On the site of the present "Fleur de Lys" or near to it stood an older building which probably dated back to the 17th century. Records show that a pub called "Fleur de Lis" was housed there as far back as 1829.

However recent research on documents I have studied for some 12 years leads me to believe that a pub has stood on this spot for at least 430 years. I am almost certain that in 1561 or even before that there was an alehouse called "The Quene" or Queen. This view is supported by the fact that the reign of Elizabeth I started just a few years earlier. The pub would have looked over the village green and may well have been run by a gentleman of that name who certainly lived in Totley then - John Grene.

From the descriptions of local buildings in the mid 16th century "The Quene" would almost certainly have been of timber cruck construction with stone outer walls and straw thatched roof.

SCHOOLS TO MERGE?

As we go to press this month we have learnt that plans have been proposed for Totley County School and All Saints' Church School to be amalgamated into a new school. Discussions have yet to take place so we await further news. With all the changes in educational management which have been announced nationally and the knowledge that our own local authority is short of cash it comes as no surprise that such a move has been proposed.

Obviously parents will be very concerned that the interests of their children will be safeguarded but the governors and staff of both schools are well aware of this concern and will be doing all they can to ensure a sensible outcome of this issue. It seems unlikely that any changes will actually be implemented before September 1992. Parents of children below school age who may be on waiting lists should do nothing for the time being until plans are further developed.

CHERRYTREE HOSTEL, MICKLEY LANE.

Now that we have been operating in our present manner for about 3 years perhaps we can tell you a little about Cherrytree. We have two pleasant houses just above the Cheshire Home. Our aim is to provide accommodation for up to 1 year for single homeless youngsters between the ages of 16 and 21. We seek to provide them with support and advice in their search for more permanent accommodation and their own independence. The youngsters are referred to us by all kinds of Agencies and these include Social Workers, Colleges, Youth Training Scheme Counsellors, Probation Officers and Advice Centres. Our criteria for accepting youngsters is firstly their need and their suitability for what we have to offer, and then consideration for the thousand and one reasons why they are in distress. We do make the point however that we cannot accept youngsters with particular problems that require professional help. We seek to run two homes which are as near as possible like other peoples homes. We can call on 6 staff and there are usually 17 youngsters with us at any time.

Let us give you an example of a 16 year old whom we recently took in. He was living in a barn in Totley and was regularly attending a Youth Training Scheme and trying hard to preserve what pride he still had. He is now settling down very well and maturing with every week that passes. All of our residents have sad stories to tell and we would not claim for a moment that we always manage to put things right. Indeed, if we find that we have accepted someone by mistake whose social behaviour is more than we can handle we take immediate steps to discharge that person. We are not, of course, a reform hostel or a bail hostel.

You would be amazed at some of the desperate situations which force these youngsters to turn to us for help. Sometimes the causes are of their own making, but usually they are not. In 1990 we helped 35 young people on their way and we feel some pride in that achievement. Whilst they are with us we make it our business to see that they are gainfully occupied during the day. Currently 6 are on Youth Training Schemes, 3 at College, 3 still adjusting to life at Cherrytree and therefore not yet employed, 1 in a "proper" job, 2 in Employment Training, 1 at School and 1 doing voluntary work. You will see that variety and activity are the key notes. Most of the youngsters spent Christmas at Cherrytree with their friends and that was a particularly happy and traditional occasion.

JIM McADIE.

It is with shock and sorrow that we hear, as we go to press with this edition of the Independent, of the sudden death of Jim McAdie on Thursday 7th February while on a business visit to Ghana.

He, his wife Gill, and his three sons, Neil, Andrew and Stuart came to Sheffield from Southport in 1977. Originally from Wick in northern Scotland, he and his family were soon at home in Totley - enjoying the Derbyshire countryside and the worship and fellowship of Dore & Totley United Reformed Church. He became an elder in the U.R.C. in 1980 and gave much of his spare time to his pastoral eldership and work among the young people at the Church.

His business visits abroad brought him face-to-face with the problems of third-world countries, so it was understandable that he put his ecumenical efforts into the local arrangements for Christian Aid and for One World Week which is held at the end of October each year. His vision and concern for the world came from his Christian belief that all in the world is part of God's creation - to be respected and carefully and responsibly used for the benefit of all.

We, on the Independent, offer to Gill, to the family and to the U.R.C. our thoughts and sympathy at this time.

To meet the date to go to print, this was written when we still had snow and ice in plenty. When the sun was shining on the sparkling snow, looking from the windows of the Home was like looking at an animated Christmas Card. Not so nice for the staff and visitors who had to be out in it though! We are indebted to Mr Pocock for using his snowplough to clear the forecourt and to the staff who worked tirelessly to keep it clear. We are hoping that the snow will have gone before the A.G.M. which will be held on Tuesday 12th March at the Home. Thinking of warm, sunny days ahead, we are already making plans for the annual Garden Party which will be held this year on 22nd June. But, before that the Spring Coffee Morning will be on Wednesday 10th April when we shall hope to see as many of our friends as possible.

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GARDENING TIPS

I must say I'm glad to see the back of February (although I don't like wishing my life away) and hopefully the last of the snow. Things are starting to wake up. When the snow melted the daffodil shoots were there waiting for a bit of sun. My new Hamamelis mollis (witch hazel) has flowered and it is very nice too. I keep talking to my two walnuts from my tree which I planted but they have not put any shoots out yet. March is usually considered to be one of the busiest months in the garden so lets get cracking.

Flowers. Harden off plants over-wintered in frames or indoors.

- * Work in a balanced fertilizer such as Growmore round herbaceous plants.
- * Water newly planted perennials in dry weather.
- * Remove and destroy mouldy or yellowing tulip and daffodil bulbs from beds.
- * Keep checking for slugs and put down bait if necessary.
- * Set out bought perennials and autumn sown sweet peas late in the month unless weather is very bad.
- * Plant gladioli corms in trays and start off in slight warmth for planting out in April.
- * Make sowings in warmth of annuals and summer bedding plants.
- * At the end of the month sow hardy annuals direct in the border.
- * Take cuttings of early flowering chrysanthemums and dahlias. Root in warmth.

Vegetables. Sow in situ broad beans, peas, spinach, onions, parsnips etc.

- * Sow in a seed bed cabbage, sprouts, broccoli, leeks.
- * Sow lettuce under cloches or choose a hardy variety.
- * Clear up old crops and prepare area for salads and new vegetables.
- * Dig trench for runner beans.

Fruit. Plant out raspberries and strawberries.

- * Complete the planting of tree and bush fruits early in month.
- * Prune newly planted bush-cane fruits.
- * Spray all fruits against aphids and caterpillars as soon as seen.

- * Feed cane and tree fruits with balanced fertilizer. Feed blackcurrants with Nitro Chalk.

Trees and Shrubs. Prepare ground for new trees and shrubs. Firm in newly planted stock and those loosened by frost.

- * Apply mulch especially around new additions.
- * Plant out heathers and deciduous shrubs.
- * Towards the end of the month plant evergreen shrubs, conifers and hedging.
- * Prune autumn flowering shrubs which flower on the tips of new growth.

Greenhouse and Indoor Plants. Shade seedlings, young plants and those established plants which require shading from strong sun.

- * Gradually increase watering.
- * Feed actively growing plants with high potash feed. Top dress plants such as ferns and aspidistras with potting compost.
- * Pot up cyclamen seedlings and rooted offsets of house plants.
- * Summer annuals can be sown now for later planting in pots - cigar plant, busy lizzie, stocks, marigolds and zinnias.
- * Take leaf cuttings of African violets and Cape primrose.
- * Houseplants like maidenhair fern, button fern, spider plants can be divided and re-potted.


Lawns. Deal with bare patches by re-turfing or re-seeding.

- * Allow the ground to settle before seeding new lawns. Wait till the end of the month.
- * Keep newly turfed lawns well watered. Support the edges to prevent crumbling or breaking.




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
SOW THINLY IN TRAYS OF WELL FIRMED, MOIST SEED COMPOST AT DEPTH SHOWN ON SEED PACKET.



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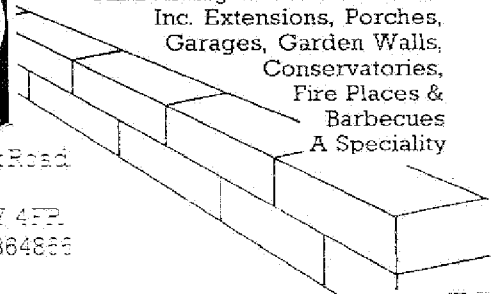
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TALES OF THE UNBELIEVABLE.

There is such a wide range of subjects at the various adult classes so that there is now a very limited excuse for either ignorance or idleness. We are particularly fortunate in having Abbeydale Hall right on our doorstep with a wide range of subjects to enhance our knowledge. The overnight journey had been long and the smooth motion of the train made one feel decidedly sleepy. Suddenly the compartment door opened and four elegantly dressed gentlemen came in - two with rolled up umbrellas and briefcases, two with slightly curled moustaches.

The two with bowler hats removed them carefully and one of them said "Do you speak French?" I did not think I should commit myself beyond a careful "Oui". "And you are English, of course?" I replied that I was. He turned to his colleagues. "We are in luck, Giles, Jean, Louis". Again to me he said, "May I explain?" I nodded. "We four are two from the French Embassy and two from the Foreign Office. We have a most important mission which we must complete this very day, in fact,

before we reach Paris. Unfortunately neither I nor my friend are fluent in French and the two Frenchmen do not understand English, but we must translate these most secret documents, so that we all understand the undercurrents afoot in Europe. It is true to state that the fate of the continent depends on it. Do we have your vow of complete silence afterwards?" "Of course" I managed to say.

He spread his papers and rapidly I turned from one to another, fluently explaining both fact and text. (Ian would have been proud of me, I thought!). They made copious notes and finally they folded their papers, closed their briefcases and with a cautious "Remember", they left the compartment. I think that the exercise had left me exhausted and I dropped off again to awaken as the train pulled into the Gare du Nord. I put my head out of the carriage window trying to catch a glimpse of the diplomats, probably hastening for a taxi. I looked up and down the platform but never saw them. I wonder where they went?

Weather Up-date

As I write this it is cold and raw with temperatures around freezing for days. The long, hot summer seems a myth, but the records prove that it really did happen. Our hottest day was in August when it reached a grand 32 C, 1½ C above last years highest. Western Park managed 34 C (the long term average, 1951-80, for the month was 23.1 C). On the whole Totley is cooler than Western Park, but for the month of June, Totley temperatures were higher for most of the month, although cooler at night. The same applied to a good number of days in May and a few in July. By contrast to this heat, the coldest night was -4 C in April (long term average for this month 3.9 C) with 23 nights below freezing during the year, whereas Western Park recorded a low of -1.8 C with 11 nights below freezing.

Despite the cry of drought, more rain was recorded during the year than the long term average (which is 808 mm). Western Park recorded 763 mm and Totley 866½ mm although I'm not all that sure if my melting of the snow during the blizzard in December gave me a correct reading, mine being much lower than Western Park. 1989 produced 885 mm. There were 4 months with above average rainfall, (3 of which were more than double the average) 6 with less than average rainfall (2 were less than half the average), 1 was average and December remains unsure. One day in January produced over an inch of rain but October had the wettest day with 1.78 ins. The longest day (in June) produced 0.75 ins of rain with a temperature of 22 C! Anyone for a sauna? The driest periods were end April - beginning May (10 days) and end May when there were possibly 14 days on the trot without rain.

The highest wind recorded at Western Park for 1990 was in January (76 m.p.h. - 24 m.p.h. more than last year). The sunniest day at Western Park was 14.9 hrs on 24th July.

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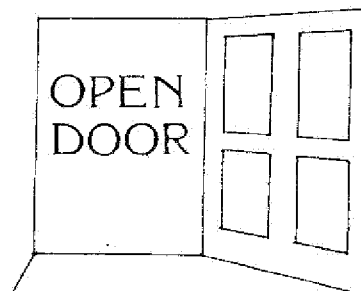
