

The old building now in serious disrepair stands behind Totley Rise shops and overlooks the large field which was once Totley Rolling Mill Dam. The Mill closed in the 1880's and older residents may remember the skating which used to take place on the dam. When the dam wall was demolished, the stone was used for the tea room extension to the Wagon and Horses Inn at Millhouses. ex village policeman. Sid Andrew, recalled some time ago seeing elephants wandering around on this field, they belonged to a travelling circus passing through the area.

THE CURRENT SITUATION

In September 1987, an Outline Planning application was made to the City of Sheffield Department of Land and Planning for the building of 25 dwelling houses on "Thompsons" field, at the end of Laverdene Avenue and bordered by Back Lane and Milldale Road.

After meetings of people affected by the proposal, objections to the scheme were sent to the Planning department and subsequently the plans were rejected by the Planning Committee, and in early January 1990, objectors to the scheme were informed of the committee's decision.

Unfortunately, after an appeal by the applicant to the Department of The Environment, the Planning Committee's decision was over-ruled by an Inspector from the Department. The current situation is that on the 19th. of July 1991, Chesterman Addy Ltd. have presented to the Planning Department plans for the erection of 25 Dwelling Houses with Garages and the plans are now being considered by the Department of Land and Planning.

Many objections have been received by the Planning Department and I have been informed that there are problems to be overcome before the plans can be submitted to the Planning Committee.

The date of the Planning Committee meeting to consider the planning application has not yet been decided, we hope to be able to inform you of the date as soon as the Planning Department are ready to do so.



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MINI & JUNIOR RUGBY AT ABBEYDALE

The Rugby season has just started and Sheffield R.U.F.C, at Abbeydale Sports Club, are looking for new recruits to join their mini and junior sides.

are looking for new recruits to join their mini due junct in we get the chance to try As rugby today is seldom played in schools, and few boys now get the chance to try the game, there is concern that the future of the game is in jeopardy. The RUFC, through such clubs as Sheffield, are anxious to do all they can to offer boys the chance to play rugby and actively encourage and welcome all new members. Age groups from under eights to Colts (potential senior side players) are catered for, with a full season of coaching and matches already organised.

Younger boys start with mini rugby which is played on a guarter size pitch with simple rules which bear safety in mind and allow the basic skills and laws of the the game to be learned. As players progress each year and move to an older age group, the rules change to allow more advanced play to be introduced, so that by the age of thirteen, games are played under full Rugby Union rules.

thirteen, games are played under full kagby onton futer. Rugby is a game which enables boys to learn a great deal of self discipline, many being shocked to learn that unlike their soccer heroes, a rugby player <u>never</u> argues with the referee (despite what he may think) and the indulging in amateur dramatics is discouraged gaining no sympathy whatsoever. Rugby is a team game and in coaching, much emphasis is put on working together to achieve the required results.

much emphasis is put on working together to achieve and thus are not able to enjoy the Many boys who perhaps lack basic ability at soccer and thus are not able to enjoy the game as much as they could, start playing rugby and find that they can enjoy the game without a high level of skill. Because of this, they can go on to develop their ability and become proficient players. Size does not matter either as, particularly at this level, there is a position for every shape and size. Coaching at Abbeydale is geared to let the boys learn whilst having disciplined fun and on match days, all boys get to play regardless of ability.

This seasons itinerary includes sixteen coaching sessions, fourteen matches, a tournament, social events and a trip for the boys to Twickenham to see a major game. Coaching and matches are held on Sunday mornings commencing at 10-30 on the top rugby pitch at Abbeydale and all new members are welcome. 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
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
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
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LETTERS FROM FORMER RESIDENTS

GARDENING TIPS

Well another show over I hope those that attended enjoyed it, most of the people I have spoken to said it was a good little show, we would have liked more people to attend and a few more entries would have been nice, perhaps those of you who didn't go this year will make a special effort next year. It is nice when all the hard work put in by the organisers is rewarded by enthusiastic support by Totley residents.

Thanks to everyone who helped and to the manufacturers for their generous gifts for prizes. Lets get cracking now and organise your gardens for next years show.

<u>FLOWERS</u> Clean up Borders & Beds.

Prepare ground for Autumn planting.

Top dress rock & alpine plants with fine grit.

Lift half hardy bulbs like acidanthera & gladioli.

Start cutting down & lifting dahlias & chrysanthemums.

Lift & split up herbaceous perrennials.

Plant out spring flowering bulbs & summer flowering anemones, lilies & irises.

Plant out new perennials such as border carnations, pinks, helenium, geum phlox & scabious.

Plant up alpines, aubrieta, campanula, rock pinks, saxifrage and thyme in paving rock gardens and retaining walls. VEGETABLES

Earth up trench celery and leeks, firm in sprouts and earth up round each plant.

Cover over wintering onions, lettuce, spinach with cloches.

Plant out spring cabbage.

Pot up sage, parsley, thyme, & chives and bring indoors to use.

Pick winter and perpetual spinach regularly to encourage new growth.

Lift the last of the main crop potatoes, carrots and turnips.

Lift young parsnips for immediate use, leave others in the ground to pull as required, watch out for slugs. FRUIT

Put grease bands round apple tree and cherry, spray apples cherry, peach and nectarine fungicide against canker. Cover Autumn fruiting strawberries with cloches, new strawberry plants can be put out now.

Prune blackcurrants Pick apples & pears when dry put good fruit into store.

GREENHOUSE & INDOOR PLANTS Keep plants on the dry side, water sparingly. Check bulbs being brought on in darkness, water if necessary. Root fuchsias, geranium, hydrangeas keeping them just moist.

Plant cupe cowslip, freesia, indoor gladioli, Dutch iris etc. to flower in spring & summer keeping them dark until shoots appear.

TREES & SHRUBS

hedge Prepare ground for shrub and newly shelter planted planting, evergreens from cold winds with fine mesh netting. Heel in trees & shrubs delivered before planting site is ready. Take hardwood shrub cuttings to increase your stock. Layer shrubs like daphne and magnolia in pots of peaty compost, set near parent plant.

Shorten bush hybrid, tea & floribunda roses by about a third when flowering is over.


LAWNS

Established lawns need scarifying and raking then spike compacted areas. A top dress of cheap potting compost will do it a power of good especially if it has not been done for a few years.

A good time for laying turf having prepared the ground well, lay in mild weather.

Pick up stones and lightly roll newly seeded lawns, top new grass with mower set high.
