

#### TOTLEY LOCK UP

The old Totley Lock Up still stands to the rear of the former police station opposite the Cross Scythes. The Derbyshire Constabulary premises can be identified by the blank plaque above the door. Details of former bobby Sgt. Andrews appeared in an earlier Totley Independent. Records seem to be sparse but we do know that in 1926 the Totley Police section comprised 1 sergeant and 1 constable in Totley, 1 at Totley Rise (Glover Road), 1 constable at Dore and another at the Holmesfield out-station. The sergeant at Totley occupied the Baslow Road premises and the lock-up had a single cell. When the authority changed to Sheffield in the 1930's the station closed.

#### TOTLEY'S GREEN BELT -NEWS UPDATE

The Sheffield City Council and Inspectors from the Department of the Environment are now well into their Public Inquiry into the Unitary Development Plan Objections.

Readers may remember from previous publicity that Totley's Green Belt is threatened by two main objectors who wish to have certain planning restrictions lifted from the Plan.

Cathelco, a company owned by Mr Bill Salisbury of Chesterfield (formerly of Totley) would like to take a very large part of Hall Lane Farm fields for redevelopment particularly fields of good quality arable land. The amount of land that Cathelco want is so extensive that if they succeeded, the impact on Totley would be enormous. It would also destroy the viability of a farm which has stood on this site for centuries.

Hallam University are the other objectors. Their playing field is just within the Green Belt. They would like to have this playing field (which adjoins Sunnyvale Road/Green Oak Road) removed from the Green Belt. One can only presume at this stage that it is with a view to the land being incorporated into their redevelopment schemes when the site is finally closed as an educational establishment.

Concerns in Totley are still verv high on this contentious issue. Over 500 people have signed the petition that has been in Iotley Library for the past few months. Many people have also written personal letters in support of the Green Belt. Further action by Totley residents who wish to make their presence felt can be taken. The two objectors have indicated that they intend sending representatives to the Town Hall to argue their case. They will do this in front of the Inspectors from the DoE sometime in August (the actual date is not yet known). <u>ANY MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC MAY ATTEND THIS</u> <u>PART OF THE UDP INQUIRY AS OBSERVERS.</u>

Our Council Officer is Paul Gordon. His telephone number is 2735025. Ms . Ross Fairhurst is responsible for the scheduling and rescheduling of the inquiry dates. (The dates are subject to change and are being brought forward possible to speed up whenever the proceedings). She can advise individuals of Totley's dates for these objections and for the other objection affecting a small part of Overcroft Rise. Her Telephone number is 2735087.

A further update will appear in next months Totley Independent. There will be another small exhibition in Totley Library at the beginning of July for those still unclear as to the extent of land under threat.



#### FROM BAMFORD TO TOTLEY

Let us sample a delightful summers walk of some 11 miles, taking in easy paths through riverside, woodland and moorland scenery. Ordnance Survey Sheffield SK28/38 2.5" to 1 mile scale map is useful. A pleasant change from Totley circular walks.

Take the train from Dore to Bamford station. Proceed right along Station Road and after a few yards cross the bridge over the River Derwent to the sports field. The path goes under the railway bridge and the corner of the popular High Peak Garden Centre. Cross the main Castleton Road with care, to the the Shatton Road. Directly past quaint bridge over the River Noe. Α finger post and stile leads into the woodland stretch along the banks of the Easy walking for 2.5 River Derwent. miles towards Leadmill Bridge. Many stiles to negotiate as we wend our route through pastures green. Note the fine historical Offerton Hall on. the hillside, one of the many many mansions built by Robert Eyre.

Tarry a while at Leadmill Bridge, maybe make a slight detour to sample a bar lunch and liquid refreshment at the nearby Plough Inn. After Leadmill Bridge we still hug the banks of the river and head towards Grindleford. After 1.25 miles leave the main path and bear slightly left (well signed) towards the hamlet of Upper Padley. Cross over the railway bridge and join a main track from Greenwood Farm. Turn right and directly towards Padley Chapel; it was here that the Catholics were massacred during the Oliver Cromwell Rebellion. The ruins behind the Chapel grounds are most extensive and well worth a visit. On the opposite side of the track is Brunts Barn; a Peak National Park Ranger Service Centre. Directly behind the Chapel are the woods of Bolehill. Here

Local agent OLDALES, 55 BASLOW ROAD, TOTLEY, SHEFFIELD S17 4DL in the overgrown mounds quarry stone was dug to build the giant Derwent Dams at the turn of the century.

Continue to walk passing behind Grindleford Railway Station. Then start the ascent of Padley woods and Gorge; maybe the highlight of the walk as the Burbage Brook cascades down the ravine. After 1 mile through the woods we break out into the moorland stretch of the Longshaw estate. Cross the footbridge over the Burbage Brook, enter the woodland stretch that fringes Longshaw Lake. Strike directly behind the Lodge, keeping the way marker (wooden pole) as a guide. Stone steps lead across the final ridge.

Tarry awhile at the stone seat to drink in breathtaking views of the Derwent and Hope Valley. Cross the junction of the Stony Ridge and Fox House road with care, to enter the realms of our Totley Moss. The broad track skirts the landmark of the rail tunnel air shaft. Soon we are down towards Bolehill where we survey the complete vista of the Sheffield and South Yorkshire scene. After descending the steep field adjacent to the rifle range and Moss Road, and crossing the sports field from Lane Head Road, maybe we feel we have earned a tipple at the Cricket Inn; before we wend our way home via the Cobbled Causeway, Hillfoot Road and back to Totley. We are lucky people to live in such nice surroundings.

#### TOTLEY RISE POST OFFICE

Several weeks ago, Totley Rise Post Office asked many of its customers if they would complete a detailed questionnaire rating its performance across the wide range of services currently provided.

Based on this survey, all the staff thank everyone who returned the questionnaire - they are extremely pleased that the Post Office achieved a customer satisfaction rating of 92%.

However, a number of suggestions were put forward where improvements could be made - the main ones being the provision of a motor vehicle licence (M.V.L.) service, the availability of more space inside the premises and the provision of a larger post box for the colection of Royal Mail.

Unfortunately, the Post Office do not allocate which offices provide M.V.L.'s. This is controlled by the D.V.L.C. Swansea. However, we will continue to press for the introduction of this service for all our customers in the surrounding area.

Now that the threat of privatisation has receded, Glen and Jim Webb feel that they can now proceed with making improvements to the Post Office premises - these will inevitably alter the character of the building in so far as the interior and exterior will be completely modernised (more space, new fittings etc.) However, such changes will in no way affect the quality of existing postal services or our policy of providing value for money on the retailing side of the business.

Bearing in mind that public services are not allowed to close during alterations, every effort will be made to minimise any disruption to our customers when work commences during the next few weeks. Hopefully, the changes which include the shop interior, the Post Office counter area and the shop frontage (plus larger collection box) should be completed within the next three months.

5. If you could meet God and ask Him a guestion, would it be:-



Planting of new shrubs and trees is best left until late summer. Increase your stock by taking semi ripe cuttings from a wide range of trees and shrubs. Root in a frame or on a window sill. Laver clematis and flowering quince. cleutzia Prune deciduous shrubs like broom, mock orange after flowering. Keep raspberries moist at ground level by mulching with straw or strawy manure between the rows. Keep the young shoots of blackberries and loganberries tied up. Peg strawberry runners which have been earmarked for propagation into pots. GREENHOUSE & INDOOR PLANTS. Keeping an eye on temperatures is the order of the day, damping down if the weather is hot and giving plenty of ventilation. Early June nights can be very treacherous, watch the weather forecast. Keep plants well watered and fed, take out side shoots on tomatoes and feed with fertilizer when the first truss has set. Pollinate flowers using a fine brush or cotton ball on a stick will do nicely. Watch out for whitefly. I use yellow sticky cards placed strategically around. They are very effective. If they get really bad use a white fly smoke cone. You will need to repeat this every 5-6 days to give effective control.

Sow greenhouse calceolarias now. Sow seed in well drained trays, give the lightest covering of sand. Cover and place in a frame to germinate. They do not like excessive heat. Continue to feed flowering and fruity pot plants, stand on damp pebbles to maintain humidity. Pot up rooted cuttings taken in May. Watch out for aphids etc. and treat when seen I find plant pins very effective.

Take stem cuttings from geraniums, busy lizzy, fuscia, heliotrope, kalanchoe, plumbago and peperomia.

Take leaf cuttings from African violets, rex begonias, echeveria and gloxinia.

LAWNS Cut, water, keep clean regularly. Trim edges, it really makes the garden look smart. New lawns should be gently rolled and lightly cut over. Apply lawn feed if you haven't done already. Apply selective weedkiller when weeds appear. Prepare ground for new lawn areas to be laid in autumn.

That should keep you busy for a while. Cheerio for now,

#### GLEDHILL'S RHUBARB FARM



#### ABBEYDALE WILDLIFE GARDEN

Have you noticed that in some areas of Sheffield the common varieties of birds are becoming scarcer? The sparrows, bluetits etc., blackbirds, thrushes and starlings, all familiar to us in our gardens, need to be encouraged. Throughout the city, the Sheffield Wildlife Action Partnership -S.W.A.P. - situated at the City Ecology Unit, opposite Western Park Museum, has designated 21 bird feeding stations. Abbeydale Wildlife Garden, situated behind Abbeydale Hall, is one of these.

Earlier this year the Rainbows, Brownies and Guides of Dore made "Bird-Puddings" and during the February half term break, they took them down to the Garden. A "Star" photographer captured this on film.

To make the bird pudding we used wild bird food, black sunflower seeds and a few peanuts. These were all mixed together and to this was added melted lard and suet. We put this mixture into yoghurt and margarine pots, with a stick through the top of the pot, on which the birds could balance. In the base of each pot we had knotted a piece of string, so that they could be suspended upside down from a branch or bird table. Anything can be added to the pudding mixture e.g. bread, cake crumbs, bacon etc.

The belief has been that we should not feed the birds during the summer months but this thinking has altered now. Peanuts can be a danger to baby birds and are best broken up in the pudding mix, or fed through wire mesh. Most of the other ingredients are safe to the young ones. If anyone wishes to make bird pudding and take it to the Wildlife Garden, they are welcome to do so. Go right to the top of the Garden and hang it on the branches of the trees. Or encourage the birds in your own Hopefully our area of Sheffield garden. will once again be home to all those familiar varieties of birds. Pamela Butterworth Blackamoor District Commissioner.
