MP's back to school day

You may or may not know that Friday 23rd April was 'MP's back to school day.' We invited Richard Allan MP and Nick Clegg MEP to come along and speak to our youngsters about what they do and to take questions from them. The questions varied from 'Have you met Tony?' to 'Knowing what you know now, was invading Iraq a good idea?' So as you can see the session was light hearted as well as very informative. As well as these questions, some of our students pressed them on local issues such as why are there not more traffic calming measures on Furniss Avenue and Totley Brook Road. We only had an hour with them before they left for 2 other schools, but it was certainly an enjoyable experience.

Adult Education Classes

Since Christmas we have been able to run (free of charge) adult education classes in ICT and Asian cooking. These have proved very popular, particularly the ICT sessions, which in total attracted around 60 adults. These have stopped for the moment. However, we are working with Sheffield College and they will be using us as a centre from September for a number of courses. The publicity has not yet been produced, but when it comes out, I hope as many local residents as possible will take advantage of the courses which will be put on here at KES. As these courses will be delivered by Sheffield college tutors there will be a charge involved.

The Wizard of Oz

I cannot write about the school and the community without mentioning our production of the 'Wizard of Oz'. For three evenings in March the hall was sold out. The quality of performance from everyone involved was spectacular -1 was extremely proud to be associated with the school and they will now be performing at the Merlin theatre for two nights in July. I know that the local residents who came along to watch thoroughly enjoyed themselves and I hope next time, when we are in the new school that we shall have even more of you attending.

Charity week

During Charity week at school we raised nearly 1,000 pounds. The school council decides how we spend this money. This year half will be going to the Sheffield Childrens Hospital, while the other half will go towards the building of a community room in the New Mosque which is being re-built on Wolsley Road. The governors from the Mosque will be coming up to school to meet the Headteacher and to have a look around the school in May.

On this subject, we are continually trying to improve community links with all our local communities. I, with Mazher Baig, our Urdu teacher go to the Mosque on the last Thursday of every month, to speak to the members of the Mosque. These visits promote greater understanding of one another and now some of our school governors have expressed a desire to accompany me on these visits. As well as this, on the last Wednesday of every month, I with Mazher and Gavin Walker, our Inclusion coordinator go to Highfield Library from 4.00-5.30pm to make ourselves available to local residents of this area. We call it a 'Drop-in surgery,' where anyone can walk in off the street and speak to us around any issue concerning the school.

One family have been told their child, registered aged 6 months and attends "Whiz Kids" cannot now go to Totley Primary School although they live in Totley. It is hoped contact with an education officer will help with the problem. TRA are hoping to start up the web site again. If anyone feels they could help in any way we would be most grateful. BT have contacted Npower again. They are still waiting for them to reinstate the power so the telephone can be used again.

We look forward to hearing from you with what you feel Totley wants/needs in the future.

man and joint exhibitions. The Baslow exhibition is open 10am to 5pm and entry is free.



Totley Residents Association 2004 A.G.M.

The AGM was held in Totley Library on Monday 19th April. There was a good attendance of 50 people, including Councillor Keith Hill, Councillor Colin Ross, T.R.A. Committee members and local residents. All were welcomed to the meeting.

Minutes from the 2003 AGM were circulated. As there were no matters arising from these minutes they were accepted unanimously. The Chairman gave the report for the year.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - Avril Critchley

It does not seem a year since I was giving the last report. Where has the year gone? The committee have quietly carried on trying to improve life for the residents of Totley. Some of the requests of the 'Wish List' have been granted, many others are long term and require patience. Friends of Green Oak Park has been set up – more from their Chairman later. The committee met with Pamela Horner from South Yorkshire Passenger Transport and Mike Nuttall from First Mainline – many questions were asked the results being:

- Buses are run as a business not a public service
- There is a shortage of bus drivers
- Their hours are strictly governed
- They are often under pressure from abusive passengers
- Any problems re buses should be reported 0114 221 1452
- A621 is a Quality Bus corridor with an improvement programme. Totley is mid-way through this programme. We should see improvements bus shelters during 2004.
- Supertram was discussed concerns expressed if it were to terminate at Dore station as to what would happen to Totley. It now appears cost has ruled out the route.

Totley Show – September 6th was a successful community event the money raised going to T17. Thanks to the Show Committee who gave up their time throughout the year and to all the volunteers who helped on the day. A special thank you to the retiring show chairman Pauline Perkinton and to Tom and Christine Steel. We are pleased that Les Firth has taken over the position of Show Committee Chairman.

Totley Open Gardens were held on July 19th/20th. Congratulations to all concerned, particularly Jennie Street who co-ordinated the event. The money raised being donated to T17.

The Council supplied us with more bulbs, daffodils this time. Thanks to the hardy souls who spent a Saturday morning in the cold and wet planting them mainly across Baslow Road from the Library. They certainly brighten up Totley.

Tidying up Totley – things have improved thanks to those who lead the way and tidy up on a regular basis. The Council workmen now walk up Baslow Road o a regular basis with their litter pickers. It is up to us to do our bit and keep our community tidy.

Youth nuisance – residents were angry and upset when bus shelters were smashed many times, the Co-op phone box was blown apart and graffiti scrawled everywhere. The Police were invited to a meeting in October. They were presented with a detailed list of incidents which had occurred. As a result the area has been targeted by police patrols on a regular basis. With help from the community who were asked to ring in with incidents on 220 2020 or 296 3680. Most of the troublemakers are now known to the police. Parents have been informed. Do not hesitate to ring if anything happens.

Phone box will be re-instated waiting for Npower, letter from Chairman and Petition were a success.

Green Oak View – closure soon as it does not meet with national standards. Meeting in January 2004 with Eddie Sherwood and Janet Burke from Social Services, also concerned members from local churches. Will close in December – no decision as yet to what will happen with the site. Residents moving to The Lees at Norton.

Finally I would like to thank the Committee for their help and support, especially Amanda Hardwick for keeping the minutes, Les Firth, Ian Clarke and John Perkinton for the Independent, Mike Williamson for acting as my deputy and finally Maurice Snowdon and Richard Wriggleswoth – our Treasurers. Thanks also to members of the community who are willing to help in any way – particularly Marlene Marshall and Janet Bale. Thanks also go to our local councillors and SW Area representative.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Richard Wrigglesworth

Richard Wrigglesworth circulated the balance sheet was and highlighted the following points. There was a surplus of £762.07 from the Independent. TRA is a sound organization built round the Independent, the Totley Show and the Open Gardens, with an income of about £3,400.

The accounts were accepted. Thanks to Richard Frost for auditing the accounts. He agreed to audit the accounts again for next year.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR 2004/2005

Mike Williamson on behalf of TRA and Totley thanked Maurice for his valuable help over the years. Some of Maurice's 'Jobs' were highlighted. December 87 – April 91 as the Independent Editor and then Treasurer. He often acting as an 'ambassador' for TRA and Totley at various meetings.

The existing committee then stood down, nominations for executive positions and committee members were then proposed, seconded and accepted by the meeting.

The committee remains the same as last year, except for the retirement of Maurice Snowden.

Thanks to Ian Clarke for editing the Independent and John Perkinton for distribution, also thanks to Dot further in her support as 'reader'. Also thanks to all the advertisers and Starprint – who have not increased the printing costs for 13 years. Continued support is always welcomed.

REPORT FROM CHAIRMAN OF FRIENDS OF GREEN OAK PARK – Sylvia Ruddle

The setting up of the group was outlined – there is a committee who meet once a month. They have a bank account; this was needed so that they could apply for grants. They opened the account with £350 from fund raising, £16,000 available from 106 planning gain monies. This has allowed one piece of equipment to be installed and there are 2 more to follow. Also applied to the Living Spaces for match funding for the tennis courts – so that they can be made over into a multi – games area and shelter. £500 for insurance. Hoping to hold a sports event, volunteers and helpers are always needed.

REPORT ON GREEN OAK VIEW – Duncan Froggatt

When Green Oak View closes the site will be developed. As a result there should be 106 monies available to the community. (Probably about £20,000) We need to have something that will benefit Totley, however this will only happen if we are determined. Need time, commitment and money. Possibly applying for Lottery funding. We need to

be absolutely clear as to what we want – if it is a communal facility - what exactly? Polling interest in the community what interest is there? A business plan needs to be formulated. There is a steering committee and messages can be left in the Library and they will be passed on. Some possibilities were outlined e.g. extending the Library, or the Bowling Green buildings. If the bowling green area was used then it would be likely that the present buildings would have to be demolished and there be a new build - no bigger than Alternatively sharing space with Totley present space. County Primary School. When Green Oak View closes a luncheon club will be lost, the school has kitchens or make links with the Cheshire Home. This opportunity should not be wasted.

Responses

Dave Aspinall – updated the meeting – spoken to Parks department who were not happy with the suggested location of buildings in the park they suggested it should be nearer the bowling green. Questions of maintenance arise – it would need to be a shared project with TRA, Friends of Green Oak Park and the Bowling Club. The City Librarian has concerns over space, particularly the children's section at the moment as it has a computer base. Original Library was designed with 3 sections in mind. Potentially need ¼ million pounds to fund the various options. Today outline planning permission has been granted on the green Oak site for 2x3 floors of flats and 11 houses. The monies gained by the sale will be used to fund a care facility opposite Tescos. There will be consultation over the application.

Councillor Keith Hill – also involved in the future for Totley. Still early days in the planning of 'what next' but we need to make our voices heard otherwise decisions would be made for us. Keith highlighted a simple questionnaire available – likely to rasise expectations – up to us to make our feelings known – the questionnaire is to act as a stepping off point. We may have to settle for something modest but all options will be looked at.

Opportunity for those present to respond.

Mike Williams endorsed what was said and reminded those present of the past history of trying to get a community centre over the last 25 years. Need input from the younger generation – what do they want? Need to harness that energy and go forward following the different avenues that are opening up.

Richard Wrigglesworth also supported what had been said – this is a one off opportunity. Cited the development of a facility in Dronfield and told us of the changes he has seen over his time living in this community.

Another resident questioned are we talking about what we want or what we need?

How well used are the facilities in Totley already? Majority well used – Heatherfield needs upgrading. Where is the support from the parents in their 30's/40's? Need to consult with those that are hard to reach – the 'youth' Via Matt Conant – Youth Worker for the area. Further discussion on similar lines took place.

Colin Ross spoke about Youth in Totley – not the few who are a nuisance and how and when a new facility has been installed other things should follow e.g. the new equipment in the park. Need to canvas the schools to get the youth perspective so that we get a multi-function facility.

Opportunity for further discussion over the above report then took place.

AREA PANEL MONEY

Litter bins and grit bins have recently been installed. Funds are available including for highway trees. It was pointed out

that grit bins were needed on Aldam Road, Sunnyvale Road and near the Cheshire Home.

Tracing Homesteads from a Bygone Age

This is certainly the age of living in the fast lane. The fashion of the day is the art of the web site, computers and tourism. Look around the local moorland scene and you will have seen vast changes over the past 60 years. Access to the hills has become much easier with the formation of National Parks and organisations such as the National Trust who own large areas of scenic beauty and stately homes. The City of Sheffield is a grand place to live with its easy access to Derbyshire moors. Our own suburb of Totley is a gateway to some first class scenic delights. At the turn of the 20th century the local moors of Totley, Burbage, Houndkirk, Hallam, Bradfield, Ramsley and Big Moor were still the domain of the grouse shooters. Woe betide any ramblers who ventured onto the hills in the early days for this was classed as trespass on

private land. The Duke of Rutland Norfolk, and Devonshire owned large stretches of moorland all around Sheffield created employment for hill farmers and gamekeepers but slowly tolerance ruled the day. Grouse shooting was on the decline and access to the hills has become so much easier. The old bog trotting pioneers from the 1920s



who fought hard for the right to roam would feed proud of the Look around at the ruined shell of many homesteads situated on these wind swept heights. Along the old coaching Houndkirk Road you stumble across the site of the Badger House and Oxdale Lodge once the homestead of the Duke of Rutland's gamekeeper and family. This site is situated midway between Fox House and Ringinglow, close to the Thieves Bridge that spans the infant Redcar Brook (feeder of the River Sheaf) on the fringe of the moor and just off the Fox House Road is the ruined farmstead of Piper House the home of that gentle giant gamekeeper George Stone. His family can be traced in Dore Churchyard. I once was invited to tea at the home of this grand family back in the early 1930s. Now these moorland areas are owned by the Sheffield City Council. Follow the Piper House track through Blackamoor and the ruined shell can be found just across the Fox House Road. It must have been a hard life for old Tommy Sampson, the gamekeeper and farmer at Strawberry Lee. Follow the cart road track from Totley Bents to trace this ruined site. Old Tommy must have been a great character. All these high level abodes were finally demolished in the late 1930s. Other homesteads of the past was Stonyridge House which combined the toll road near Fox House. There is even a tollhouse situated at Owler Bar. Just below and set back at the edge of Totley Moor is the fashionable Thickwood Lodge; this was once a gamekeeper's residence. Also, Bole Hill Lodge at the head of the Moss Road likewise – note the site of Ramsley Lodge as you drive along the main road towards Baslow. This gamekeeper's residence was occupied right up to the 1950s. Just off the Froggatt Road and opposite The Grouse Inn you will note the imposing White Lodge, this was gamekeeper's home, now used as an outward-bound youth centre. Many ramblers cross the top of Totley Moss on route for the Longshaw Estate and may find the crest of the hill beyond Flask Edge a little flat

and boring but look around for you will find interest on this boggy stretch. Even a stone circle can be traced close to the site of Strawberry Lee ex-farm. Close to the main rail tunnel air shaft that dominates the flat top moor I found an old entrenchment and wall line that lead directly back towards the Owler Bar Road and traced the large site of a dwelling that really dates back into history. On the large-scale ordnance map this gives the position as a sheepfold but there was obviously a homestead here for a causeway leads right across the feeders of the Barbrook which flows towards Big Moor. The late veteran rambler and historian Bert Ward from Storth Lodge along Moorwoods Lane did research on this site and named it "Shepherds Moss House". I found this dwelling about 10 years ago and have always been fascinated by the high level location. I went to the Sheffield reference library but all they could tell me was that they thought it was just a sheepfold. I wonder if any reader could throw any light

to this interesting large broken building site. Enclosed is a photo I took about 10 years ago. I would love to know who once lived in this wild forgotten spot. The whole Peak District is littered with historical interest. For example, "Higgar Lodge" on Hathersage Moor and Callow Farm close to the Cupulo route from Ringinglow to Hathersage and Gotherage Barn in Bretton Clough are just a few extra interesting sites of a bygone age.



Gardening Tips for June

I have been dragged out of my garden to see my lad and his wife up in Livingston near Edinburgh. I have left a lot of work behind, all the bedding plants are coming on nicely, most of the veg plants are in place, so a little break was in order, the weather here is a bit brighter than in Sheffield but the flowers are a bit behind. The tulips have not finished yet (mid May) and cherry blossom is still on the trees. June hopefully will mean that we can relax a bit. Most of the bedding should be very nearly finished, grass cutting and watering will be our main occupation other than lazing about with a cool glass of something and a nice book (fat chance). We will be getting all shipshape ready for the opening gardening days (26 and 27 June). Christine and I will be pleased to see you. I do hope you can come, you may get some ideals for your own garden, some of the other gardens have quite a few innovative ideas and they will not mind you copying them or modifying them to suit your garden. My onions are looking good, they should be OK for the show. I have tried some more veg this year, 3 types of carrot, 5 types of potatoes, several different lettuces and a Japanese radish so I will be interested to see the results later. I am hoping for a bit of sunshine to bring them on and also enable me to do a bit of that relaxing I mentioned earlier. I won't be able to spend time watching my shoal of fish, the perishing heron has found my pond and has eaten a few, I suppose he will be back for the rest unless I fix some sort of cover for the pond (any ideas to keep them off without it looking unsightly?). The tadpoles are OK, I suppose the heron will leave them until they grow up a bit then the frogs will have to watch out! Anyway, we can't have you lazing about too much so get cracking and keep your garden up to scratch.

Flowers The weather hopefully will be a bit drier so careful watering will be necessary especially for newly planted bedding plants etc. Tie up the taller plants or they could be damaged by wind.

Hardy primula can be lifted and divided, the crowns can be divided into several clumps and transplanted into a moist, shady position.

Aphids and greenfly can be troublesome, regular spraying will be necessary to keep them under control.

Don't forget to give your plants a good feed now and again, it will pay dividends in helping plants and lovely plants. As alpine and rockery plants finish flowering, trim back the growth to keep plants neat and compact. Sew seeds of winter flowering pansies in seed boxes and put them in a frame, when they are large enough they can be planted out in the garden.

Dead head peonies after flowering and cut back oriental poppies. Lift and clean spring bulbs, store in light, airy shed.

Pinks can be propagated now by means of cuttings, select healthy looking none-flowering shoots, 10-13 cms long (4 inch to 5 inch). Pull them out at a joint, this is termed "piping". Insert these pipings firmly 5cms (2 inches) deep and about 10 cms apart in sandy soil, preferably in a frame but a shady border will do. Keep them well-watered, shaded from direct sunlight.

Sew biennials such as Canterbury Bells, Foxgloves, Pansies, Violas and Sweet Williams in frames or cloches.

Vegetables Make successional sowings of all vegetables such as lettuce, carrots, turnips, radishes, mustard and cress, all the salad vegetables and turnips will be better in a shady spot.

Plant out winter greens, including brussel sprouts, broccoli , kale and savoy. Stake-up peas and beans.

Plant outdoor tomatoes when they have been hardened off. Choose a sunny spot, a border at the foot of a wall or fence with a southerly aspect will be best. Soil should be in good condition but not too richly manured. Let them set a few fruit, then feed with tomato fertiliser.

Plant out runner beans 20cms (8 inches) apart, provide a stout take or cane for each plant.

Plant celery, set plans that are 8cm (3 inches) high or more, I find the self-blanching type less time-consuming.

Plant out marrow plants, they will be ready in good time for the Show

I plant mine in well-rotted compost between 2 bales of straw. This keeps them off the ground and holds the moisture, which they love. Let's see if you can beat my whopper of last year.

Pinch out broad beans when they have set 3 clusters. This may prevent an attach black fly.

You may be able to lift a root or two of early potatoes for an early taster, keep earthing up.

Sew a further crop of parsley and stump rooted carrots.

Make a sewing of french beans in a sheltered place. These will crop in September (just right for the Show) and continue until the first sharp frost.

Don't forget to water and feed, don't just spray the tops, give them a full soaking. This should last and prevent surface rooting which make the plants susceptible to drought conditions. Keep hoeing to prevent weeks taking hold.

Plant out leeks for winter/spring.

Sow chervil and dill in a sunny spot to be ready late summer.

Trees, Shrubs and Fruit As with all plants keep well watered, and weed free. Remove dead tips of cotoneaster, and cherry.

Pick the poisonous seeds of laburnum, especially if there are children around. Give azaleas, rhododendrons, camellias and hydrangeas a feed of sequestrine especially if they are yellowing. Keep an eye out for pest and diseases and deal with them as soon as they are seen.

Planting of new shrubs and trees is best left until late summer. Increase your stock by taking semi-ripe cuttings from a wide range of trees and shrubs. Root in a frame or on a window sill. Layer clementis and flowering quince.

Prune deciduous shrubs like cleutzia broom, mock orange after flowering.

Keep raspberries moist at ground level by mulching with straw or strawy manure between the rows.

Keep the young shoots of blackberries and loganberries tied up. Peg strawberry runners which have been earmarked for propagation into posts.

Greenhouse and Indoor Plants Keeping an eye on temperatures is the order of the day, damping down if the weather is hot and giving plenty of ventilation. Early June nights can be very treacherous, watch the weather forecast.

Keep plants well watered and fed, take out side shoots on tomatoes and feed with fertiliser when the first truss has set.

Pollinate flowers using a fine brush or cottonball on a stick will do nicely.

Watch out for white fly, I use yellow sticky cards placed strategically around. They are very effective. If they get really bad use a whitefly smoke cone. You will need to repeat this every 5-6 days to give effective control.

Sew greenhouse calceolarias now. Sow seed in well drained trays, give the lightest covering of sand. Cover and place in a frame to germinate. They do not like excessive heat. Continue to feed flowering and fruity pot plants, stand on damp pebbles to maintain humidity.

Pot up rooted cuttings taken in May, watch out for aphids etc and treat when seen. I find plant pins very effective.

Take stem cuttings from geraniums, buzy lizzie, fushia, heliotrope, kalanchoe, plumbago and peperomia.

Take leaf cuttings from African violets, rex begonias, echeveria and gloxinia.

Lawns Cut, water, keep clean regularly. Trim edges, it really makes the garden look smart. New lawns should be gently rolled and lightly cut over. Apply lawn feed if you haven't done already. Apply selective weedkiller when weeds appear. Prepare ground for new lawn areas to be laid in autumn.

That should keep you busy for a while.



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


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
