

Totley Residents Association Update

We all know there have been serious problems with youth nuisance over the last few weeks. Nearly every part of the area has been affected in one way or another, assaults near the chip shop, damage in Green Oak Park and Ackley Bank, trouble at the Co-op, down Back Lane, Sunnyvale Rd, cars broken into, gardens entered, paving stones smashed. All this and more, by an intimidating gang of 15/16 young people making residents lives a misery.

The police have been responding to calls from all over the area, extra police cars are on patrol. They are doing their best but not much can be done unless the miscreants are caught in the act. Some residents have complained they ring 101 and don't get a response. We must remember that the calls are monitored and as has happened recently the Police do respond, when it is obvious there is a problem in the area, by increased patrols.

So please continue to report any youth or any other nuisance problems near you. **Ring 101, 220 2020, or 999**As a result of calls to the Police, some offenders have been arrested. At the present time details of the offences committed are not are not available. The process of dealing with them is ongoing.

Now to some better news. I hope!

My most recent phone call to Andy Godson about the promise to turn round some of the bus shelters met with the news they had run out of money! Use your imagination as to my reaction. But it must have had the desired effect because the next day I received an e-mail to the effect that money had been found, I will be informed when the work will be done. Keep your fingers crossed.

The new bus terminus caused problems to begin with, some bus drivers were still using Cross Scythes, and others turned at Broad Car while at least one went to Owler Bar! Things appear to be settling down, but there are concerns because the pavement where passengers wait to go into Sheffield is very narrow, heavy lorries pass very close by and it is necessary to step out to stop the bus going straight passed. The other concern is there is no bus shelter. Passengers alighting from the city have a longer walk up the hill. I understand First are asking people for suggestions as to where another stop is needed.

The petition about the new lights will hopefully receive a response by the end of the month.

Let's move on to the good things.

Five planters have now been filled with a variety of flowers and vegetables. The one near the library is doing very well, because it is sheltered. Totley All Saints School Y1 class, all 27 of them, planted the one at the top of Hillfoot Road. Every child in the class planted at least 2 plants. They all enjoyed the experience and are helping to water them. Totley County Gardening Group planted the one at Main Avenue. Help from the Community with the one down The Rise and opposite the Co-op was sadly lacking, but at least a lady, new to Totley came to help. She now feels part of the Community. Thanks to Christine Shimell for making all the arrangements with the Council and organising the team who did the growing and planting.

Over 50's Activity Taster Sessions are going very well, so far we have enjoyed Tai Chi, to be followed by Dance and Multi-Games. Totley people can now be active 3 days a week, Monday Over 50's, Wednesday Health Walks and Thursday Chairobics.

Activity Sheffield is putting on lots of events for young people during the Summer Holidays. Every child should receive information as to what is available. Look out for posters and fliers. Do make sure the young people take advantage of what is on offer.

Several Totley residents attended the first South West Community Assembly meeting in All Saints Church Hall on 18th June. It was not very well attended and not very user friendly. It is early days so we must wait and see how it evolves.

Work in Green Oak Park by the Parks and Countryside Team has been completed for the time being. What a pity one of the newly planted trees was vandalised, it will be replaced in the next planting season, when more trees will be planted. Some residents are now working to improve the stream area. Although work has only just begun, children are already enjoying playing in the water. The wildlife particularly the birds, use the stream when it is quiet. The orchard area has not been cut. Wild flowers are beginning to grow; more will be planted in the autumn. I am busy growing some at the moment. A careful watch is being kept to make sure the fruit trees are not dry. Even if it has rained, they need water to keep them growing strongly. As the trees were bare rooted, watering will be necessary for 2 or 3 years.

Children and their Mums and Dads, who were at the Book Event run by the Guides to celebrate the Centenary of Guiding helped us with ideas of what play equipment would be enjoyed by teenagers in the park. We are hoping to put some equipment in before too long.

The "road" into OUR Park has now been tarmaced. It does NOT belong to the house owner, is still part of

the park and should continue to be used by anyone who wishes to use it.

The Programme for the Music Festival is to be found in the Totley Independent, library, shops and notice boards. It runs from 1st-11th July. There are lots of exciting events. Do take the opportunity to join in. It is the first time anything like this has happened in Totley. To make it a success we all need to go to the sessions. A big thank you to Sue Hare and Phil Harris for having the idea and doing all the organising.

Finally a reminder the Open Gardens take place 11th / 12th July and Totley Show is on 19th September. Enjoy the summer let's hope we get the good weather the Met Office has promised us.

Oh, FOR A HOUSE

Recently, when news commentators have wearied about discussing whether the Prime Minister can survive in office, they have returned to the state of the economy. One indicator they seem to like is a possible return of increasing house prices

I must confess I am no economist so they may be correct. What has always puzzled me is why those who profess skills in such areas, allowed the house prices to rise to such unprecedented levels. I would argue this was not to the common good. As in all situations some people gained - anyone inheriting without a need to buy. The losers were people just "getting on to the property ladder". People changing house got more as sellers but had to pay more as buyers so not much gain in that case. I suppose it's the uncontrolled money market has been a major driving force. When we were buying our first house there was also a shortage after WWII, but the market was controlled. I seem to remember the absolute minimum deposit was five per cent of the purchase price and the maximum mortgage was two and a half times the annual salary of the borrowerrather different from recent times. How many people now regret taking out loans in excess of what they can realistically afford?

A shortage of any necessity without rationing naturally leads to a rise in price. The only way to avoid shortage is build more houses. Private builders and their financiers will obviously want maximum profit leading to a concentration on expensive houses, expensive apartments and office blocks. A willingness to provide or ensure more modest housing on the scale required has not been shown by all governments whatever their political colour.

Some readers may want to argue that government (local authority) provision of post war housing was not a success. They may cite the high rise flats and particularly, the Park Hill complex. In their day these were well regarded and popular. I think an argument could be made that their subsequent decline and fall from favour owes as much to the lack of supervision and maintenance as to a change in attitude.

Another item of news which the media have not allowed to pass us by is the 125th anniversary of the founding of M&S. It is obviously too much to expect someone to start selling houses at a low price from a market stall, but surely personal computers and mobile 'phones are less of a necessity than houses. So why has no one got into that on such a large scale? Factory built houses delivered on site. Is Sir Richard Branson interested in widening his empire'?

Summer 2009

At the time of writing we are in the middle of a very busy term with so many enriching trips and experiences it would be difficult to cover them all!

The year 8 residential has been a highlight of school life for our pupils for a number of years. All year 8 pupils have the opportunity to spend three days in the fresh air of the Peak District trying out some adventure activities, walking and having fun. In fact pictures from this event always play a big part in our leavers' assemblies because so many of the pupils remember it so fondly.

The whole event is organised and run by our own staff so we are able to keep the costs low and Cliffe College at Curbar provides a superb venue for the overnight stavs.

Also enjoying the Peak District have been over 100 Y10 pupils who have enrolled on the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award. For this award they have top plan an expedition with an overnight camp and carry all their food and equipment with them. Longer term to achieve the award they also have to be involved in a significant amount of voluntary work, sport and learn a new skill developing their staying power and community involvement. We are thrilled that so many pupils want to take part in this extra-curricular activity, but the only reason we can offer this is because a large number of staff have volunteered to be trained as group supporters and are willing to give up their own time at weekends to ensure the safety of the happy campers.

Over 20 post 16 students have just returned from their Gold Duke of Edinburgh award which requires serious long term commitment to achieve - up to 2 years of voluntary work and a 50 mile expedition over 4 days are just two of the requirements. However, for the successful, there is the added bonus of an invitation to one of the royal palaces to pick up their award. This is a real boost in helping the pupils develop the independence and resilience that they will need to help them succeed beyond school and we are very proud of the students who commit their time and energy to this process.

We have Sports Day to look forward to in July and a suspended timetable day when all Y7 pupils will visit Castleton for history and geography fieldwork, Y8s will try a solve a mystery using forensic science and have half a day trying new sports at Abbeydale sports club. Y9 will be on their end of key stage reward trip and Y10s will be involved in their end of year exams. Y12 students will spend the day investigating their options for higher education and receiving help with the application process.

We are, as ever, looking forward to welcoming the new year 7 to King Ecgbert in September and to ensure this process is as seamless and stress free as possible for all concerned our transition leader, Helen Smith, has been working closely with all our feeder schools since before Easter. She has already built up a wealth of knowledge about our new pupils and has put together a programme to make sure they feel happy and secure about starting their new school.

So, as we reach the end of this school year as the public examinations draw to a close, we look forward to pleasing results for all our pupils to help them onto the next stages in their lives and plan for next year to keep King Ecgbert moving forward delivering high quality education for the 21st century.

Do my Homework? But why...? An insider's look at Philosophy in the city.

Philosophy is a topic that inspires debate, encourages thought & is often perceived as dull & useless. This is wrong, (for the most part), as new philosophies have inspired revolutions, made millions & even affected the way we think. Surely something that can be such an intrinsic part of us should not be cast so lightly aside. Part of the problem is in the fact that philosophy is perceived as an academics' subject. That is why it helps when programs such as these can help to nurture a burgeoning interest in philosophy.

And so I smoothly drift to the topic of this article. That is the outreach group, Philosophy in the City, (in the university) attended by 6th form students from many schools as well as KES' very own (self styled) Higher Thinkers.

The event started with a lecture on consequentialism (the belief that: moral theories which hold that the consequences of a particular action form the basis for any valid moral judgment about that action that's from wiki, and for those of you who don't like it: set up your own site!) which is an interesting thought, even if not always true. We then had a coffee break. Following the coffee break, we were presented with a choice of seminars designed to encourage philosophical argument & debate ranging from Religion to Plato's Allegory of the Cave. Shepherd Wheel Restoration Project

Many of you will know Shepherd Wheel, which is on the River Porter in Whiteley Woods, and will remember the time when it was open to the public at weekends. Until the early 1990s, Shepherd Wheel was in good working order, and visitors were able to see the wheel turning as well as the machinery inside the two buildings. Sadly this is no longer the case.

The Friends of the Porter Valley and Sheffield Council are working together to restore this historical site to full working order. Once restored, it will again he open to the public for demonstrations at weekends and for school visits during the week, under the auspices of the Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust.

Shepherd Wheel is the oldest surviving water-wheel in Sheffield. It is a rare example of a small-scale knife-grinding workshop, and was once part of a thriving metal-working industry. It has stood in Whiteley Wood for over 400 years, and is an excellent representative of the rural origins of the Sheffield cutlery trade.

The first mention of a "whele in Porters Field", which may be Shepherd Wheel, is in a will of 1566. Porter Wheel, as it used to be known. is referred to by name in a later will of 1584. It takes its current name from Edward Shepherd who leased the wheel from 1749. In recent years, however, the water has had to be diverted away from the dam (mill pond) in order to prevent damage due to leaks in the dam wall. The wheel itself and the buildings are now in a poor state of repair.

So far we have been fortunate in receiving an award of nearly £500,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund, and the generous underwriting of outstanding funding by Sheffield Council. Matching funding is being sought from other funding bodies, and the Friends of the Porter Valley have undertaken to raise £20,000 towards the project. We are well on our way to achieving, or even exceeding, this target (c.£15,000 raised so far). Work on the restoration has now begun in earnest with a detailed design for the restoration of the dam and other structures. Construction work will commence later in the year when birds have finished nesting and other wildlife have brought up their families.

We have a number of fundraising events coming up; an open garden at 62 Endcliffe Hall Avenue (2pm, 4th July); Classical Music in the Botanical Gardens (7pm, 4th July) courtesy of the Rotary Club, 'Sunfest' with specially brewed beer at The Rising Sun. Nether Green (9-12th July); dramas on the history of the. grinders by Strolling Players at Shepherd Wheel (11am & 2pm, 18th July) and the Winter Garden (11am & 2pm, 19th July); a children's cycle event in Endcliffe Park (13th August); a fun day at the Norfolk Arms, Ringinglow (16th August); a concert by the Abbeydale Singers at Notre Dame School (evening. 19th Sept); and we will be present at this year's Dore Show, where you can find out more about the project.

We would be pleased to welcome you at any of these events; for further information contact our secretary, Flora Owen (tel: 230 1345). Shepherd Wheel itself is open for guided tours, arranged by the Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust, on the 2nd Sunday of each month, until August/September, depending on construction activity. GARDENING TIPS FOR JULY/AUGUST 2009

It is raining again!!! The garden is wondering what is happening, first hot and now cold and wet. The greenhouse is looking very colourful, the strylizia (bird of paradise) plant is in flower, it always amazes me that mother nature can come up with something as unusual as this. The garden is also very colourful with aqualigia, geranium poppies all giving a good show. I have managed to get my wildlife pond clean again, it went quite stagnant and smelly. I have put in a filter and fountain, it looks quite Chatsworth like (a bit smaller though). The frogs and newts are back so I must have done the right thing. I have put 5 small goldfish in so we will be able to sit and watch them grow. The veg patch is looking good, we are having veg and salad for our meals now (nothing like your own home grown food for flavour). The onions are coming along nicely. I hope they will make a good display on the show bench at The Totley Show on 19 September. I hope you will make a special effort to be there. The schedule will be in this issue of the Totley Independent, have a good look to see how many categories you can enter. I will be entering the Dundee Cake, mine came second last year so I need to try harder (as my old school reports used to say). I can but try. The Show Committee are working hard to make it a good show, it only needs your efforts to make all the hard work worthwhile so have a go, you never know you might win a prize or a cup, except for the Dundee Cake section, that's what I am going for (now there's a challenge). Even if you do not enter I am sure you will enjoy seeing all the efforts of the talented people of Totley and district. The children's section is always worth supporting. They come up with some guite novel ideas so encourage the children to take part, there will be medals for the winners.

We went to Renishaw Hall Gardens on Sunday; it was a lovely day which always makes any garden look better. Those gardens are really worth a visit, well kept and vast with an interesting section of plants and a large lake which takes about 45 minutes to walk around. We will be going back to walk round the lake when Christine's hip is better, nevertheless the flowers were lovely and the food fair which was on at the same time was very tasty.

The school garden and allotment which I help with is looking good and the children have worked hard, they are hoping to get a good report from the Lord Mayor's Cup Committee, they also helped with the planting of the tubs at the top of Main Avenue and the planters and hanging baskets around the school. It all helps to make the children aware of how food comes to the table and the amount of work which goes into making a nice garden.

Enjoy your holidays and come back refreshed and raring to go, don't forget to arrange a garden sitter if you are going for any length of time.

Flowers:- Regular dead heading will encourage many plants to give more flowers. Water and feed regularly, one good watering is better than lots of little splashes. Give sweet peas, dahlias and chrysanthemums a liquid feed, then mulch them, they will give better flowers later, just about showtime. Clip over alpine and rock plants as they finish flowering. Cut and dry everlasting flowers when they are at their best. Sow forget-me-nots, Brompton Stock, pansies and violas for planting in the autumn and spring. Watch out for aphids and caterpillars and deal with them as soon as they are seen. Garden pinks of all kinds can be increased by cuttings or pipings taken now, also dianthus, set them in a sandy soil in a shaded place. Prune early flowering clematis (white and pink Montana thin out overcrowded stems and cut back where necessary to keep plants within bounds. Standard fuchsias like plenty of water, so water regularly when the weather is hot and dry.

Floribunda roses do not need disbudding but remove faded flowers regularly, when the whole truss has finished the stem should be cut back to a prominent bud. Thin out dahlia shoots if they are getting overcrowded. The first week of August is the latest time to plant out colchicums, autumn flowering crocuses and hardy cyclamen, bulbs should be planted bins apart in well drained soil, and cyclamen are best bought as pot grown plants. Most lilies should be planted in October or November but the hardy Madonna Lily is an exception and it must be planted during August. Don't plant too deep; an inch of soil above the bulb is ample. As rambler roses finish flowering they should be pruned. Disentangle the growths from the trellis and cut out at ground level those that have carried flowers, keep he new stems made this year and tie them neatly in place, these should flower next year.

Vegetables:- Clear away early vegetable plants as soon as the crop is harvested, fork over the site ready for follow-on crops. Stop feeding onions (end of July) as the leaves start to yellow bend them over to encourage larger bulbs (ready for the show). Water

marrows regularly and apply a high potash feed. Cut cucumber and marrows as soon as they are ready; don't leave them on the plant (except the one for the biggest in show). Plant out winter cabbage. Do not allow celery to dry out or it will run to seed. Runner beans should be kept moist, one way is to put lawn mowings or garden compost or even straw round them, the object is not so much to feed the beans as to keep in the moisture (do not use mowings that have been treated with weed or moss killer). Butterflies may look nice flitting about the garden but bear in mind the white ones are busy laying eggs, which will hatch and scoff your cabbages etc. before you can, so deal with caterpillars when seen, squash any eggs you may find on the leaves. Brussels sprouts will benefit if a little soil is pulled up around the stems. The fourth week of July is a good time to pick herbs for drying. Tie the shoots or leaves in small bundles, suspend them head down, in a cool, airy shed or room, not in strong sunlight.

August is a good time to sow spring cabbage; the plants should be ready for setting out at the end of September.

Trees, Fruit and Shrubs:- Water and mulch around azaleas, rhododendrons, hydrangeas and magnolias. Cuttings can be taken of many shrubs; some need a bit of warmth to start with. Thin pears and plums if the set has been heavy. Any plum branches showing signs of silver leaf should be cut out and burnt. August - Cut out the raspberry canes to ground level as they finish fruiting. Retain 6 or 7 of the strongest canes for fruiting next year. If you are making a new strawberry bed, now is the time to plant new stock. Feed black currants with a high nitrogen fertiliser, prune as soon as crop has been gathered. Cordon and other trained apples should be summer pruned to keep them in shape, and to check their vigour. Mock orange, jasmine, wisteria and clematis can be pruned once they have finished flowering.

Greenhouse and Indoor Plants:- Keep a close check on the temperature and humidity in the greenhouse. You may need to water twice a day

(avoid mid-day if possible) morning and evening is best, damp down staging and paths to keep things cool and use all ventilators. Pinch out tips of tomatoes when they reach the eaves and continue to take out side shoots. All plants should be shaded from bright sunlight. Tip cuttings can be taken from geraniums, fuchsias, cherry pie, regal pelargoniums etc. Plants indoors need shading and spraying, except for the hairy leaved plants, they do not like water on their leaves. On nice days give them a spell in the garden, they will enjoy the fresh air, you could talk to them whilst you are lazing about in the deck chair, you never know they might answer back (depends on what you are drinking at the time). Watch out for insect infestation, white fly, aphids etc. and deal with them as soon as you see them, also fungus and mildew before they get too bad and plants have to be

Lawns:- Cut (not too close) and trim regularly. Make final preparations for seeding a new lawn in July prior to seeding at the end of August.

That lot should keep you busy for a bit.

- There are only 4 females in the top 100 runners

DUNDEE CAKE

175 gms (6oz) plain flour

1 rounded teaspoon mixed spice

125gms (4oz.) margarine

3 eggs

125gms (4oz.) soft brown sugar

125 gms (4oz) sultanas 125gms (4oz.) currants

125 gms (4oz.) raisins 75gms (3oz.) chopped mixed peel and chopped cherries.

40gms (1.5oz.) blanched almonds to decorate.

2 1/4 level teaspoons of baking powder.

METHOD.

Line 7" deep cake tin. Sift flour, B.P. & spice together. Cream margarine & sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time adding a tablespoon of flour with the last two. Fold in remaining flour and fruit till thoroughly mixed. Put in tin & decorate with nuts. Bake in a preheated oven 140C/290F/Gas mark 2 for 1 hr. Then lower to 130C/270F/Gas mark 1 for ½ to 1 hour approx.

VICTORIA SANDWICH

125 gms. (4oz.) margarine

125 gms. (4oz.) castor sugar

125 gms. (4oz.) self raising flour

2 eggs.

Cream margarine and sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time with a little flour. Fold in remaining flour.

OLD TOTLEY by Jo Rundle

How soon the custom began after the war ended, but, by the twenties the Hall was the place for celebration of some of the memorable occasions - particularly of the School and Chapel. Whit Monday singing on the lawn followed by children playing in the gardens; the parade around the gardens of the new May Queen, followed by her crowning on the lawn by Mrs. Milner; or dancing around the maypole on May 1st - when the pole was firmly fixed in a barrel that was decorated for the occasion with foliage and flowers, rather than to dig a hole in the lawn.

On the 18th of November 1930, I celebrated my 15th birthday with a gift from all the servants, and became the proud and happy possessor of a cut glass bowl for my dressing-table. Later in the morning I had a visit from my eleven-year-old Brother who brought gifts from my mother and middle, 13yr. old brother, and a mahogany glove-box inlaid with ebony, made for me by my, nearly 17 year old, eldest brother, an apprentice in Cabinet-making. Altogether, a happy birthday.

Christmas followed when all the servants received an envelope containing a ten-shilling note from Mrs. Wilson. I felt very rich indeed. However, our happiness didn't last for long, for, on the 21st of January 1931, the Master died, and, although he left all the servants a pound for every year they had served at the Hall, (which was increased to £2 for those who had served less than a year), it was a very sad time.

Almost immediately after the Master's funeral, the house was in turmoil when the Mistress revealed that she had cancer, but had not told the Master. It was now urgent, and for the next three months life was changed when the pink room next to the Mistress' bedroom was turned into a theatre, and the nurses occupied the two over the Turret room and Diningroom. We soon realised that when there are nurses in the house they take precedence; in the bedroom, in the kitchen, in fact in the house as a whole, and cause a lot of extra work.

Another housemaid, Minni, a middle-aged woman from Dinnington, was employed for a short time until the Mistress was recuperating and well on towards full recovery, helped by two-weeks in a cottage on the west coast of Scotland, a respite that we all welcomed, when uniforms were discarded, except for Edna the parlourmaid, who had at all times to be ready in case visitors arrived at the front door, and Lily, who 'apron-clad' still kept us all well-fed and watered. I should add that it was rather more like a holiday than a respite. Less work meant more leisure time, most of which was spent sitting around in the gardens, watching the frogs in the lily-pond, playing silly games, or just relaxing and, instead of the Servant's Hall, the Drawing Room was a wonderful place in which to spend the evenings talking, reading, sewing, or just relaxing, but I especially was thrilled to have the opportunity of playing a harpsichord and a grand piano for the first time, when the rafters really did ring as we all together sang, 'Cockles and Mussels' just like the Mistress.

The rest of 1931 was uneventful but, by November the house was almost taken over by a firm of household valuers who 'popped-up' in all sorts of unexpected places, still wearing their bowler hats, takingover the kitchen during morning coffee time. During that same summer, whilst enjoying my annual week holiday at Blackpool with my family, my father received a telegram from Mrs. Milner requesting that he buy me a suitable uniform because, on my return, I was to be under housemaid. A shopping trip down Bond Street soon fulfilled the request, and I duly returned, not to my beloved kitchen, but to a completely different world - 'Upstairs'.

I now worked with Annie who was now Head housemaid after, so I was told, a row with Edna the Parlourmaid. Mary was now one of many housemaids

in a large Hall whose visitors regularly included the Prince of Wales and his friends, and the well-known Lady Iris Mountbatten. She kept in touch, and dropped-in to see us when visiting her family. One of my first jobs in the 'Front house' was with Annie, now Head-housemaid, with whom, every Wednesday morning we had to scrub the huge sandstone-paved front hall floor with cold water. She explained that it had to be cold water and no soap, as that would gradually change the colour of the stone, but it wasn't quite so easy as it sounds for, as soon as the water touched the stone it sank straight through and the answer was, to sink the floor-cloth into the bucket of cold water, and quickly slap it onto the floor and scrub, as hard and fast as possible, before it disappeared. I must admit that the cream sandstone certainly looked better for its scrubbing, provided noone walked on it before it was dry.

Lily once said to me - "You know Joss, you either like housework or cooking, and I like cooking", and I agreed! We all knew that eventually the Hall as we had known it would change, and in 1933 Mrs. Milner bought the house 'Tythe Barn' at Baslow, re-named it 'Tythe Acre' and, after a huge sale at which my Father bought a few mementos, including the scales that had lived on the kitchen table for so many years, and now live on mine. She moved in, taking Lily as her Cook, Annie as her Housemaid, and David Lewis as her Gardener.

Totley Hall was let, first to the Allan family, and later during W.W.II to Colonel Tozer, his wife, and Daughter Pauline. At Easter 1933 1 returned to Photo-Finishers, this time as a member of the fulltime Staff, graduating into the Commercial section in charge of picture- framing, where the glue-pot sat on a gas-ring, to be heated up every morning ready for the first batch of photographs, posters, or whatever had been produced by the Enlargement Dept. and ending my career in photography as Manageress of the Enlargement-checking Dept. when I left to be married to a Sheffield Policeman. Lily was a guest, by which time she had left the Milner household and was Head Cook at the Albany Hotel, Sheffield. She said, with no regrets, "We didn't quite make it to the Royal Household, did we?" Mrs. Milner died I believe in 1945. Totley Hall was sold and became part of Totley-Hall College in 1957/8, whose main building, when viewed from Moorwood Lane, Holmesfield, was described by H.B.Ward as a huge 'Packing-case!'

In general terms, life in Totley during the early twenties was reasonably stable; men went about their daily work and women cleaned, cooked, and cared for the children, and kept house in their usual conciliatory manner, most of them proud to keep a clean, well-run house, and a happy home for husband and his 'Flock'. In return, most men were continued next page

proud of their wives, who turned them out each morning with a clean, carefully ironed shirt, and provided tasty 'Snap' or 'Bait' as some men called their snack lunch, for it gave them 'Good standing' (reputation), amongst their fellow workers.

There was no automatic annual rise in wages; all men were paid according to their jobs, a rise granted only with extra responsibility. However, to keep life on an even keel, so to speak, there was no automatic annual rise in food prices. A medium tin of salmon was always 3s 6d, and the combined prices of flour, yeast and salt to produce three loaves and a bread-cake was one shilling, and sweets of all kinds were never more than ld for 2oz. For most things it was possible to budget from year to year and enjoy the benefits from a few more coppers in the wages. However, like all things, nothing in life is constant for long and, in 1926, the Strike, started by the Miners with their demand for an increase in their wages developed into a General strike and sadly had repercussions on others, never considered by those involved in its making.

Pits do not take care of themselves; there are pumps to manage to prevent flooding, pit-props to supervise and replace when necessary, and the inevitable falls of rock to monitor and remove; all necessary if the pits are to be safe for the miners' return. The Managers were asked, and were willing, to work throughout the strike to ensure that they would be safe, and the miners jobs would be saved. After almost a year the Mine-owners were all on the verge of bankruptcy and the miners were ready to return to work to save their jobs. Unfortunately in some of the smaller pits, including Pickford & Holland, the single owners could continue business only if the Managers would accept a temporary halfcut in their own wages. This, of course, included my father, repercussions from which made a profound difference in my own life.

Fortunately, although I have occasionally been called "Feisty", as 'Simone Simone' a Spiritualist, told me when I was about eighteen years old, "Born a Scorpio, you will always have to fight, but you will always be able to fight" How's that for a legacy? In the aftermath of the Strike there was depression, particularly in those villages in the Peak District, where not only the miners and their families were struggling to survive, but also the farmers.

By tradition, Miners had always been allowed one ton of coal every six weeks as part of their wages. Some of the smaller pits had put a temporary stop to the practice, and many people were finding it very difficult to survive. As if by an Act of Providence, a solution was near at hand in the form of the owner of a well-known coal dealing firm 'The Hallamshire Coal Supplies' of Sheffield, later known as 'Burnett & Hallamshire Coal Supplies' who handled some of the coal from the Strawberry-Lea pit as one of their cheaper items at the low price of 15s.9d per ton. After much discussion between the two men, my Father was asked if he could approach the people of Hathersage and Grindleford, and those in the farms and homesteads in the outlying districts to see if they would be willing to take delivery of coal in summer, at summer prices, sufficient to last them through the winter, and pay for it at a fixed price each month which my Father would collect.

Of course he agreed. He loved meeting people, had a great personality, and he already knew some of the people affected from visiting my Mother's relatives

who lived in and around Hathersage. From the first week it was evident that the arrangements were a success and news soon spread to other districts through friends and relations, helped by the local men who worked at Moss Mine in Dore, also owned by Pickford and Holland, and managed by my Father. By the end of the first year (1927) there were enough interested people in Dore to start a new round and soon he was a very busy man with an early morning rise to set-on the first shift at Strawberry-Lea pit, and over to Dore to see those who had been set on by his deputy, returning in time to set on the afternoon shift, then home about 3.30 pm. for a meal and 'Wash and brush-up' before 'Doing the rounds'.

It was evident that some changes had to be made, and in 1927 he bought a motor-bike, an Omega, well named for the home journey, for he always said, with some relief, "Ome-e-go". Later he added a side-car when my Mother started helping, and in 1932 his first car that we called "The red bullet", a two-seater sports car, bright red, and his pride and joy! The 'Coal business' as we called it, continued, and the idea of 'paying on the never-never' developed into a way of life, accepted as a respectable system of paying for something as you used it and buying and selling through catalogues was a 'Way of life'.

When I left Totley Hall and returned to Photo-finishers, my Father took it for granted that I would do the collecting on Friday evenings, in lieu of paying for my board, even though it was the evening when all the 'girls' had a night out together. At 5 o'clock he waited for me outside the front door of the old Chapel at Netheredge, and made a quick return to Lane-head for tea, a wash and brush-up, and a quick exit for the journey to Dore, dropping me off at the top of Townhead Road, where I commenced the weekly routine of collecting payments, signing receipt books, taking orders, and usually having a cup of tea, or whatever was offered.

About two hours later I made my way to the Devonshire Arms Hotel where I knew there would be a glass containing port and lemon waiting on a table in the Bar with a packet of crisps or nuts beside it, and a vacant seat beside my smiling Father and seats full of partly inebriated, smiling men, lounging around, and filling the room. I knew that all was well with the world. I was still seventeen years old. This was the pattern of my life and those around me for a few years, and life in Totley was comparatively stable, although there were two suicides, both men who obviously had problems, one in Shrewsbury Terrace the other in Summer Lane, and, although some things did happen in the village that we on the outskirts were barely aware of, nothing very dramatic was reported. Two of my friends had left school in the last few months, and it was my turn at Christmas to say a sad "Good-bye" to the Headmaster John Wood, and receive the sixpence that he put into every one of his pupils' hands on the day they left his care; closing his fingers over it and wishing them a successful life, and to "Keep on learning". Sad, but expectant, wondering what the world had to offer to me now when there was little that a girl could do in this quiet village, apparently miles away from opportunity, yet excited at the thought of being an adult. I was last in the line of six on the same journey as he watched us leave. He was still standing there when I turned to look back at the school when he waved, and I waved back. To be continued.

King Ecgbert School Project Uganda

On a ridge, in the middle of Africa overlooking a national park lives a community of several hundred people. Fertile, peaceful, beautiful, idyllic. Except.... There is no electricity, no gas, no sewerage, no running water (the nearest water of any sort is a two hour trek down the hill) and up until two years ago the only schooling for the children took place under the trees.

Two years ago a team of King Ecgbert School went there to help change this community's prospects and this summer another team is returning to continue the work started at that time. We're building a school. We have a very good one here (some features of it are outstanding according to OFSTED) and we'd like the community in Kabukwiri Uganda to enjoy some of the educational benefits and advantages that we do. Sixteen students and two teachers from King Ecgbert will spend three weeks in Uganda building, teaching and doing what we can to encourage the Kabukwiri community. Two years ago a block containing two classrooms and two offices was built up to ring beam Since then we have raised a further £6,000 towards the building, some of which has been already sent out to carry on the work. We hope our visit this summer will see this block completely finished and other work e.g. a school kitchen and installation of water tanks begun. Money goes a long way when you consider that a foreman builder earns only £1 a day and all the bricks are made by hand by the local community.

We are under no illusions that our team are some sort superheroes going to change the world. We will undoubtedly get a lot more from the expedition than we will ever be able to put back in, it will be an important maybe even life changing experience. The project is however, a sustainable venture. Once the classrooms and teacher accommodation are completed the Ugandan government will take on the continued funding of the school and provide the Kabukwiri community with on going education. Surely an important key to transformation.

Team members have all raised their own finance for the expedition through part time jobs, all sorts of sales, sponsored events, company and charity sponsorships and gifts from family and friends. Money from the building has equally been raised from the same sort of activities including events with local businesses, the Vulcan Rotary Club and fundraising in school involving many more pupils and students than those who are fortunate enough to be going to Uganda this summer.

We are very thankful to all the local businesses, organisations and individuals who have helped us. We can't change the whole world but have a chance here to change the world of a good number of young people, Ugandan and British, so that their futures will be different.

I notice that the above property is for sale by Bloor & Co, and this week it takes pride of place on the front page of the Sheffield Telegraph Property Guide. The property is described as having "private pathway access from Baslow Road". I assume this refers to the public footpath which has existed for many years and to my knowledge is not private and is available for the use of the general public.

I recall that in a previous issue of Totley Independent the question was asked whether this was a public right of way or not, but I have not seen any reference to it since.

I very much doubt that this is a private right of way to the property and if so it would be documented in the title deeds and would have to be maintained by the owner. Is the property registered at the Land Registry, does the property register refer to this footpath as belonging to the property? I have lived in Sheffield all my life and in Totley for 14 years and have regularly used this footpath as a "public right of way". When Jepsons Car Sales traded from the adjoining land it was a very well used public right of way.

I would be interested to know if anybody has any old maps of Totley which could verify the situation, as I think it is a shame that sometimes people take matters into their own hands and when nobody challenges them they take over land/property that does not belong to them.

Blacka Moor

- help protect your patch and the wildlife it supports

As most people who visit Blacka Moor know, it's a haven for wildlife. Jim Clarke, a local bird surveyor who grew up in the area, has been Sheffield & mapping the bird species and their Rotherham



territories throughout Blacka Moor heath and woods. He has some excellent results, with many species breeding in good numbers. However, he has come across the occasional problem on the nature reserve with dogs inadvertently disturbing nests. Most people are aware of the need to keep dogs under close control during March through to July, but he has witnessed some problems. In one particular case, we had 3 pairs of grasshopper warblers starting to breed, with one pair having abandoned the nest. It's thought that this was due to disturbance from dogs. There is also real potential for nightiar or even black grouse to nest at Blacka Moor as the habitat is suitable, but with the presence of dogs running across the heath and pastures during breeding season, there is little chance of them breeding successfully.

Therefore, we're reminding people to keep dogs under close control from 1st March to 31st July - this means ensuring dogs stay on the actual path route and within sight, and respond to being called. If you can't rely on your dog's obedience, put it on a lead. This is especially important on the heathland and pastures. Legally, you do not have to use a lead on public paths as long as the dog is under close control, but we ask dog owners be extra vigilant in the breeding season. The report on the breeding birds is currently being put together - keep a look out on our website www.wildsheffield.com. 1. Focus on your weight loss goal and prioritise it.

Be sure you really want to lose weight for yourself. Doing it to please someone else may only lead to short term weight loss.
