

UNITARY DEVELOPEMENT PLAN - IS TOTLEY'S GREEN BELT SECURE?

In a recent conversation with the Flanning Department, I was told that the Separtment of the Environment's report Sceffield's UDP is expected ---in lotter. Once the report has been to torrittee, it will be available to the public. As far as Totley residents are concerned, the main item which may affect us is the possible loss of Green Belt land in the Totley Hall Lane area development, notably fields telonging to Hall Lane Farm for housing and the playing field belonging to Hallan University also for housing. Over

the last few years many residents have done everything possible within the framework of planning law to object to this threat. I hope that the DoE Inspector will agree to the council's recommendations that these fields stay within the Green Belt. If the Inspector asks Sheffield to allocate some Green Belt land for housing, it is thought that other Green Belt sites which do not have the same scenic quality as Totley's will be considered in the first instance. Watch the local press in the autumn.

the UDP issue. Notwithstanding there are still matters affecting the Totley Hall Lane and Stocks Green Drive area. Hallam University's Lowfield and Highfield sites are definitely going to be transformed in the near future. It is thought that a planning application for housing is imminent. With the prospect of this new development in sight, two questions spring to mind; firstly, will Stocks Green Drive be opened up to cater for the access requirements of the new development? It seems, unfortunately, an option that the road will extend and cross over Hall Lane Farm's track and then cut into the Hallam site to make Stocks Green Drive either a through road or else a much longer cul-de-sac. The reason why this might be an option is that Totley Hall Lane is within З conservation area and it is too narrow to take all the extra traffic generated by both sites. Widening the lane would be fraught with both practical and environmental difficulties. The second guestion is, what will the density of housing be? Obviously, the greater the density, the greater the impact it will have on all residents in the immediate which issue vicinity. This is an residents can try to influence as part the planning objection process. of Please note; at the time of submitting this item for publication (July) no planning application had been received. Be vigilant though if you feel strongly about this issue.

We are open for consultation 9.00am to 5.00pm every weekday.

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

When a local businessman commissioned Sheffield artist Brian Smith to produce a picture of Abbeydale Industrial Hamlet recently, Brian naturally asked "Which part would you like a view of?" The answer was "All of it!". The result is a collection of ten familiar views of the Hamlet, rendered in one finely detailed drawing, which now hangs in the Dore home of Jurgen Morton-Hall.

Now the picture has been published in a limited edition of original prints, each signed by the artist.

This is not the first time Brian has produced a montage of views of a subject. "In the past it has tended to be private houses, with a number of interesting aspects or features which mean something special to the owner and which can't be captured in one view. With so much to see at Abbeydale Industrial Hamlet, it lends itself very well to this sort of treatment".

THE NANTLLE RIDGE WALK

I really enjoyed Mr. Railton Holden's article Italian Rhapsody, it brought back old memories around the Naples area. Whilst awaiting a posting to Austria I spent time at a transit camp in southern Italy and did a spot of exploring around the ruins of Pompeii. Plus the sight of Mount Vesuvius drew me like a magnet to its summit. The local Mountain guide had just taken a party to the boiling rim when he spotted my lone figure, Strong words came forth about ascending the slopes without a guide but when he saw my tricouni nailed boots he was rather envious and enquired could I get him a pair. The crater of Vesuvius was most impressive but the scree slopes reminded me of a giant pit coal slag heap.

I thank you for the kind words as a dedicated hill walker, but alas no longer the case for the old legs have given trouble, just about 4 miles is about the limit. The spirit is still willing and the great days on the hills will always be treasured.

Let us sample one great ridge walk in North Wales, the late celebrated mountaineer Frank Smythe classed the Nantlle hills as the finest ridge walk in Snowdonia. So the next time you take a holiday around the Caernarvon and Bangor area try this classy ridge walk of about 10 miles.

Starting from the hamlet of Rhyd-Ddu, situated along the Gaernarvon to Beddgelert Road and nestling under the foot of Mount Snowdon and finish the trek at Tal-y-sarn near Pen-y-Groes.

Tackle these hills only if you are fit. Ordnance survey map and compass essential. Organise transport or local Crossville bus service and allow at least 7 hours for the trip, so on with the walk.

After leaving the Cwellyn Arms Inn at Rhydd-Ddu footpath sign past Drwsycoed Uchaf Farm to ascend well marked track to the first summit of Y-Garn at 2080 feet. (There is another mountain of the same name above the Llanberis Pass).

Next scramble a delicate lines of rocks Known as 'Piles of Stones' to Clogwyn Marchnad and the fluted escarpment of Myneydd Drws-Y-Coed. These airy heights give views unsurpassed of the Snowdonia range of hills.

Our next summit is Trum-y-Ddsgl 2329 feet with its huge stone tower dominating the sky line. We march across grassy slopes to Mynydd Tal-y-Mignedd at 2148 feet.

Then a steep scramble across Craig Pennant to the gem of the entire walk and the highest point, the whale back top of Graig-Owm-Silyn 2408 feet. This mountain played an important role in the actual formation of the early days of the R.A.F. Mountain Rescue Service with several aircraft trashing in the area.

In their wisdom the Air Ministry had a warning transmitter placed on the summit during the war years. These beacons were known in R.A.F. slang as "Squeakers". I climbed to this summit more times than any other mountain with heavy batteries during those days. But never a dulk gard for we would approach the mountain plateau often via different gully routes.

Pause to gate into the valley dominated by the twin lakes of Llynnau Cwm Silyn and the magnificent: trag of the "Great Slab". Here are some of the classic rock climbs in North Wales. Not so well known as layer and Snowdon but just as important.

There is an easy slope now to our final summit at Sarneid-Goch 2301 feet before we despend the matriand path to our left and the long slope to Maen-Llwyd farmsteads. Then further tracks through disused slate quarry areas towards the Namtlle valley, note the imposing waters of llyn Cwmdulyn (reservoir) as we despend the last slopes.

To end a great day on these fine hills with maybe a well earned pint at the "Victoria Arms" in Pen-y-Groes.

Wish I could repeat this walk just once more.

GARDENING TIPS FOR SEPTEMBER

The water shortage has certainly affected the gardens; apart from a very rare shower or two and the odd thunderstorm, the garden has been really parched despite the carrying of gallons of water to the veg patch and my favourite flowers.

I'm afraid the show bench at the show will not have as large specimens as before, but I'm sure they will be well worth a visit and if you are thinking of participating bear in mind we have all had the same growing conditions to contend with so that shorter carrots or lighter marrows might still win a prize, and there might well be some funny shaped vegetables for the children to make their vegetable animals from. I certainly look forward to seeing them so please encourage them to put forward an entry; aged up to 7 can enter. The 7's and over can enter a sketch or painting, the art section last year was really good, we have a real wealth of talent in Totley. I look forward to seeing you all there (it's at Totley Rise Methodist Church Hall).

FLOWERS

Keep up with the dead heading of flowers as this prevents moulds from forming and spoiling later flowers. Take some cuttings of lavender now, they root quite easily outdoors in a sheltered spot. Put them in a shallow trench to which plenty of sharp sand has been added.

Reduce the growth of herbaceous plants which have finished flowering, don't overdo it though, stake up plants that might be in danger of rocking or breaking when the winds pick up. Take cuttings from violas, insert nonflowering shoots in a sandy soil and put them in the cold frame. In fact there lots of plant which can be are way, penstemon, propogated this calceolaria, honeysuckle, potentilla, weigela etc. etc.

Winter flowering pansies may be producing a few flowers by now, if they are, it will pay off later to nip these flowers off now - the plants will be stronger before the winter sets in. Plant hardy primula plants, they will make better plants prior to winter. Plant out bulbs and corms and tubers in beds and borders to flower next spring.

September is the month when mildew can be a real nuisance, try to deal with it as soon as it is seen; a good fungicide will help. Pot up hyacinths, tulips, narcisssi for forcing, keep them as cool as possible 48 deg (9 deg C) for the first 8 - 12 weeks, this can be achieved by covering them with 3 - 4 inches of moist peat in a sheltered north facing corner, if the pots are not drained, they should be kept covered from rain etc. Towards the end of the month pot up geranium, fuchsia, begonias which were outdoors etc., which you want to protect over winter, this must be done before the first frosts.

VEGETABLES

Gather french and runner beans regularly, never leave any pods on the plants to become old and stringy unless they are required for seed (or you're entering the longest runner bean at the show). Earth up celery a little at a time. Prepare ground ready for planting Spring cabbage later in the month. Marrows can be stored if there are too many for immediate use, hang them in nets or old nylons in a frost free but cool place. I put collars around my leeks at this time to help the blanching process, I find it cleaner than earthing them up, though a little earthing on the outside of the collar helps to keep them stable.

When the ster of main crop potatoes is set that is it cannot be easily rubbed off by pressure with the thumb; this is a sign that they are ready for lifting. Keep a weather eye out for warnings of frost so that outdoor picked tomatoes and marrows can be before they are ruined. Lift some parsley seedlings, transplant them into a frame in good spil, they will provide pickings throughout the winter if you use the lights to protect from frost. TREES, SHRUBS & FRUIT

Dead heading is the order of the day especially for roses, you should get a late flush of flowers if you have kept up with the job. Prepare ground ready for planting evergreens, heathers and conifers. Always keep newly planted trees & shrubs well watered. Give new conifers a treat by syringing them on warm, dry, windy days.

Take cuttings of shrubs and climbers, root in a cold frame or indoors. Cover autumn fruiting strawberries with cloches. Prepare your storage area for apples and pears in a cool, airy place. Place grease bands round fruit trees especially apples. Unwanted laterals should be removed from peaches and nectarines for the last time.

GREENHOUSE & INDOOR PLANTS

Gradually decrease watering all round and dry off tuberous begonias, cacti, gloxinia, clivias etc. Feed in flower such as plants African violets, begonias, bush violets. chrysanthemums. As flowering finishes, discard summer annuals which have been used as pot plants. Disbud carnations and chrysanthemums, bring indoors tender plants which have been enjoying their holiday outdoors during the summer. Repot arum lilies to flower at Easter.

If you want a bit of greenhouse colour in the spring, sow a few annuals such as clarkia godetia, or perhaps a few snaps. Most pot plants will stand a few cuttings taken at this time. Pot up freesias using 5" pots, put 6 to 8 bulbs in each. Give ferns a feed of very weak liquid manure. As I nearly always say, but always needs repeating - watch the ventilation; close up side vents until spring. Wash off any shading except where you are growing shade loving plants of course. Discontinue spraying and damping down. Clean up your heaters make sure the wicks are OK and the tanks are safe to use, have paraffin or gas, ready for use.

LAWNS

Continue regular mowing and raking. Give lawns a treat by scarifying, spiking and a top dressing of sieved potting compost. You could mix in some autumn lawn food for good measure. September is a good time to sow or turf a new lawn.

The following letter has been received by P.N.Sherwell Dear Sir,

TOTLEY RAILWAY BRIDGE

Thank you for your enquiry dated 26th April 1996, concerning the bridgeworks on Baslow Road.

These have been brought about by a routine inspection which revealed problems with the bridge bearings. As you have observed, prompt action was taken to prevent further deterioration by closing the outside lanes of the road.

Since that time, and of which you will be unaware, further investigations have taken place with consultations with other involved organisations such as Railtrack and the utilities. This has identified a clear need for repairs to the bridge.

Unfortunately, this scheme competes with many others in the City for grant aid from the Department of Transport. Partly because the success of grant applications cannot be guessed in advance and partly because priorities are under constant review, you will appreciate that I am unable to predict with any certainty when the repairs can be funded. However, I think that it is unlikely that any work could begin before the end of the next financial year and possibly not in the following year either.

0n a more positive note. the present traffic measures have produced a safe and stable interim situation and have not as far as I am aware, caused problems for either pedestrians or road users.

If you have any specific concerns or are aware of any problems caused by the lane closures please let me know and





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A VISIT TO CANADA by Maurice Snowdon

Learning that the Totley Independent was short of contributions, I could not help but wonder if our recent trip to Canada would be of interest. It was not our first trip and we know of several people in the area who have connections so perhaps our impressions are not new.

Canada is a Big, Big country. It is as far across Canada as to reach the Eastern seaboard from the U.K. Inside the country everything is big too! The main road running through Toronto in places has 14 lines of traffic, divided up into expressways and collector lanes in each direction. All the cars on these lanes are big because petrol is half the U.K. price and large distances imply high mileage. By and large Toronto is flat so it is not surprising that most of the roads are laid out on a rectangular grid with traffic lights at the main intersections. The city (as so many in that continent) is new and largely built in an age when wheeled transport was the norm. Today in Canada most families have at least one car and to see pedestrians walking along the main routes is quite unusual. This, of course is also a result of spaciousness everything is spread out widely.

I suspect that appetites are large too, but then food is often much cheaper than in the U.K. Direct comparisons vary as do our own living standards but it is certainly possible to purchase a number of items at half U.K. prices. On the other hand some speciality products can actually be more expensive. Examples of the economy include a joint of pork which worked out at the equivalent of 25p per head per meal or coffee and a doughnut at the equivalent of 80p per person. The number of channels on the T.V. set is bewildering especially (as in the U.K!) one can only watch one at once. All of them are frequently interrupted by adverts which are very repetitive and numerous.


Thinking of size of course one has to think of the Niagara Falls (largest in the world by volume) or the C.N. Tower at 1815 ft. But Canada also has some less obvious claims to size - the largest coastline in the world for example. This particular statistic is partly because of the fact that Canada has more than 50,000 islands - surely also a record in itself.

Hudson Bay (measured by shoreline) claims to be the biggest bay in the world which may not surprise anyone but associated with it are 300,000 square kilometres of wetland - a less obvious record perhaps.

If you ask "Will you go back?" the answer is "Yes!" but it was nice to get back to Totley!
