder stile climb). Walk for 150 yds along the road towards Owler Bar and a gate on our left takes us into Totley Moss. The track threads for 1 mile under Flask Edge. Note the rail tunnel airshaft over to our left. (This section of walk mentioned in the May 1989 issue. Walk No 4.). Join the main track from Longshaw Estate and Airshaft and we are soon above the rifle range area. Once again the views are first class, this time taking in the huge sprawl Sheffield and the South Yorkshire scene. Proceed either by rifle range area path and lower rail airshaft or follow the bridle track via Bole Hill Lodge and Lane down to Moss Road, Lane Head Road, sportsfield near the "Cricket cobbled causeway, Chapel Lane and back to Hillfoot Road and Totley Post Office. Nothing difficult about this walk for it is well signed round the moorland areas and a guarantee you will meet very few other hiking parties on these unspoilt tops.

GARDENING TIPS

I hope you have all taken idvantage of the mild spell to do your tidying up, raking & cutting lawns, cleaning the greenhouse etc

Something new this mouth. Mr Fothergill, the seed people have given us the O.K. to publish extracts from their gardening guide. They are a bit more explicit and a picture is worth a lot of words. Let us know whether you think it is a good idea, especially if you are a beginner. Complete guides are available from the shop.

Flowers. Prepare supports for your perennials. Twigs like pea sticks are effective and are soon covered by the growing plants. Don't use green sticks as they might take root.

* Hardy annuals sown last month can be thinned out to encourage stocky plants.

* Sweet peas can be planted out.

- * Keep beds free of weeds and mulch them to make it easier to retain moisture.
- Resist the temptation to buy bedding plants. Wait until next month.
- * Plant tender bulbs like gladioli. If soil is heavy, put a handful of sharp sand at the bottom of the bulb hole.

Greenhouse. Sensitive plants and seedlings should be protected by shading.

- Start tuberous begonias into growth by burying tubers hollow side up in trays of moist peat. Keep warm then pot on.
- * Take softwood cuttings from plants coming into growth. Use strong, clean healthy shoots.

Fruit. Watch out for disease in apples and pears. If scab and mildew were present last year, spray when leaves start to unfold and continue this month. Nimrod T.or Supercarb should do the trick.

* Renew mulches on bush and cane fruit

and rhubarb.

Vegetables. Finish planting early potatoes at the beginning of the month them plant second earlies. Sow brussels sprouts, autumn cabbage, late summer & autumn cauliflower in seed bed and small rows of lettuce and radish every three weeks to avoid glut.

- * Also sow broad beans, carrots, herbs, onions, peas etc. when ground is workable.
- * Use up spare space in beds to grow quick vegetables. See illustrations.

Trees and Shrubs. If weather is dry make sure your newly planted shrubs are watered.

- Forsythia, winter jasmine, flowering currents and other winter flowering shrubs can be cut back to within a few buds of the old growth once the flowers have finished.
- Prune late flowering clematis, hybrid tea and floribunda roses.

Rouse Plants. Gently wash leaves of foliage plants and stand them outside in warm rain showers.

- Pot on geranium and young house plants like begonias and gloxinias.
- Pot up rooted cuttings of dahlias, fuchsias and chrysanthemums.
- * Feed your plants regularly except newly potted until about six weeks.


Lawns. Rake, scarify, spike and aerate.

- Start or continue routine mowing.
- * Apply lawn dressing or liquid feed.
- Seed new lawns. Keep well watered in dry weather.
- * Attack patches of moss with moss killer.
- * Don't cut lawns too short at first or you will have yellow patches to deal with later.

The recent spell of dry, warm weather has encouraged rapid growth of both grass and cereals, with Oilseed Rape showing signs of flowering a month in advance of its usual season. The raspberries are also breaking bud, with the early varieties throwing out flower stems and initiating new canes ready for next years crop. These new canes, "spawn" we call them, have to be protected against fungal attack, as do the flower buds, and this week we applied the first protective spray - fully five weeks ahead of last years date. Cereals also are a month ahead of the normal growth stage, and a very early harvest looks certain. Most crops look very well. although the mild weather has allowed mildew etc. to become established on the winter barleys.

Although many farmers have finished lambing and turned their ewes and lambs out into the fields, we are only just starting. I don't know quite how we have managed it but we have not had our usual four or five pre-lambing abortions this year. It would appear that calcium deficiency is the "in" problem this year, with many farmers having severe cases. This usually occurs just prior to lambing when the rapid growth of the lambs combined with the enlargement of the udder initial milk production, requires exceptional calcium intake. It can also

occur after lambing when milk production is at its peak. When deficient the ewe quickly becomes distressed and can collapse and die within hours. However, response to the cure is equally as quick with the animal often getting up and walking away within minutes of being injected with Calcium Boroglutanate. Sadly, as happened to us this week, although the ewe responded quickly, her lambs were born dead three days later.

Like most farmers we have just about finished clearing up the windblown trees and replaced the fallen tiles, gutters etc. We seem to have had very few "still" days so far this year, but the wind has dried things up enabling contractors to apply 70 tonnes of lime to some of our land to correct soil acidity and promote more healthy and vigorous plant growth.

Could I end by asking all walkers to adhere to recognised footpaths when in the country and refrain from allowing their dogs to romp around in the crops, particularly cereals, potatoes and fruit. Remember a farm is really a big garden, which the farmer tends as you would your flower garden etc., and it is also his means of earning a livelihood. So please treat his "garden" as you would expect him to respect yours.



A RETAILER'S REPLY

Dear Sir,

I read with great interest the article by local farmer, Edwin Pocock in the February Independent. Whilst seeing his point of view, I really must disagree with some of his comments.

Whilst in some cases prices are high, especially supermarket pre-packed goods, local shops try to keep the price of goods at a reasonable level as high prices help no-one. As for wholesalers only taking 10p a pound on carcases this is a load of rubbish as no one with overheads of rent, rates, electrics, transport and especially wages could possibly survive on this "profit" margin no matter what volume was handled.

Local shops have all the above expenses to deal with, also, when dealing with meat in carcase form, especially beef, at least a third of the original weight is lost in fat and bones before it is ready for selling. The practice by farmers of selling the subsidised beef and lamb to overseas buyers for higher prices also keeps the wholesale prices at home artificially high.

Since the article appeared I hear that Mr Pocock has stopped selling lamb and pork from his farm for the freezer. He has obviously found out at first hand the staggering(!) profits from these ventures.



LETTERFROM SCOTLAND

POLL TAX REVISITED.

There's just a chance you'll have noticed the arrival of Poll Tax with the daffodils - if you live in Totley, or nearby England, that is. North of the Border we're all veterans of twelve months of the Westminster Experiment and its interesting the difference makes. According to which politician is lying through his teeth to you, nonpayment of Poll Tax in Scotland varies from 10% to 60% including the Lord Provost of Edinburgh who is reputed to be a bit miffed in having to fork out £2000 on top of her council house rent. It's a bit difficult deciding between those who are not paying because they can get away with defaulting those who are and it politically, but it's quite clear the overwhelming administrative machinery is seizing up and funny stories of mistakes are legion. I myself have had two red final demands for wrong amounts for tax I've already paid! All the same I believe most people have paid up, because its not all that different from paying rates, but some pretty close scrutiny of Council and Regional spending is rearing its welcome head. Strathclyde is much like Sheffield politically, and people have been asking why it's been prudent to spend £9 million on image advertising to ourselves when we've no choice which region we're in anyway, and there's still a hefty crop of potholes (and underpaid teachers) about, or why a crofter deprived of every council service should have to fork out to promote Glasgow's "City of Culture" junketing. We haggis hunters are also wondering why those MP's who gleefully voted for Poll Tax in Scotland have suddenly gone bananas now that England has joined the club, and have suddenly thought of "alternatives" (formerly called tax property "rates") and local income tax (formerly impractical!) In fact, called alternatives have been met with guffaws, so, despite the reality that Scotland does not vote Conservative, it looks as though Poll Tax is here to stay in the absence of anything better.

So just be very careful how you let them spend yours.

Over the year Totley had 6 inches more rain than Weston Park (February producing over 1 inch more) - 5 months being above average and 6 below. No, there's nothing wrong with my maths - one month achieved the average - all but! December and April were double the average, but by contrast in September (average 63 mm) we struggled to 26 mm in Totley (still slightly above Weston Favk) and this made it the driest

month of the year. The week of 11-17th December produced just over 100 mm against a monthly average of 82 mm. The average for the year is 808 mm and our total for last year 885 mm.

Unfortunately I have no means of checking on the hours the sun shone in Totley but assume that it is less than Weston Park (1724.9 hrs recorded) owing to the hills not breaking the cloud up sufficiently in time for us to benefit as much. Not can I compare wind speed which I would suspect would have made interesting reading especially during the start of this year. The highest wind speed recorded at Weston last year was 54 m.p.h.

There are times when our cloud cover is a blessing sheltering us from the Treezing lower temperatures of Weston Park although it can all work the other way round. Coldest night of the year was -7 c during the last week of November, when below freezing temperatures were the norm, The biggest temperature difference between Torley and Weston Park was as much as 7°C (lower in Totley). June produced its coldest night recorded for this month: 1.4C for Weston Park while 1 C was recorded in Totley. Day temperatures are in general within two degrees of Weston Park, with just an odd instance of bigger difference (6 C being the maximum). On the whole Totley temperatures were lower but not always. May temperatures reached 25 °C where the average is 18.4°C. July produced the hottest day 30.5°C; just 1°C below Weston Park, (23°C being the average) and this was preceded by the warmest night 15.5°C (13°C average) again 1°C below Weston Park.

Since the beginning of this year (up to 3th March) there have been only 6 nights below freezing recorded, contrasting with 15°C recorded during the day of 24th Feb.

In a few years time there should be enough readings to have averages for Totley instead of having to use Weston Park's - then a computer will be needed to sort them out!


