WHAT IS HAPPENING IN TOTLEY

There are many proposed developments taking place at the moment with the latest news of the proposal to build a Totley Green Village, taking approximately 20 acres with a further 25 acres to be turned into a possible golf course, on the area known as Bramhall's farm. The development outlines plans for 180 dwelling plus church, rectory and a public house.

Other developments include building on Summer Lane, building on the old scout hut land, building on the polytechnic site and, although nothing has actually started yet, building behind the shops on Totley Rise.

After discussing the newest proposal for Totley Green Village in what is currently <u>green belt</u> your Totley Residents Association, at their meeting on Monday the 17th.June have decided to organise a Public Meeting to be held in the barn on Edwin Pocock's Farm,Totley Hall Lane. A representative from Sheffield City Planning Department has been invited to be present in order for your queries to be answered.

BEYOND CURBAR GAP.

Visitors to the charming area of Curbar, Calver and Froggatt find the ideal spot to explore the area by parking the car at the popular Curbar Gap site. Instead of using the well-trodden Curbar and Froggatt Edges be a little more adventurous and seek out fresh venues. There is a combination of scenery and historical interest to beckon us forward so let us take a walk of some 6 miles in a southerly direction.

After leaving the gap a gate leads to a track along Baslow Edge. Delightful views unfold in all directions. The gentle path is fringed by Eagle Stone Flat Moor and Blackstone Edge. Our first interest is the huge gritstone block that dominates the moor. The Eagle Stone has many routes scaled by keen climbers. Legends of old decreed that local youths had to attain this height to win the hands of the fair maidens of Baslow. 250 yds from the rock Wellington's monument stands sentinel over the escarpment of Blackstone Edge. This is a tribute to the Iron Duke by Dr Wrench, the benefactor of Baslow, built in 1866. The noble doctor had been a surgeon in many of the battle campaigns. The elevation at this site at nearly 1000 ft gives views unsurpassed towards Chatsworth and the Derwent Valley. Descend the path between Blackstone and Baslow Edge. This area is known as Jack Flat. Go carefully through oak and silver birch and bilberries in profusion. You may see fairies in these secret glades! Cross a footbridge over Bar Brook which is a stream feeder of the Derwent and rises on the slopes of our own Totley Moss. History abounds for beyond the junction of Curbar and Clod Hall lanes are the ruins of an old corn mill and 18th century lead smelting works with beehive shaped cupola furnaces. Even Blackstone Edge WAS quarried for the stone moulds to work the pigs of lead.

Cross the A621 Sheffield to Baslow Rd and pick up a path on the opposite side above Cupola Cottage and cross a wooded slope towards the crags of Gardoms Edge. Pause by a large slab of rock where a wall line joins from the edge above. This spot deserves a coffee break - just to drink in the view of green Chatsworth is sweetness itself. Continue along the moorland path note the Cat Stones and the airy heights of Birchen Edge with peeps of Nelson's monument. His ships (Victory, Defiant and Royal Sovereign) are inscribed on the gritstone rocks. Climb over the stile to the A619 Baslow to Chesterfield Rd.


Cross the road to a stile. A finger post points the route into the Devonshire estate. Negotiate steep concrete steps and footbridge over the Umberly Brook. Cross a second stile and yellow markers show the into the lush green meadows of way Chatsworth. To the left is the steep line of Chatsworth Edge where rock climbers may be seen. Negotiate two more stone stiles and we are into the open landscape. Just over to the left are the Queen Victoria Jubilee rocks, an ideal spot for a lunch break. If you sit quietly you may see the herd of deer that roam this end of the park. Follow the yellow markers towards the kissing gate below Park Lodge. A main track leads out towards Nether End and the village of Baslow. Before crossing the bridge over the Bar Brook note the quaint thatched roof cottages, the finest in the Peak. Cross the main road by traffic signals and walk along Eaton Hill turning right into Bar Road. The lane steepens past fashionable residences and peters out into a rough surfaced bridle track. A few yards beyond and by the side of an old stone trough on our left we regain a steep field area above Gorse Bank Farm, Follow the path signs until we join Baslow Moor just below Baslow Edge. Take the lower path which levels out into a lovely green swarth. There are fine views to Cliff College and towards Longstone Edge. The path strikes directly for the village of Curbar and at the edge of the moor we discover another bit of history. The Cundy Graves are not so well known as the enclosures of Riley's Graves at Eyam but this ill-fated Cundy family were to suffer the same end from the dreaded plague at the earlier date of 1632. Five graves in a cluster with an inscribed plate on rock gives brief information.

Turn immediately to our right and start climbing up the moor towards Curbar Gap. After 200 yds a wooden marker finds us another Cundy grave. Just above, another main path swings us back towards the Curbar road. This is horse riding country and the paths do tend to get a little muddy. As we wend our way back to the gap and past Warren Lodge (gamekeeper's residence) the glorious finish of a first class walk unfolds views of the Hope Valley and Win Hill.

My friendly sheep came ambling across the fence. "I'm pleased see to you again," she "You said, always try to help me with my questions





Trees on Totley Brook road to be pruned back, Shape restaurant on Abbeydale Road South has closed to make way for offices,Les Firth's new computer can't spell. The bushes on Green Oak Avenue have been cut back at last. Lemont Road has been dug up and resurfaced. The old scout hut land on Totley Hall Line has been put up for sale, is this the first of many developments in the area? Sheffield City Council decide 15 road crossings urgently required in Sheffield but cannot afford them, incidentally Totley was not in the 15 areas.

Well here we are at the middle of June and blue ears seem to be around us. A large area of North Eastern England has become a restricted area as sixteen herds have been affected by the dreaded virus. The rest of the country also has blue ear problems, with all outdoor pigs, cows sheep and humans suffering from an untimely dose of cold windy weather!

To those of you who are concerned about the possibility of becoming infected through eating pork, can I reasure you by stating that this virus first appeared in the U.S.A. some time ago before spreading to the continent this year, and at no time has anyone been affected either by personal contact or through eating pork products. In fact the virus seems to be very specific in that it mainly affects breeding sows, causing abortions, stillbirths and post natal deaths. It has a minimal effect on growing pigs and <u>does</u> not spread to other animals or birds. The main effect on infected pigs seems to be to lower their resistance to other diseases already endemic in the herds.

Our lambs are now growing fast, with the biggest ones now approaching sale weight of approximately 90 lbs. We are now dosing them monthly with a warming drench to kill the roundworms, tapeworms and lungworms they continually pick up from the grass. The ewes are due for shearing now but the cold weather has precluded this.

We have some green strawberries on our plants, but it will be July before there are enough ripe ones to begin picking. The raspberries are in mid flower and look to be about to produce a very good crop. The branches of the blackcurrent bushes are bowed down to the ground by the weight of an enormous crop, as are the gooseberries, although these much younger bushes are not very big yet. Potato crops are poking their heads out of the ground now, but are not liking what they see, and so are very slow to grow and in some cases have been beheaded by the late frosts.

The more "normal" summer weather we are currently enduring has delayed the start of haymaking, and looks set to delay the onset of harvest too. Crops are very slowly maturing, with Oilseed Rape now losing its flowers, winter barley fully into ear and winter wheat with the ears just emerging.



GARDENING TIPS

I hope your gardens are doing a bit better than mine, everything seems to have stopped, even the plants in the greenhouse are behind let's hope July/August are better and your produce has a boost in time for the Produce Show. The organisation for the show is underway and we have got one or two nice prizes from our sponsors, so get cracking they are really worth having. Have a go ,it's a bit of fun and you may well win a prize.

FLOWERS


*Regular dead heading will encourage many plants to give more flowers. *Water & feed regularly, not just a splash, give them a good drink. (The water people are asking us to take care, so please be careful not to waste it , sprinklers are not essential. *Give sweet peas, dalias & chrysanths a liquid feed & then mulch them , they will give you a lovely reward later. *Cut down lupins & delphiniums *Clip over alpines & rock plants. *Cut & dry everlasting flowers such as helichrysum, static lavender as soon as they are at their best. over. *Sow forget-me-nots, Brompton stock pansies & violas for planting Autumn or Spring. *Take cuttings of pinks to give more plants for next year. *Keep aphids down by regular spraying, I've found the Bio friendly one quite good and it doesn't kill ladybirds & lace wings. GREENHOUSE *In hot weather you may have to water twice a day, try to avoid midday, morning & evening are better. *Damp down paths & staging to keep things cooler. *Pinch out tips of tomatoes when they reach the eaves. *Remember to keep plants shaded & well ventilated. *Spray with insecticide at first sign of pest. *Take tip cuttings of geraniums, fuchias, cherry pie, regal pelagoniums étć. *Arrange for someone to water & tend your plants whilst you are away on holiday. FRUIT *Thin out fruitlets on apples & pears after the "June drop" to improve fruit quality. LAWNS *Clean up & clip over strawberry beds when fruiting is over. *Stop side shoots & pollinate melons, give liquid feeds. *Summer prune apple, pear, cherry, peach, plums & blackcurrants.

*Cut out raspberry canes which have fruited. *For an early crop of strawberries next year, plant out runners, these need to be covered by cloche from December to February. VEGETABLES *Clear away early vegetable plants as soon as the crop is harvested weed & fork over the site ready for follow on crops. *Plant vegetable seedlings leeks, sprouts, cabbage & sprouting broccoli. *Stop watering onions (August) as they start to yellow and bend the leaves *Water marrows regularly & apply high potash feed (Keep an eye on the one for the Show) *Lots of vegetables can be sown at this time for late cropping, choose hardy varieties. *Pick runner beans regularly. *Cut cucumbers & marrows as soon as ready don't leave them on the plant. TREES & SHRUBS *Water & mulch around azaleas, rhododendrons, hydrangers & magnolias. *Take cuttings to increase your stock of buddlia, clematis, cotoneaster etc. hold in open frame. *Take cuttings of camellia, firethorn & root indoors in warmth. *Prune Summer shrubs as soon as they have finished flowering. Houseplants *Shade & water regularly give liquid feed to flowering & fruiting plants. *Spray all but hairy leaved plants, put on pebbles to increase humidity. *Take stem cuttings to increase your stock. *Some houseplants will enjoy a spell in the garden. *Re-pot your houseplants if they have outgrown their present pot. *End of July into August is a good time to sow a new lawn. *Mow & trim, water dry patches, do not cut too close in hot weather. *Spiking a lawn will help water penetration and aeration on very compacted ground.

FRIENDS OF ABBEYDALE WILDLIFE GARDEN

HELP ARE YOU CONCERNED ABOUT THE WORLD'S DISAPPEARING WILDLIFE? DO YOU FEEL FRUSTRATED BY THE SHEER SIZE OF THE PROBLEM? Abbeydale Wildlife Garden as you may know is being restored by Sheffield Conservation Volunteers. The ponds have been partly dredged and vegetation cleared. This will allow the ponds to develop as a more healthy and stable ecosystem. Frogspawn and Sticklebacks are now abundant in the main pond. Other wildlife habitats been have also developed. The woodland edge is now the home for many birds, and the wildlife meadow, marsh area and nectar garden attract many insects such as butterflies. the path is being improved to allow disabled access and increase the value of the garden as a site for the study and enjoyment of wildlife. How can you help? Would you be prepared to spend a little time on events or fund lf so, then we are raising? verv interested in setting up a Friends group. The aim would be to adopt the site as a Community Wildlife Area, to help in wildlife conservation and interpretation and to generally help to watch over this valuable site. Along with the physical work being done garden, ín the the long term development of the garden will rely on support and help from local residents. As recognition of the importance of the garden it is designated as a "Community Wildlife Area" in Sheffield's Nature Conservation Strategy. 




