My entry, a foliage plant actually won! Several people wanted to know what the plant is called. It is an insect eating plant, a Darlingtonia or Cobra Lily. It has an uncanny likeness to a cobra poised to strike, a very strange pitcher plant. It is a native of the mountains of Northern California and Oregon, found alongside mountain streams in very high altitudes, often covered by snow. It is also found almost down to sea level where it is hot in summer.

My plant grows in moss and the plant stands in rain water. I keep it outside all the time.

I do not feed it at all it feeds on insects that are attracted by the plant

In spring it produces a flower, beautiful and unusual.

Les Firth who organised the petition to the Halifax and TRA have received replies to our letters of concern, but it would appear our requests to keep the branch open have been unsuccessful.

Several of us from Totley and Hallam were given the opportunity to visit Atlas Court, home of 101, the Communication Centre of South Yorkshire Police. After a ride in the Community Police Van, we were welcomed by Inspector Craig Patchett and the Communication Officer. The modern, purpose built building opened in 2003. It is linked to the Police National Computer System.

A team of 400 civilian staff man the phones. They are trained for 13 weeks and then work for 9 months and are assessed. They work $9\frac{1}{2}$ -10 hour shifts, which we thought very long, considering the concentration needed.

Call handlers need speedy computer skills to type up details of reported incidents so police can respond quickly. Each call handler works with 3 computer screens.

The incidents are prioritised:-

- 1. Immediate action 15 minutes
- 2. Priority in an hour
- 3. Scheduled incident, police will attend when they are able.

101 and 999 calls come in directly to the call handler, who deals with them according to the severity of the incident.

The call centre sends details to the Council if not police related such as lights not on. Many 101 calls are relevant to the Police and the Council, so details are sent to both authorities.

The 101 Service will be continuing in Sheffield and will be extended to include the Homeless Services and Social Services, as well as Anti Social Behaviour problems. The system between the Police and Council works well.

Atlas Court deals with Sheffield (3 sections), Doncaster, Rotherham and Barnsley.

Calls from the Fire and Ambulance Services are also taken, in 75% of incidents the Police attend as well. Use of the Police helicopter is also dealt with at Atlas Court.

On average in a month 20,000 999 calls are received, 35,000 non emergency calls and 45,000 101 calls.

On New Years Eve 2006/07 between 8.00pm and 6.00am 1037 999 calls were taken compared to 300 on a normal night.

We were impressed with the modern, integrated system designed to keep us safe and secure.

We must all do our best to help keep our community safe by ringing 101, 2202020, or 999.

There is nothing to fear about ringing 101, no one will know you have made the call, and you do not even have to give your name to the call handler.

Remember, if an incident is not recorded and written down so the authorities know about it, nothing will be done. Anti social behaviour incidents in our area have begun to decrease, several parents have been visited by the police and Parent Advice Letters (PAL) have been issued.

Let us hope this will have the desired effect. Avril Critchley


T.O.A.D.S. AUTUMN PRODUCTION

Thank you for submitting your petition to us regarding the Totley agency counter. We appreciate the time you have taken circulating this petition and are grateful to you for you bringing it to our attention.

I would like to assure you that the decision to close an agency counter is never one that we take lightly and we are very grateful to the local community for their custom over the years. We do appreciate the strength of local feeling about the closure and we are sorry for any inconvenience caused. The senior management team at Halifax have reviewed your petition and while we are very mindful of the concerns it highlights, for a number of reasons which we explained in detail to Oldales at the time we informed them of our decision, the closure of the counter will proceed as planned

Minimising the affect of the counter closure on our customers is our priority and we are keen to continue the customer relationships we have established in Totley. We will be working closely with the proprietors of Oldales to ensure that the alternative arrangements available for customers are explained and that those who need additional guidance are offered support.

As you have noted, the nearest Halifax branches, which offer a full range of banking services to customers, are in Sheffield but the Group does have an arrangement with the Post Office, whereby our personal customers can use Post Offices to carry out day to day banking transactions. As you will be aware, in Totley there is a Post Office within close proximity of Oldales on Baslow Road.

As always, customers can use their Halifax banking or savings card in any Halifax or LINK cash machine free of charge. In Totley there is a cash machine within 500m of Oldales. Our telephone and internet banking services are also available 24 hours a day, seven days a week to assist customers and if customers want guidance on how to register or use these services, we would be happy to help.

Customers who would like to discuss these changes or the alternative services which are available to them can call and speak to us at any point by calling 0845 604 3698 between 8am and 6pm Monday to Friday or 8am and 4pm on Saturdays.



We were lucky enough to get a small amount of funding from the South West Area Panel Community Chest, and some funding and a great deal of other support from Totley Residents Association. Costs were kept to a minimum, mainly because the performers gave their services free of charge, and all venues except one were provided free of charge. Special thanks to Steve and Gaynor, Howard and Chris, Bob and Hilary, and Sally and Rony, all of whom made huge contributions not only by playing, but also by taking the lead in organising several of the events.

Looking ahead to 2010: naturally, we'll be twisting the arms of all those who worked with us on the Festival this year, but we need more Totley people to get involved in organising the Festival for next summer. We need ideas about funding, about performers, about venues, about publicity, all sorts of things. Baslow Road Lights 2

The road from Owler Bar has always been a notorious danger roadway down to and even past The Cross Scythes since before the war when traffic was thinner on the ground and AA patrol men rode bicycles.

I would have thought that now heavy goods vehicles, some huge monster lorries, have been rerouted away from Holmesfield and Dronfield Woodhouse lights would make for much safer driving. I find light makes driving much safer. Surely safety comes first, or does it?

As for the terminus I can now get to sleep before midnight and sleep past 4.50 am in the morning.

Whether the council or First Mainline could get the bus drivers to turn the bus engines off, some stand for 10 minutes or more. Although Mainline insisted that this was not the case they hadn't a clue.

There was more fuel wasted than the amount it takes to get to the new terminus, one wonders how many objectors actually used the old terminus.

However, I cannot imagine any council being daft enough to spend all that tax payers money to take the retrograde step of coming back to the old site.

Further to recent correspondence on the above issue, I should like to enquire how the plot of land used for the new turning circle came to be allocated. Was this acquired by compulsory purchase or did the owner of the land agree to release it for a certain sum? Any cost should surely be declared as well as the cost of the lighting and its removal, and the construction costs of the terminus itself.

I still regard Totley terminus as being at The Cross Scythes. What I have never understood is why there is no bus shelter there, regardless of whether it should be in the former turning circle or somewhere suitable on the pavement.

Finally, as regular walkers in the Totley area, my wife and I wonder why part of the official footpath has been eliminated as surely an order is required to close or alter any official footpath. The actual footpath sign is still to be seen on the photograph in the last edition of the Independent, page 6, on the right hand side. Now the stile has been filled in and the wall now blocks off the earlier path completely. Why should walkers have to abandon a short stretch of field footpath and use a tarmac bus turning circle instead? Please press for reinstatement of this short stretch of familiar path.

GARDENING TIPS FOR OCTOBER

The sun came out and so did the people of Totley and district. The Totley show was busy busy - we had some lovely exhibits to admire; knitting, cuddly toys, tapestries, patchwork, cakes and jams galore - a super selection of flowers and the artists and photographers excelled themselves. The gardeners did very well too with enormous leeks and onions, gigantic marrows and squash etc.etc. The wood workers and sculpturers put up a nice little show, but the highlight for me was the children's section they really had some wonderful ideas for the wibberly wobberly jellies, the Lego models, miniature gardens, from a good mixture of age groups, the vegetable animals were really entertaining. WELL DONE CHILDREN - and well done parents for encouraging them to take part and giving the show a real boost. The tea room was buzzing with the exciting chatter from the youngsters, and the golden oldies having a good chinwag over a nice cup of tea and a slice of my Dundee cake (well some of them did) and some of the other goodies served up by a very busy team of tea ladies. The volunteers worked wonderfully well - backing up the organising committee's hard work, enabling things to run smoothly, the heavy crew looked tired at the end of the show having heaved and towed at tables and display boards. Well done lads a grand job done very efficiently. The prize giving was very well received - the serious little faces of the children receiving their medals was very moving.

A special accolade to Jennie Street who found time during the busy time of organising things to gather enough goodies from her garden and hens to enable her to win the best in show shield for her fresh produce. Well done Jennie. A well done also to Mr. Hutchinson he received the best in show cup for the best of the other exhibits excluding fresh produce. Well done to all you winners and all the other participants you gave Totley a show to remember. A list of all the winners is in this issue of TI.

The games and stalls inside and outside were well patronised and the amount of visitors made their efforts worthwhile. Many thanks to the judges for doing a very difficulty job with enthusiasm.

We must not forget the auction - Rony and Charlie did a stalwart job encouraging people to part with their cash in exchange for all the lovely goods generously donated by the exhibitors.

A good time was had by all sums up the 2009 Totley show Thank you Totley - it's your efforts that make your show.

FLOWERS Order roses ready for planting next month. Prepare beds for spring plantings removing summer bedding, and forking over the soil adding a dressing of fertilizer. Herbaceous plants can be put in now except in exposed gardens, which are best, left till spring. Lift and divide Michealmas daisies and other herbaceous plants, which have outgrown their allotted space. Tender plants, which have been outdoors, must be lifted and place indoors, begonia tubers must be lifted and dried off and stored in a cool frost-free place.

Summer bulbs must be lifted or covered with mulch before the frost comes, keep newly planted plants well watered during any dry spells. Plant out spring flowering bulbs narcissi, Lilies, daffodils and crocus, hold tulips and hyacinth until the end of the month. Don't forget if you are inter planting forget-me-nots, polyanthus and primulas with spring bulbs the plants go in first, dahlias can be lifted when the frost has blackened the tops. You needn't wait for that if the ground is required for planting lift them carefully with a fork, cut down the stems to about 6-9" above the tuber lay them with the stalks downwards in a frost free place, ten days or so later the tubers may be cleaned cutting away any damaged roots or doubtful pieces, and dust with flowers of sulphur, don't forget to label them.

VEGETABLES Dig vacant ground as crops are cleared. Plant out spring cabbage in firm soil, earth up leeks and celery for the last time, cut marrows and hang them in nets in a cool dry place, remove any discoloured leaves from brassicas, put onions in store by roping them or in nets, inspect regularly and remove any suspect bulbs. Keep the hoe going around all growing crops, and watch out for pests and deal with them before they get established. Turnips can be lifted and the tops screwed off, store them in sand, you could leave some in the ground and use the tops as an alternative vegetable, cook as for spinach. Make sure Brussels sprouts are well supported it would be a shame to lose them having got this far. All root crops other than parsnips, Swedes and Jerusalem artichokes should be lifted and stored. Store potatoes in a dark well ventilated frost proof place, if they are stored in heat they will begin to sprout.

TREES FRUIT AND SHRUBS Hardwood cuttings of gooseberries and blackcurrants can be taken now insert

9" to 10" cuttings 6" deep in a sheltered position outdoors, peaches should be sprayed at leaf fall with lime sulphur against leaf curl. Cut out any dead or crossing branches from trees and bushes, paint any cuts larger than 1/2" diameter with arbrex. Don't forget to inspect any fruit in store and dismiss any doubtful apples and pears, pick any fruit still on the trees before they are dashed by weather, remember to limit the new growth of raspberries to 6 to 8 canes per plant. Make sure all cordon trees are well supported and the ties are not fraying Evergreen shrubs and trees should be planted by mid month, hardwood cuttings can be taken from shrubby plants. Give established shrubs and trees a mulch of manure or compost working it into the soil with a dressing of bone meal. If the weather prevents the planting of newly delivered trees and shrubs undo the packaging and stand them in a dry shed until the weather breaks covering the roots with straw or sacking which must be kept damp.

GREENHOUSE AND INDOOR PLANTS Remove all traces of shading from the greenhouse, if you have had trouble with pests clear the greenhouse and fumigate with smoke cones and wash down with disinfectant, any tender plants that have been left out should be brought inside or the frosts will kill them, a minimum temperature of 4 degrees to 7 degrees C (39-45 degrees should be maintained. Cineraria are a bit temperamental it will collapse if allowed to dry out or go soggy so watch out. Bring in Primula abconica from the frame; this plant can affect sensitive skins so gardeners beware. Pot on schizanthus to larger pots they do not like to be pot bound. Grapes which are slow to ripen can be hurried along by removing more leaves around the bunches. A final batch of viola and pansy cuttings may be taken and inserted in pots in cold frame. Gradually cut down watering on fuchsias don't let them dry out completely. Treat cyclamen to a fortnightly feed. Watch the temperature don't forget a sunny winters day can soon raise the temperature to over 100 degrees F. this can be devastating to resting plants.

LAWNS Carry out any final repairs. Rake and scarify, brush over with a fine compost and treat with autumn, winter lawn fertilizer, this will give you a fine green sward in the spring.

Hello Again, What a few months it's been since I last wrote for **Totley Independent** with changes taking place within the pub itself, to the menu and what we offer as well as in the wider local area.

Most significantly since I last wrote I have taken on board local chef Simon Barnes who has put together a fabulous new menu with the emphasis strictly on locally sourced produce where possible and fresh cooked to order dishes made on premises. Simon may be familiar to some of you through his great work at local farm shop Liberty Foods where he works alongside Damian Bower using the same principles of local, fresh produce.

The current menu is however changing and we are introducing a new autumn menu to make the most of the local seasonal produce now becoming available. We will also be introducing other seasonal changes to the menu and in the pub itself that will lead us up to Christmas and the New Year.

We will be offering a traditional Christmas Fayre menu between December 1st and December 23rd. This is five course set menu (bookings only) served between 7pm and 9pm Thursday to Saturday, details of which will follow in the next edition of **Totley Independent**. We are also offering an exciting New Years Eve menu, once again spaces are limited and so booking is essential. Music will be provided by the sensational New Orleans blues piano player Dale Storr (he has a website if you wish to look). Tickets for music only will be priced at £5.00 but will be given free to diners, again more information will be provided in the next edition of **Totley Independent**.

Our autumn menu is as previously mentioned now up and running with main courses such as grilled monkfish with aubergines and pickled samphire grass, lamb four ways (stuffed lamb loin, homemade lamb sausage with devilled kidneys and homemade Yorkshire puddings) homemade vegetable Moussaka and our chef's popular honey-roast fall off the bone pork hock, with wholegrain mustard mash and mixed bean casserole. These fantastic new seasonal dishes will also run alongside out normal menu which includes sirloin steak, matured and hand cut on premises, served with crispy new potato thins and our popular traditional Grimsby cod and chips fried in beef dripping and served with mushy peas and homemade pickled onion slices.

Moving away from the menu I am delighted to announce the successful completion of a five year contract with Punch Taverns. Punch Taverns bought the Crown and thousands of other pubs in the early 90's and have operated a lease agreement with the landlords since that time. The completion on the deal means that my staff and me are now secure and the pub can carry on serving the local community for years to come.

Inside the pub I have ensured that the unique character remains whilst making changes to behind the bar and in other areas too.

Whilst removing the dated varnished wood bar we discovered and restored what I strongly believe to be the old exterior wall to the original cottage. Complemented by local slate tiles the bar now feels and looks bigger yet still retains that all important character. The central column which met you as you came through the door has been removed and its amazing how much more space it has created and how much bigger that area feels

There is still so much to do but these changes I believe make a huge difference over all and bring the pub forward without damaging that all important character and ambience.

Talking of ambience, the ever popular open fire will be roaring again soon thanks to Punch Taverns agreeing to finance the necessary lining work required to the ancient chimney. I hope to have it working daily from early October, but if truth be told I could have justified it

many times throughout the fabulous "summer" we had! So much for that heat wave!

As I have mentioned previously in **Totley Independent,** I am fanatical about my beer and was delighted to introduce Easy Rider from Kelham Island a few months ago. However as the nights are now drawing in and getting colder I will be changing it soon to a darker more wintry beer.

Due to me being a Punch pub I am enormously restricted to what I can buy, Easy Rider being the only real local ale available. But there are a few to choose from so pop in from early October to find out what it will be

One group of people that loved the guest ale is the local Totley Athletic Club. Since I took over I have tried to encourage local groups like Totley A.C. to use the pub as a social meeting place as well as for more official business as I believe that's what a proper local pub is all about. The Crown' history and the Totley A.C history though have been intrinsically linked for over 40 years. Rumour has it that the club was founded in the pub originally as a walking group with whichever landlord it was at that time sitting on the committee, certainly true for the characterful and much loved landlord John Harrop. But as numbers swelled it became a running group and is now has many members both in Totley and in the areas beyond.

I have catered for Totley A.C. twice when they have had an end of season run and put on homemade steak and ale pie with chips and mushy peas for up to 50 runners. It was a squeeze but everyone had a great time and enjoyed themselves immensely. If you are part of a walking, cycling or any other group and would like to use the Crown for similar gatherings then don't hesitate to ask. Call me on the number at the bottom of the page to discuss details.

Finally one of the great successes for the pub this year has been the live music and homemade pie on a Tuesday night. Previously just reserved for jazz artists I quickly introduced rock and roll, blues, acoustic, blues and soul as well as jazz with remarkable effect. Notably, the blues and soul review band Highway Child and the three piece rock and roll band The Screaming Kidneys featuring Steve Delaney, Shaun Mac and Paul Beetham, all from the well know local band The Sharpcuts, have proved very successful. But jazz artist Nicola Farnon, blues piano player Dale Storr and the brilliant acoustic blues band Louisiana have all been very well received. If you fancy coming and having proper pie and enjoying the live music please book a table on the usual number. Spaces are limited and some acts are fully booked weeks in advance so ring early to get a good table.

I'd just like to finish by saying a big thank you to all my brilliant customers who have continued to come down and support me throughout the year, it is greatly appreciated.

Local Artists get all Steamed Up

A group of local amateur Sheffield artists will be branching out this year with their first significant exhibition, set to coincide with the forthcoming Steam Gathering at Abbeydale Industrial Hamlet, when steam-powered vehicles from across the region will congregate. The art group, under the tutelage of professional artist Brian Smith, has made several trips to the Hamlet during the summer, using it as inspiration for a series of "plein air" paintings which will form the backbone of the show.

Says Brian, "The group has been together now for some time and has accumulated a lot of painting experience. The opportunities offered by the Hamlet in terms of composition and atmosphere, coupled with its place as one of the major remaining testimonies to Sheffield's industrial heritage, make it a superb source of subject matter. The standard of the group's work is so high that I felt it should be shared with a wider audience and I'm confident that visitors to the exhibition will be delighted by what they see."

Amongst other subjects, the exhibition will feature familiar Hamlet scenes, and a collection of steam-related subjects, in keeping with the weekend's theme of steam engines and rollers.

There will also be an opportunity for younger visitors to get to grips with a painting of their own. Brian, a frequent visitor to South Yorkshire schools as an artist in residence, is preparing a giant tableau which visiting children will be invited to paint, under the guidance of members of the group. Depicting many of the small scale industrial processes and aspects of everyday life which have formed an integral part of the history of the site, the tableau will provide an educational insight into the workings of the Hamlet. All painting materials will be available free of charge and the finished work will remain in position for future visitors to enjoy.

Brian himself will be taking advantage of what promises to be an exciting weekend, weather permitting, he will be out with his easel around the site, capturing some of the exhibits on show, in watercolour.

Sheffield Industrial Museums Trust will be hosting the Steam Gathering, which will take place on 3rd and 4th October, between 10.00am - 5.00pm. Admission is free.


