

## GARDENING TIPS FOR APRIL

April is a lovely time with the garden bursting into life. The greenhouse should be full of young plants ready to be put out next month. There's lots to do in April but it is so full of promise for the doming season that it is a really enjoyable time. Keep a steady pace as you work don't over do it.

FLOWERS. Weed, clean up, bed and give the plumbago. Tie in tambler rose shoots as soil a stir ready for new plantings. they develop, time now to remove any Add a bit of fertilizer such as Growmore or wrongly sited conifers

your favourite organic one.

Give your containers a good clean up and replace compost, where necessary,

Spread the old stuff over your flower beds, if it's not too weedy, otherwise add it to your compost heap.

Dead head all flowers as they fade and give plants a foliar feed. This will encourage flowers next year. Water all newly set out plants. Plant out and stake sweet peas a wigwam of canes can make a rather nice feature of these.

Plant out pansies, violas if they are hardened off properly. If not gradually introduce them to the colder outdoors during the day for a week or so covering them at night. Plant up patio pots with summer flowering bulbs. These look good mixed with shrubs and other perennials. Try nerine and asidantheria, my two favourites. Plant dahlia tubers towards the end of the month. Put down slug bait when shoots show. Hybrid lily bulbs can be planted in containers, try 5 to 10 a pot in a rich compost that drains well. They will make a lovely show later on for the patio or conservatory. Plant gladioli bulbs as soon as possible. There is still time to sow all kinds of hardy annuals.

VEGETABLES. Prepare the ground for sowing and planting. Check ph levels and adjust by adding lime etc. Harden off plants grown indoors, such as cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce.

Earth up potatoes, stake peas. Thin seedlings of herbs sown in March. Watch out for caterpillars etc. and deal with them as soon as they appear.

Plant out early and main crop potatoes. Sow salad crops, lettuce, radish, onions. Sow greens, sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower etc., also peas, dwarf beans and broad beans. Sow crops, globe beetroot, carrots and turnips. Prepare your runner bean trench ready for planting beans out next month. Place supports into position and allow 1 plant per support. Keep the hoe going regularly to eliminate weeds.

SHRUBS, TREES & FRUIT. Check ties and renew old or damaged ones and adjust any which are too tight. Make sure newly planted hedges, trees etc. are firmed in. Water and mulch any newly set out plants. Give your rhododendrums and azaeleas a treat with iron sequestrine.

Prune summer flowering hardy fuschias and

plumbago. Tie in rambler rose shoots as they develop, time now to remove any wrongly sited conifers, evergreens, including rhododendrums. Spray roses against black-spot and mildew. Plant out container grown plants and climbers. Prune spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia as soon as flowers fade. Complete rose pruning.

Cut back straggly lavender and heathers. Spray fruit trees just before flowers open against Capsid moth and caterpillars. Spray against aphids as soon as they arrive.

GREENHOUSES AND INDOOR PLANTS. Gradually increase watering, feed established house plants. Shade plants especially seeedongs from strong sun and give increased ventilation. The sowing of half hardy annuals should be completed at the beginning of the month. Many seedlings sown earlier will need pricking out some of most forward ones may need to be potted individually. Fuschias can be potted on into larger pots as theyfill the smaller pots with roots. Sow seeds of melons and cucumber. Germinate them in temperatures around 65degs. Plant successive patches of achimenes. Tubers of begonias and gloxinias started earlier should be ready for potting on. Make up hanging baskets. Attend to watering regularly the water soon dries out when the weather is really bright. Split up ferns. and repot Take begonia, chrysanthemum, dahlia, fuschia and geranium cuttings.

LAWNS. Rake up debris and lightly roll, scarify, spike and aereate. Start or continue routine mowing apply lawn dressing or a liquid feed. Deal with any problems as soon as they are spotted or they will be bigger problems later. April is a good time to seed a new lawn. They must be kept well watered in dry weather.

Well that lot should keep you going for a bit.

#### A CAIRNGORM ADVENTURE

The winter season has been a grim year for mountaineering accidents in the highlands of Scotland. The rescue teams are a tolerant bunch and always accept that the spirit of the hills is still too strong.

I recall one adventurous holiday, back in early May 1953, four of us started the trek into the Cairngorm Range from Braemar. I wanted to camp in Glen Lui above the Linn of Dee. For my other companions this was a first visit to the area and they had visions of the high levels around Glen Avon so I was over ruled and we settled for a camping site on the shores of Loch Avon at around 2500 feet. The long march past Derry Lodge and through Glen produced scenery of the highest order. We waded across the icy waters of the fords of Avon to reach our high level campsite under the crags of Ralbein, our tiny 4 man Wanderlust tent seemed lost in this wild spot. Loch Avon which is about 2 miles long must be the highest valley in Scotland.

I still felt uneasy in selecting such a high valley but we had made our decision and the weather was holding good. The following morning we made an early start for a tough day to climb Cairngorm at 4084 feet and the bulk of Macdui 4296 feet (the highest mountain in the range).

We had a tremendous day in the corries which still held snow. As we descended from the plateau and shores of Loch Avon and the shelter stone, storm clouds started brewing. As we hurried back to the tent the wind increased and it started snowing, friends were tired and simply wanted to rest. Suddenly the weather worsened as a blizzard sprang up, I realised if we stayed put we were in for serious trouble for our tent would have ripped apart.

We had a small bottle of Whisky which came in handy so splitting it four ways it gave us renewed energy to pack up camp and struggle down the valley to safety. Our escape route was to climb over the saddle and traverse the full length of Strath Nethy.

The wind was on our backs as threaded our weary legs down the Glen. The storm was raging around Chap Coire Na Spreidhe at 3772 feet to our left, but every step we took was to the final refuge of the Nethy Bothy (Hut) at the foot of the Glen. Here we were holed up for 16 hours until the storm abated.

The river levels were high as we finally left the shelter and the little burn was lapping against the hut walls. The weather improved and we headed for the village of Aviemore via Glenmore Forest, Loch Morlich and Coylumbridge.

We decided to spend the rest of the holiday on the West side of Scotland. Here the weather was kinder and we able to have glorious days on the around Glencoe.

Nowadays winter sports are bia business around Aviemore and this once sleepy village has become a concrete commercialised township.

The Cairngorms are a tough range of mountains where weather changes can be extreme and this episode was a lesson learned the hard way.




#### TALES OF THE UNBELIEVABLE


